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New Orleans, LA - January 7, 2009 - Today, a diverse group of community leaders announced the inaugural 'A Dream & A Goal MLK Weekend Classic' in New Orleans on January 18-19, 2009. This historic occasion will commemorate the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Holiday while bringing together over 800 student-athletes, coaches and administrators from across New Orleans. The two-day event will kick-off with 20 basketball games

at four local high schools, followed by participation in the annual MLK Holiday March and culminating in a public event that will celebrate the legacy of Dr. King at the Superdome. The event is made possible through a generous donation by businessman John Georges and Georges Enterprises.

New Orleans City Council Vice President Arnie Fielkow, a co-founder of the 'Weekend Classic' said, "New Orleans is a city with many challenges and a population still recovering from Hurricane Katrina. The 'Weekend Classic' enables boys and girls from different schools, neighborhoods and backgrounds to come together in the spirit of Dr. King in a great unifying event for all of New Orleans." He adds, "While this country is facing deep economic challenges, I am honored that John Georges saw the community value in this event and agreed early on to be our leading sponsor."

John Georges partnered with the 'Weekend Classic' as its lead sponsor due to the Classic's goal of positively impacting the local community, especially youth, over the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King Holiday weekend.

"Councilmember Fielkow asked me to provide a grant to 'A

Dream & A Goal' because he knows I believe that during these tough economic times, those who are able to step up and help should now more than ever before. By holding the Classic over the MLK Holiday, the lessons of Dr. King and his emphasis on community involvement will leave a lasting impact on the young athletes far beyond their time on the court. Indeed, the full 'Weekend Classic' is very important to the entire community, and I am proud that I could help make it happen this year. Georges Enterprises is a firm believer in community engagement, and that is why we chose to support this worthy event," says John Georges, CEO of presenting sponsor Georges Enterprises.

The community leaders spearheading this event include Council Vice President Fielkow, the Greater New Orleans Sports Foundation, the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, the MLK Holiday Planning Commission, George Shinn and the New Orleans Hornets, the Recovery School District, Orleans Parish School Board, the New Orleans Recreation Department, the Jewish Community Center and Hands On New Orleans. On Sunday, January 18th, over 800 local student-athletes will take part in five basketball games at four local high school gyms. At each gym, there will be one NORD game, a junior high girl's game, a junior high boy's game, a girl's high school game and a boy's high school game. In between the games, a short MLK-themed educational piece will be conducted by members of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference.

All basketball game participants will join in the annual MLK march from Louis Armstrong Park to the Louisiana Superdome on Monday, January 19th. At the Superdome event, which begins at noon and will be open to the public, the legacy and lessons of Dr. King will be taught through live music, dance and education. The participating student-athletes and their coaches will then receive free tickets to that afternoon's New Orleans Hornets vs. Indiana Pacers game in the New Orleans Arena, courtesy of the New Orleans Hornets.

"The Hornets are steadfast supporters of the greater New Orleans community, especially of our youth. We are delighted to support the 'Weekend Classic' in its goals of educating people on the legacy of Reverend Dr. King and supporting meaningful service in the community," says

Council Vice President Fielkow Statement On Today's "Strike Against Crime"

New Orleans, LA - January 9, 2009 - Council Vice President Arnie Fielkow issued the following statement in support of today's 'Strike Against Crime' organized by Silence is Violence to spotlight the need for New Orleans to proactively address crime in our city:

"Two years ago a group of citizens, moved by the murders of two young New Orleans activists, organized a citywide observance to stop the escalating violent crime.

That small group's march to City Hall grew to thousands of people from all neighborhoods and backgrounds from across New Orleans. It energized our larger community to place the very highest priority on solving the crime that has plagued our city for years. There has been some progress, but every life lost and every family changed by violence pays too great a price.

I am personally participating in today's Strike Against Crime, organized by Silence Is Violence, by joining both the Victims Memorial at Noon and the Soccer In The Street match at 4 p.m. at Lafayette Square. I will continue to focus my work on those initiatives that offer our young people constructive alternatives to the unsupervised and often illegal activities that are commonplace in our community.

From our schools and neighborhoods, to our criminal justice system, to those in government and in commerce, the work of reducing crime in New Orleans requires everyone's courageous and steadfast participation.

I hope that today's Strike Against Crime will not be a one-time event. To really affect substantive change, we must continue to be united for a better way of life and to hold everyone responsible for the future of our city."

New Orleans, LA - January 15, 2009 - Today, New Orleans City Council Vice President Arnie Fielkow announced his intent to move forward on legislation further opening up the City of New Orleans professional service contracting process to the public. Council Vice President Fielkow plans to bring the legislation to the Council Meeting on February 5, 2009.

"I am very heartened by the opinion


issued by Attorney General Buddy Caldwell which, for the second time, affirms the Council's rights to legislate in this area and further supports the intent of the legislation to make the City's professional service contracting process subject to the Louisiana Open Meetings Law. This legislation, if approved by Council, will go a long way in ensuring the openness and transparency of how we do business for the benefit of our citizens," said Fielkow.

The legislation filed by Vice President Fielkow involves both an Ordinance directed towards the Executive Branch of city government and a Motion directed towards the Legislative Branch of city government. Both pieces of legislation aim to increase transparency in city contracting processes.

The Ordinance Cal. 27,069 reinforces that every professional service contract procurement process done by the City is subject to the state's Open Meetings Law.

Supports Construction of Five New Libraries





The five additional projects are Algiers Regional Library, Nora Navra Library, Norman Mayer Library, Robert E. Smith Library and New Orleans East Regional Library.



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

Councilmember-at-Large Fielkow Statement Re: Enhanced French Quarter Sanitation Services

New Orleans, LA - February 2nd, 2009 - The following is a statement issued today from New Orleans City Council Vice President Arnie Fielkow regarding the 2009 budget issue:

"It is truly regrettable that the question of providing enhanced sanitation services to the French Quarter is still being debated. The City Council has expressed for several months the absolute need for this

service to be maintained for the benefit of both our local citizens and tourists. This was provided for in the budget passed by the City Council on December 1, 2008, confirmed in the Council's override of the Mayor's veto two weeks later and reconfirmed in the final budget passed by the Council on January 12, 2009. Following this January 12th Council vote, the Mayor publicly supported the final budget passed by the Council.

It makes no business sense to eliminate such a service when it has been a huge success story for this city post-Katrina and the fact that the French Quarter and other downtown areas generate in excess of one third (1/3) of city revenue. It is this city revenue which funds services to the rest of the community. This position is further strengthened by the fact that we are about to enter a high-tourism season, with literally thousands of guests coming from throughout the U.S. and around the world to Mardi Gras. The City Council is the one entity which has consistently advocated for these enhanced services and continues to do so today.

The public should understand that the funds needed to provide these enhanced services, based upon the Mayor's position the past several days, represents less than one half (1/2) of one (1) percent of the city's general fund budget. I call upon the Mayor to do what is necessary contractually to immediately put in place, and fund, these necessary enhanced sanitation services.

There has been much discussion over the past several days about identifying an alternate revenue source to pay for these enhanced sanitation services. I believe that the fiscally sound budget passed by this City Council on January 12th, which provided for the enhanced sanitation services, should be honored and respected by the Mayor. Alternatively, and in the spirit of avoiding a protracted legal fight which is not in the best interests of our citizens, I would be supportive of either additional cuts from other discretionary budgeted areas or usage of revenue from the pre-Katrina Economic Development Fund (EDF).

If the latter, it is my hope and expectation that the Mayor will continue to support the other major initiative also being funded through the EDF, namely the creation of a public-private partnership to handle the city's economic development efforts going forward. This is a project which has been in planning for over two years and one that the Mayor has consistently expressed his support, both publicly and privately. The Mayor's unequivocal commitment to this initiative was further expressed in his State of the City address last spring. Any withdrawal of such support would be both disingenuous and highly detrimental to New Orleans citizens and businesses.

It is time today that we conclude the debate on the enhanced sanitation services and I am prepared to cast my support as stated above."

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New Orleans, LA - February 4, 2009 - Tomorrow, at the regular City Council meeting, Council Vice President Arnie Fielkow's legislation to ensure that the city's competitive selection process for professional service contracts is subject to Louisiana's Open Meetings Law will come up for final vote. The legislation calls for further openness and transparency by both the Executive and Legislative branches of City Government.

Council Vice President Fielkow said, "Any time we talk about awarding public dollars for city contracted services, it should be done in a totally open process to the public. Unfortunately, this has not been the case for the professional services contracting process in New Orleans city government. My legislation calls for the City of New Orleans to embrace transparency and openness in its contracting processes and make this process subject to the required Louisiana Open Meetings Law."

The two pieces of legislation to be voted on tomorrow are:

- An Ordinance requiring that the Executive Branch of City Government, through its professional service contracting process, comply with the Louisiana Open Meetings Law

- A Motion which mandates that the City Council, in its professional service contracting process, also fully comply with the Louisiana Open Meetings Law

The legislation was originally introduced and endorsed by the Council's Governmental Affairs Committee on July 7, 2008. The Louisiana Attorney General, prompted by a request from the Council, rendered an advisory opinion that meetings involving the awarding of professional services contracts are indeed subject to the Louisiana Open Meetings Law. See the Louisiana Attorney General's advisory opinion in full here.

Mayor Nagin's Administration requested a reconsideration by the Attorney General of his advisory opinion in late October 2008. On January 9, 2009 the Louisiana Attorney General reaffirmed its original opinion. See the Louisiana Attorney General's reaffirmed opinion in full <u>here</u>.


Fielkow added, "New Orleans is making great strides towards further openness and efficiency in city government. However, every public dollar the City spends must be accounted for and citizens deserve to know where their money is being spent. This legislation is simply another incremental step towards ensuring greater operational transparency for the benefit of all citizens of New Orleans."

The Bureau of Government Research (BGR), the New Orleans Office of Inspector General (OIG), Mayor Nagin's "Bring New Orleans Back" Commission and "Forward New Orleans: A Set of Principles" from the New Orleans Business Council have all repeatedly called for a standardized and transparent professional services contracting process in New Orleans. Council Vice President Fielkow's legislation directly addresses the concerns and wishes of good government and citizen groups.

New Orleans, LA - February 5, 2009 - Today the New Orleans City Council passed a Motion and an Ordinance requiring that the City's competitive selection process for professional services contracts comply with the Louisiana Open Meetings law, and a Motion requesting that the Administration come into compliance with the law on the Executive Branch's number of take-home vehicles.

The Council also introduced an Ordinance to reconcile the conflicting ordinances related to the domicile of City employees and take-home vehicles, and voted to override the Mayor's veto of an Ordinance pertaining to the 2009 Budget funding allocation for the Youth Study Center.

Additionally, the Council passed legislation urging the extension of the Disaster Housing Assistance Program, requesting a report on the cost and feasibility of the implementation of wireless internet services in the Council Chamber, and expediting the construction of five libraries throughout the City.

Councilmembers also addressed Mardi Gras presentations by the Krewe of Zulu, Krewe of Muses, and Krewe of Choctaw.

Supported Transparent Competitive Selection Process

Council passed Ordinance Calendar No. 27,069 and Motion M-08-380, authored by Councilmember Fielkow, requiring that both the Executive and Legislative branches of City Government, in their professional service contracting processes, comply with the Louisiana Open Meetings Law.

Councilmember Arnie Fielkow said, "This legislation calls for further openness and transparency by both the Executive and Legislative branches of City Government when dealing with professional service contracts and the awarding of public dollars. It is critical that this is done in a totally open process to the public."

Addressed Take-Home Cars Compliance

The Council passed Motion M-09-49, co-authored by Councilmembers Midura and Head, requesting that the Mayor present on or before March 13th a plan for compliance with the City Code mandating that the executive branch assign no more than 50 take-home cars to employees.

The Motion also states that the plan must: designate which of the current take-home vehicles should be considered the 50 take-home vehicles permitted by the City Code, provide protocol for the disposition of the vehicles in excess of the quota, and establish an official policy to determine which posts within City government will be permitted the use of take-home vehicles.

Julie Schwam Harris of the Mayor's Office of Intergovernmental Relations presented the Administration's opinion on the matter, stating that the Administration is taking a systematic approach to evaluating whether or not 50 take-home vehicles is an adequate number to meet the needs of the Executive Branch.

Adherence to the 50 car rule would allow take-home vehicles for the approximately 15 administrative department heads as well as additional

Councilmembers Midura and Head also introduced Ordinance Calendar No. 27,254 to reconcile the conflicting ordinances related to the domicile of City employees and take-home vehicles.

In a January 30, 2009 response to the Inspector General's vehicle report, the administration cited ordinance "contradict[ion]" as a reason for failing to comply with the City ordinances prohibiting more than the administration's 50 take-home cars.

District "B" Councilmember Stacy Head stated, "This Ordinance should remove any argument that take-home vehicles are appropriate for administration employees residing outside of Orleans Parish. This is intended to ensure that administrative executives who choose to live outside of our Parish do not subject the City to liability, maintenance or gas costs based on that lifestyle decision."

Supports Funding for the Youth Study Center

The Council voted to override the Mayor's veto of Ordinance Calendar No. 27,303, authored by Councilmember Midura, requiring that prior to expenditure of the 2009 Budget funds appropriated for the Youth Study Center, Capital Projects and Human Services present the conceptual design submission of the Youth Study Center to the Criminal Justice Committee for approval prior to entering into the construction document phase of the project.

Councilmember Shelley Midura said, "We should exercise our responsibility as legislators over the redevelopment of this very important facility. We must collaborate with national experts to

implement national best practices in the redevelopment of this facility to ensure that we have all the necessary tools to improve the lives of youth while advancing the interests of public safety."

Director of Capital Projects Bill Chrisman came before the Council to reaffirm his support of the Ordinance and the incorporation of best practices into the Youth Study Center, and to emphasize the need for additional funding to properly rebuild the facility.

Urged Extension of Recovery Housing Program



The Council passed Resolution R-09-50, co-authored by Councilmembers Fielkow and Midura, urging the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and FEMA take immediate action to extend for one year the Disaster Housing Assistance Program (DHAP).

The program, administered by HUD and FEMA, assists Louisiana residents still in need after Hurricanes

Katrina and Rita. The rental assistance provided under DHAP has been instrumental in allowing Louisiana families to remain in their local communities while the state and federal governments work to stabilize the affordable housing market.

Council Vice President Arnie Fielkow said, "DHAP is currently scheduled to end on February 28th, potentially placing thousands of high-risk families including elderly, disabled and families with children, at risk of homelessness. The short-term extension of this program will allow the state to work with the federal government to assess the needs of the remaining households, assist the transition of families out of the program, and develop a plan to support those with outstanding needs."

Explored Implementation of Wireless Internet in Council Chamber



The Council passed Resolution R-09-51, coauthored by Councilmembers Fielkow and Midura, to assess the feasibility of implementation of wireless internet services in the Council Chamber.

The Resolution requests that the Director of the Council Utilities Regulatory Office investigate the cost and any related issues regarding implementation of wireless internet in the Chamber and report back to the Council's Cable & Telecommunications Committee within 45 days

with a report on these items.

The Selection Review Panel, a committee formed by the Mayor pursuant to Executive Order for evaluating contract proposals for the provision of professional services, must comply with the Open Meetings Law. The New Orleans City Council is authorized to establish standards for open meetings that are equally applicable to the Executive Branch and the Legislative Branch of the City of New Orleans, as long as such standards do not conflict with or supersede the Open Meetings Law.

Our office received an opinion request from you regarding the applicability of Louisiana Open Meetings Law to the competitive selection process for professional service contracts by the Office of the Mayor and the New Orleans City Council (Council). Your letter states that the Mayor of the City of New Orleans, pursuant to Executive Order CRN 08-01, has established Selection Review Panels to evaluate proposed professional service contracts. Your letter also states that the Council proposes to pass a resolution promoting transparency in the awarding of professional service contracts, requiring the Council and the Mayor to comply with Louisiana Open Meetings Law in the process for evaluating and awarding professional service contracts.

In particular, your letter asks us to address:

- Whether meetings which are held pursuant to Executive Order CRN 08-01 are subject to Louisiana Open Meetings Law (La. R.S. 42:4.1 through La. R.S. 42:13); and
- (2) Whether the New Orleans City Council is authorized to establish, through Ordinance or Motion, standards for open meetings that are equally applicable to the Executive Branch and the Legislative Branch of the City of New Orleans, consistent with the Home Rule Charter, including Section 6-308?

The right of access to public information is guaranteed by La.Const. Art. XII, § 3, which provides, "[n]o person shall be denied the right to observe the deliberations of public bodies and examine public documents, except in cases established by law." The Open Meetings Law, which can be found at La. R.S. 42:4.1 et seq., was enacted by the

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Louisiana Legislature to protect and define the constitutional right of access to observe the deliberations of public bodies. The purpose of this body of law is clearly set forth in La. R.S. 42:4.1(A), which provides:

[i]t is essential to the maintenance of a democratic society that public business be performed in an open and public manner and that citizens be advised of and aware of the performance of public officials and the deliberations and decisions that go into the making of public policy. Toward this end, the provisions of R.S. 42:4.1 through R.S. 42:10 shall be construed liberally.

As provided for in La. R.S. 42:5, every meeting of a public body is required to be open to the public, unless closed pursuant to La. R.S. 42:6, R.S. 42:6.1 or R.S. 42:6.2.

A meeting is defined as the convening of a quorum of a public body to deliberate or act on a matter over which the public body has supervision, control, jurisdiction, or advisory power. La. R.S. 42:4.2(A)(1). A "public body" is defined as:

village, town, and city governing authorities; parish governing authorities; school boards and boards of levee and port commissioners; boards of publicly operated utilities; planning, zoning, and airport commissions; and any other state, parish. municipal, or special district boards, commissions, or authorities, and those of any political subdivision thereof, where such body possesses policy making, advisory, or administrative functions, including any committee or subcommittee of any of these bodies enumerated in this paragraph.

La. R.S. 42:4.2(A)(2) [Emphasis added].

Your first question asks us whether or not the entity that meets pursuant to Executive Order CRN 08-01 is subject to the Open Meetings Law. This requires an analysis of whether or not it qualifies as a "public body" under the definition in La. R.S. 42:4.2(A)(2).

Section 6-308 of the Home Rule Charter for the City of New Orleans gives the Mayor the authority to establish a process for awarding contracts for professional service, which provides, in pertinent part:

(5)(b) Contracts for professional services administered by the offices, departments, boards, and other agencies of the Executive Branch shall be awarded on the basis of a competitive selection process which shall be established by executive order of the Mayor.

Section 9 of Executive Order CRN 08-01, entitled "Selection Review Panels," provides that these Panels are "established for the purpose of conducting an independent, objective evaluation of proposals for the provision of professional services." Depending

on the monetary amount of the contract awarded, certain members are designated to participate in the Selection Review Panels. The Executive Order provides that "all discussion and deliberations by the Selection Review Panel in the evaluating and ranking of any proposal shall be deemed confidential, although the completed evaluation forms are available to the public as public records." Executive Order CRN 08-01, Section 9(L).

Black's Law Dictionary (8th Ed. 2004) defines a committee as "[a] subordinate group to which a deliberative assembly or other organization refers business for consideration, investigation, oversight, or action" and an advisory committee as "[a] committee formed to make suggestions to some other body or to an official." From the description of the Selection Review Panel in Executive Order CRN 08-01, they are a group to which the Mayor looks to for recommendations or suggestions regarding proposals for professional contracts. They evaluate and consider contract proposals for the provision of professional services submitted to the City of New Orleans, and provide recommendations, which the Mayor can agree with or reject. They clearly qualify as a committee under the definition provided above. The definition of "public bodies" in La. R.S. 42:4.2(A)(2) includes committees created by municipal authorities or city governing authorities.

The City of New Orleans operates under a Home Rule Charter, which provides for a Mayor-Council form of government. Article I, Section 1-102, Home Rule Charter of the City of New Orleans. The Powers and Duties of the Mayor, as described by Article IV, Section 4-206, include, but are not limited to, oversight of the activities of boards and other agencies of City government; enforcement of the provisions of the Home Rule Charter, City ordinances, and all other laws; appointing positions relating to City business, including the Chief Administrative Officer and the City Attorney; submitting an operating budget to the Council for the City; and *signing contracts for the City*. The Selection Review Panels assist with the evaluations of contract proposals for the provision of professional services. Signing contracts for the City is an enumerated power of the Mayor. The Selection Review Panels are committees of a municipal authority under these particular circumstances, where they assist in the exercise of a mayoral function, and are not dissimilar in function from a planning or zoning commission.

Our office has previously considered the nature of committees created by mayors, and has required certain committees comply with Open Meetings Law. In Atty. Gen. Op. No. 79-1392, our office opined that a committee established by the mayor of the City of Bastrop was a public body required to comply with Louisiana's Open Meetings Law, where such a committee "is appointed by the chief executive of a political subdivision of the State and has been granted policy making and advisory functions in the extremely important area of public finance." Our office opined that the committee appointed by the mayor, in function, could be classified as a subcommittee of the municipal governing authority.

A mayoral advisory committee was required to comply with Open Meetings Law in Atty. Gen. Op. No. 05-0424, where the committee was established by the mayor to provide guidance on matters pertaining to the Police Depaitment in Youngsville. Our office stated, for the purposes of the Open Meetings Law, the meaning of "public body" included a municipal authority with advisory functions. Similarly, in Atty. Gen. Op. No. 89-481, our office stated that a committee appointed by the mayor as chief executive officer was a subcommittee of a municipal authority under La. R.S. 42:4.2(A)(2), and a "public body" under the Open Meetings Law. Also, in Atty. Gen. Op. No. 95-313, our office found that a citizen committee established and appointed by the mayor for discussion, research and advice was subject to the Open Meetings Law.

Because there are no Louisiana cases directly on point, we note the position taken by Florida courts dealing with a similar issue. In Silver Express Company v. District Board of Lower Tribunal Trustees of Miami-Dade Community College, a contractor had submitted an unsuccessful proposal to provide flight training services and alleged violation of Florida's Open Meetings Law in their proposal consideration process. 691 So.2d 1099 (Fla. 3d DCA 1997). In this case, a committee was appointed, composed of college staff and one outside individual, to meet and evaluate the responses to the request for proposals. Where the committee served to "weed through the various" proposals, to determine which were acceptable and to rank them accordingly," the court found they were subject to Florida's Open Meetings Laws. Id. at 1100.1 Similarly, in Leach-Wells v. City of Bradenton, a selection committee was appointed to review proposals received by the City in response to a bid for proposals for a construction project. 734 So.2d 1168 (Fla. 2d DCA 1999) The function of the committee was to rank the top three firms, who would then make presentations to the City Council, and the Council would select the firm to construct the project. Where the committee was comprised of the city clerk, a local engineer, the public works director and a city councilman, it was not disputed that the committee was subject to Florida's Sunshine Law [Open Meetings and Public Records Law]. Id. at 1169. While this office recognizes the non-binding nature of case law in other jurisdictions, we nevertheless find these cases instructive.

Considering the importance of contracts for professional services awarded by the City of New Orleans, the importance of conducting public business in a transparent and open manner, and in light of previous Attorney General opinions, it is the opinion of this office that the Selection Review Panels described in Executive Order CRN 08-01 are public entities as defined by La. R.S. 42:4.2. Therefore, under the facts you presented in your request, the Selection Review Panels must comply with Open Meetings Law in evaluating proposals for the provision of professional services.

¹ Section 286.011(1) Florida Statutes (1995) provides: All meetings of any board or commission of any state agency or authority of any county, municipal corporation, or political subdivision, except as otherwise provided in the Constitution, at which official acts are to be taken are declared to be public meetings open to the public at all times, and no resolution, rule, or formal action shall be considered binding except as taken or made at such meeting. The board or commission must provide reasonable notice of all such meetings.

Notwithstanding our opinion that the Selection Review Panels are subject to the Open Meetings Law, the Panels may conduct portions of their meetings in executive session, if such executive session are conducted in accordance with La. R.S. 42:6.1. We note that the Panels' ability to hold executive session is governed by La. R.S. 42:6.1, and not by any executive order of the mayor.

We note that La. R.S. 42:6.1(A) provides, in pertinent part:

A public body may hold an executive session pursuant to R.S. 42:6 for one or more of the following reasons:

(1) Discussion of the character, professional competence, or physical or mental health of a person, provided that such person is notified in writing at least twenty-four hours before the meeting and that such person may require that such discussion be held at an open meeting, and provided that nothing in this Subsection shall permit an executive session for discussion of the appointment of a person to a public body. In cases of extraordinary emergency, written notice to such person shall not be required; however, the public body shall give such notice as it deems appropriate and circumstances permit.

(2) Strategy sessions or negotiations with respect to collective bargaining, prospective litigation after formal written demand, or litigation when an open meeting would have a detrimental effect on the bargaining or litigating position of the public body.

[...]

(10) Or any other matters now provided for or as may be provided for by the legislature.

Our office has also recognized the obligation to discuss any information which is "confidential" in executive session. As our office stated in Atty. Gen. Op. No. 05-0065, "[i]f the records are subject to a privacy claim or are privileged under the Public Records Act, then La. R.S. 42:6.1(A)(9) [which exception is now 42:6.1(A)(10)] may be interpreted to authorize an executive session to discuss the contents of the privileged records." In Atty. Gen. Op. No. 88-91. our office addressed the applicability of the Public Records Act to information solicited by a state agency through a request for proposal, as provided for by La. R.S. 39:1503. Our office stated that for general purposes, "bids for public contracts are matters of public record and become such upon receipt by the state." *Id.* However, citing Atty. Gen. Op. No. 87-320, our office also noted that "certain financial information must be exempted from disclosure due to

privacy considerations guaranteed by Article I, § 5 of the Louisiana Constitution of 1974."²

Our office addressed proprietary, financial and statistical information which may be protected from disclosure in Atty. Gen. Op. No. 82-860, in which our office stated:

The threshold determination is whether a reasonable expectation of privacy exists against disclosure of information. If so, the public interest in obtaining the document must be weighed against the interest in privacy. *Webb v. City of Shreveport*, 371 So.2d 316 (La.App. 2nd Cir. 1979), writ denied 374 So.2d 657.

Proprietary, financial and statistical information may 'pertain to the business of the private person, firm or corporation' (R.S. 44:4(3)) and may therefore be confidential. If in the exercise of reasonable discretion by the responsible public officer, specific information contained in files in the custody of the Department is classified as confidential in nature, then it is out opinion that such record or the parts thereof so classified come within the scope of R.S. 44:4(3).

However, we note that any discussions in executive session must be limited to what is permitted by the Open Meetings Law. As required by La. R.S. 42:6, "no final or binding action may be taken during an executive session." Therefore, although a person or firm may be properly discussed in executive session for one of the reasons authorized by the Open Meetings Law, any binding action taken with respect to such person or firm must be taken in an open meeting.

Your second question asks us to address whether the New Orleans City Council is authorized to establish, through Ordinance or Motion, standards for open meetings that are equally applicable to the Executive Branch and the Legislative Branch of the City of New Orleans, consistent with the Home Rule Charter, including Section 6-308, pertaining to contracts to which the City is a party. The Louisiana Constitution provides:

A home rule charter adopted under this Section shall provide the structure and organization, powers, and functions of the government of the local governmental subdivision, which may include the exercise of any power and performance of any function necessary, requisite, or proper for the management of its affairs, not denied by general law or inconsistent with this constitution.

² This opinion also noted the applicability of La. R S 44:4 as the basis for exempted certain financial information, which exempts from the Public Records Act, "...any records...in the custody or control of any officer, employee, agent, or agency of the state whose duties and functions are to investigate...the business of any person, firm or corporation in this state, when the records...pertain to the business of the private person, firm, or corporation and are in their nature confidential."

La.Const. Art. VI, §5(E) [Emphasis added].

As our office stated in Atty. Gen. Op. No. 02-0258, a Home Rule Charter may impose more stringent requirements than the Louisiana Constitution or general law, but may not conflict with or supersede either.

Consistent with the view that the Selection Review Panels are subject to Open Meetings Law, the New Orleans City Council is authorized to establish standards for open meetings that are equally applicable to the Executive Branch and the Legislative Branch of the City of New Orleans, as long as such standards do not conflict with or supersede the Louisiana Constitution or the Open Meetings Law. It is important to note, as previously mentioned, that Section 6-308 of the Home Rule Charter of the City of New Orleans gives the Mayor of New Orleans the authority to establish a competitive selection process by executive order for contracts for professional services administered by the offices, departments, boards, and other agencies of the Executive Branch. The Council's proposals to pass resolutions promoting transparency in the awarding of professional service contracts is permissible because the Louisiana Constitution and the Louisiana Revised Statutes require transparency from any public body falling within the definition of La. R.S. 42:4.2(A)(2), and a committee created pursuant to an executive order authorized by the Home Rule Charter must comply with requirements imposed by Louisiana law.

We hope that this opinion has adequately addressed the legal issues that you have raised. If our office can be of any further assistance, please do not hesitate to contact us.

New Orleans, LA - February 4, 2009 - In a January 30, 2009 response to the Inspector General's vehicle report, the administration cited ordinance "contradict[ion]" as a reason for failing to comply with the City ordinances prohibiting more than the administration's 50 take-home cars (excluding police and fire vehicles).

In an effort to clear any road-blocks to the administration's compliance with City ordinances related to legally-allowed take-home cars, Councilmembers Midura and Head plan to introduce an Ordinance at the City Council meeting on Thursday, February 5, 2009 that will reconcile the conflicting ordinances related to the domicile of City employees and take-home vehicles.

District "B" Councilmember Stacy Head stated, "This Ordinance should remove any argument that take-home vehicles are appropriate for administration employees residing outside of Orleans Parish."

She further stated that "This is not intended to penalize people for living outside the parish, but instead to ensure that administrative executives who choose to live outside of our Parish do not subject the City to liability, maintenance or gas costs based on that lifestyle decision."

Additionally, in order to draw focus on adherence to the 50 car rule, which would allow take-home vehicles for the 15 or so administrative department heads as well as additional vehicles for the Mayor's own use, the Councilmembers will introduce a Motion which calls on the administration to comply with the existing law and to turn over vehicles in excess of the quota by March 13, 2009.

The Fourth Quarter 2008 Take-Home Vehicle Report furnished to the City Council on January 30, 2009 by the Assistant Chief Administrative Officer of the Equipment Maintenance Division supports the findings of the Inspector General in the Interim Report on the Management of the Administrative Vehicle Fleet that the executive branch total of vehicles far exceeds the permitted quota by ordinance.



Councilmember Head continued, "After careful review it may even be possible to restrict the number of take-home vehicles further than 50. The public needs to remember that these actions have no bearing on pool vehicles. Pool vehicles should be available for City employee use including: the Department of Safety and Permits, Historic District Landmarks Commission (HDLC), and the Mayor's communications staff."

New Orleans, LA - February 10, 2009 - Today, Council Vice President Arnie Fielkow issued the following statement in response to the news that the State of Louisiana is expected to be more than \$27 million short of what it owes the New Orleans Saints and Hornets next year:

"The current debate which took place in Baton Rouge today regarding the benefit of keeping the NFL/New Orleans Saints and NBA/New Orleans Hornets in our community is one which I feel is unnecessary. There is no question that both the Saints and Hornets, and the Leagues in which they are members, bring tremendous benefit and value to the City of New Orleans, the State of Louisiana and the entire Gulf South region.

As a relatively small market in the context of professional sports, we are indeed fortunate to have two major league sports teams and they are a treasured asset that this community, state and region can ill afford to lose. Both teams have created an emotional attachment among the residents which is deep and very unifying. The community takes great pride in having these teams call New Orleans home, and a loss of either would create a huge void. One need only consider the events post-Katrina, i.e. the majestic night of the Superdome's reopening, record-season ticket sales for both teams and the emotional relief both clubs have provided in the face of a challenging quality of life environment, to fully appreciate the deep emotional impact these sports teams have among our citizens.

From an economic standpoint, both the Saints and Hornets provide an unparalleled return on investment to our community, both in terms of overall economic impact and direct financial benefits. The international and national advertising and publicity these clubs and their leagues bring to our city are things which we could never afford to purchase. Additionally, the potential for another Super Bowl in 2013 and hopefully again in future years would bring hundreds of millions of dollars of additional economic benefit to the community.

The bottom line is that the New Orleans Saints and New Orleans Hornets are part of the fabric of our community and need to remain here for the benefit of future generations. I am fully cognizant of the economic challenges being faced by our state and city, but hope that the decision-makers at both the state and franchise levels will be able to creatively formulate a revenue plan which will allow the current contractual agreements to be honored and for long-term partnerships to be created."

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



Councilmember Fielkow Statement Re: Mayor's Veto of Professional Services Contract Ordinance

"I am disappointed, though not surprised, to learn of Mayor Nagin's veto of the Professional Services Contract Ordinance today. This legislation, to ensure that the City's competitive selection process for professional service contracts is in compliance with Louisiana's Open Meetings Law, was unanimously supported by the City Council at our February 5th Council meeting.

No new arguments have been advanced in the Mayor's veto and the Mayor's previous legal arguments against this legislation have twice been rejected by the Louisiana Attorney General.

This legislation simply requires our city's contracting process (both Mayor's and Council's) to fully comply with state law - it does not take away the right of the Mayor to craft the contract review process, nor does it infringe on the Mayor's Executive Powers.

This issue is about transparency, fairness and making our government more responsive to the people. I intend to ask the Council to consider overriding the veto at our February 19th meeting."

Councilmember Fielkow Statement Re: Mayor's New Proposed Executive Order Further Eroding Openness and Transparency In City Contracting Process

New Orleans, LA - February 17, 2009 - Today, Council Vice President Arnie Fielkow issued the following statement upon learning of the Mayor's newly proposed Executive Order governing the city's professional service

contracting process:

"On February 5th, the New Orleans City Council unanimously approved an Ordinance creating enhanced openness and transparency in both the Executive and Legislative branches of local government relating to the awarding of professional service contracts. This Ordinance, which was supported by a broad cross-section of the community and passed 7-0 by the Council, was vetoed by Mayor Nagin on February 12, 2009. In the Mayor's public statements on the issue, he himself justified his veto by saying he wanted openness and transparency in city government.

Regrettably, city officials learned today that the Administration placed an official notice in the back pages of Monday's Times Picayune Sports section outlining a proposed new Executive Order governing the city's professional service contracting process. The proposed new Executive Order would replace the current system of having a Selection Review Panel comprised of mayoral aides and outside appointees reviewing professional service contracts, a process which according to the Louisiana Attorney General, needs to be in compliance with the Louisiana Open Meeting laws. The Mayor's current process does not comply with the Louisiana Open Meeting law and was the basis for the Council's Ordinance on February 5th.

Under the proposed new Executive Order contained in Monday's Times Picayune back page, and in an effort to avoid the Louisiana Open Meetings laws, the Mayor, instead of embracing enhanced openness and transparency, has taken several steps backwards. The Mayor has returned the city's professional service contracting process to an era of closed door decision-making. Indeed, if the proposed new Executive Order goes into effect, the only individuals reviewing and consulting on the proposals will be employees appointed directly by the Mayor, namely the Chief Administrative Officer, the City Attorney and/or the Office of Recovery and Development Administration (ORDA) Director. Their evaluation of contracts and input to the Mayor may be either verbal or written, thus ensuring that the public, including the Inspector General, will now be totally excluded from the selection process. The City Council's actions two weeks ago ensured that the contracting process would be open and transparent and that the public could be informed and engaged as to how their dollars are being used. Meetings would have been publicly noticed, citizens would have been able to view and participate and minutes of all meetings would have been kept. Sadly, despite the Mayor's stated intentions to achieve openness and transparency, his current actions contradict his words and negatively affect a citizen base which desperately seeks to have its city government operate in the sunshine.

Who loses in this? The public.

Who loses the most?

Those in our community who have historically been shut out of the decision making process in this City, who have not shared in economic opportunities and who have historically competed on an uneven playing field.

This is what the Council's February 5th Ordinance was designed to combat.

I am confident that my Council colleagues will join me to override the Mayor's veto of Ordinance Cal. No. 23,388 this Thursday. The Ordinance passed by the unanimous Council at the February 5th City Council meeting is still relevant, even with the Mayor's newly proposed Executive Order.

I further urge citizens to express their outrage at the Administration's decision to effectively remove their voice from the awarding of professional service contracts.

In the words of President Barack Obama, spoken at his inauguration only a few weeks ago:

"[T]hose of us who manage the public's dollars will be held to account, to spend wisely, reform bad habits, and do our business in the light of day, because only then can we restore the vital trust between a people and their government."

Council President Clarkson Statement Re: Mayor's Public Hearing Concerning Professional Services Contracts and Take-Home Vehicles

New Orleans, LA - February 18, 2009 - Council President Jacquelyn Brechtel Clarkson has issued the following statement regarding the City's professional services contracting process addressed at the Mayor's public hearing today:

"At a public hearing this afternoon, Mayor Nagin outlined an executive order to suspend panel review of professional services contracts. I am strongly opposed to this executive order, which will have the effect of further excluding the public from a process that is already in need of greater transparency and accountability.

To paraphrase one public comment from today's hearing, the money that fuels city government does not belong to the Mayor. It does not belong to the City Council. It belongs to the people, and they have every right to see how it is spent.

On February 5, the Council voted unanimously to approve an ordinance that would open the professional services contracting process to greater public scrutiny. The Mayor vetoed this ordinance, saying it was an attempt by the legislative branch to take power from the executive branch. In fact, this legislation is an attempt to give greater power to the people. And I fully intend to vote to override the Mayor's veto at tomorrow's Council meeting to see that a more public process is etched into City law.

The public support for greater openness in the professional services contracting process today was overwhelming. In light of this, I urge the Mayor to consider rescinding his executive order, reinstate the selection review panel, and comply with the Council's ordinance."

Council President Jacquelyn Brechtel Clarkson also issued the following statement regarding city take-home vehicles addressed at the Mayor's public hearing today:

"On February 5, the City Council voted 7-0 to approve a motion requesting that the Mayor's Office adopt a plan to reduce the number of take-home vehicles used by city employees. This ordinance does not affect vehicles used by first responders or public safety officers. It affects only the "administrative fleet" of cars - those managed under the Mayor's Office, the Chief Administrator's Office, and the City Council.


Also during the February 5th Council meeting, a separate ordinance was introduced that would prevent city employees who live outside of Orleans Parish from possessing a take-home car. This ordinance is not expected to come up for vote before the full Council until March, after it has been thoroughly reviewed by the Governmental Affairs Committee.

Although I support considering policies that limit take-home car use for city workers domiciled outside of Orleans Parish, I believe an exemption should be given to public safety officers and first responders. I hope and expect that the Council will be able to work together in committee to arrive at legislation that is responsible, supports our first responders, and upholds our commitment to public safety."



The Council also honored leadership of the Sugar Bowl and the Greater New Orleans Sports Foundation, and addressed a Mardi Gras presentation featuring the Mardi Gras Indians.

Additionally, a special presentation was given in the Council Chamber before the Council meeting on the 1896 landmark U.S. Supreme Court case Plessy vs. Ferguson.

Addressed Ordinance Regarding Transparent Competitive Selection Process

With only five Councilmembers present when the matter was addressed, the City Council was unsuccessful in its effort to override the Mayor's veto of Ordinance Calendar Number 27,069, which was originally adopted by the Council on February 5, 2009.

The veto override vote was four to override (Councilmembers Fielkow, Clarkson, Midura and Head), one recusal (Councilmember Hedge-Morrell) and two absent (Councilmembers Carter and Willard-Lewis).

The ordinance sought to mandate compliance with the state's Open

Meetings Law relative to the executive branch's competitive selection process for professional services contracts. Two weeks ago, the Council imposed the same requirement upon itself and the limited number of professional services contracts under its jurisdiction by amending the Council's Rules to impose the same requirement it sought to impose upon the executive branch.

In a related matter, the Administration placed an official notice in the back pages of Monday's Times Picayune Sports section outlining a proposed new Executive Order to suspend panel review of professional services contracts.

The Council honored Ronnie Burns, former President of the Sugar Bowl, for his dedication and service to the City of New Orleans.

The group spoke about the history and traditions of the Mardi Gras Indians and noted the importance of remembering and honoring that history.

The Council issued a proclamation declaring that the first day of Carnival Season 2009 and every year thereafter be designated as "Big Chief Tootie Montana Day."

The representatives thanked the Council for recognizing Tootie Montana and

his dedication to the Mardi Gras Indians and the City of New Orleans.

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Students from Frederick Douglass, McDonogh 35 and NOCCA schools with Professor Medley

In a special presentation in the Council Chamber before the Council meeting, Professor Keith Weldon Medley, author of *We As Freemen*, led a program with narrative and visual presentations that explored Homer Plessy's life and the Plessy v. Ferguson 1896 Supreme Court case.

The case is customarily cited as the beginning of the modern civil rights movement in the United States.

The presentation, co-sponsored by Councilmembers Fielkow and Clarkson and timed to coincide with Black History Month, was attended by students from Frederick Douglass, New Orleans Center for Creative Arts (NOCCA) and McDonogh 35 schools.

Council Vice President Fielkow said, "The Plessy v. Ferguson court case is one of the most important events in our nation's history and drastically affected civil rights in our country for years. New Orleans played a central role in this history and I feel strongly that we must share this rich history with all New Orleans citizens, especially our youth."

"I hope our remembrance of this landmark civil rights case, which originated in New Orleans, will foster a renewed commitment to equal rights and opportunity for all people in our City," commented Council President Clarkson, who since 1992 has been involved in the effort to have the site of Homer Plessy's planned arrest on a New Orleans railcar commemorated.

Descendents of Mr. Plessy and Mr. Ferguson, Keith Plessy and Phoebe Ferguson, came together and formed the Plessy and Ferguson Foundation for Education and Outreach, with a mission to use public programs and the arts to teach the history of civil rights and the role of this particular case in American and New Orleans history.

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



At the suggestion of the Ordinance's lead author Councilmember-at-Large Arnie Fielkow, reconsideration of overriding the Mayor's veto of Ordinance Calendar Number 27,069, requiring compliance with the state's Open Meetings Law relative to the executive branch's competitive selection process for

Councilmembers and community leaders will be invited to participate in the event as well.

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



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New Orleans, LA - February 4, 2009 - In a January 30, 2009 response to the Inspector General's vehicle report, the administration cited ordinance "contradict[ion]" as a reason for failing to comply with the City ordinances prohibiting more than the administration's 50 take-home cars (excluding police and fire vehicles).

In an effort to clear any road-blocks to the administration's compliance with City ordinances related to legally-allowed take-home cars, Councilmembers Midura and Head plan to introduce an Ordinance at the City Council meeting on Thursday, February 5, 2009 that will reconcile the conflicting ordinances related to the domicile of City employees and take-home vehicles.

District "B" Councilmember Stacy Head stated, "This Ordinance should remove any argument that take-home vehicles are appropriate for administration employees residing outside of Orleans Parish."

She further stated that "This is not intended to penalize people for living outside the parish, but instead to ensure that administrative executives who choose to live outside of our Parish do not subject the City to liability, maintenance or gas costs based on that lifestyle decision."

Additionally, in order to draw focus on adherence to the 50 car rule, which would allow take-home vehicles for the 15 or so administrative department heads as well as additional vehicles for the Mayor's own use, the Councilmembers will introduce a Motion which calls on the administration to comply with the existing law and to turn over vehicles in excess of the quota by March 13, 2009.

The Fourth Quarter 2008 Take-Home Vehicle Report furnished to the City Council on January 30, 2009 by the Assistant Chief Administrative Officer of the Equipment Maintenance Division supports the findings of the Inspector General in the Interim Report on the Management of the Administrative Vehicle Fleet that the executive branch total of vehicles far exceeds the permitted quota by ordinance.




Councilmember Head continued, "After careful review it may even be possible to restrict the number of take-home vehicles further than 50. The public needs to remember that these actions have no bearing on pool vehicles. Pool vehicles should be available for City employee use including: the Department of Safety and Permits, Historic District Landmarks Commission (HDLC), and the Mayor's communications staff."

Council passed Ordinance Calendar No. 27,069 and Motion M-08-380, authored by Councilmember Fielkow, requiring that both the Executive and Legislative branches of City Government, in their professional service contracting processes, comply with the Louisiana Open Meetings Law.

Councilmember Arnie Fielkow said, "This legislation calls for further openness and transparency by both the Executive and Legislative branches of City Government when dealing with professional service contracts and the awarding of public dollars. It is critical that this is done in a totally open process to the public."

The Louisiana Attorney General rendered an advisory opinion that meetings involving the awarding of professional services contracts are subject to the Louisiana Open Meetings Law. See the Attorney General's advisory opinion in full <u>here</u>.

Mayor Nagin's Administration requested a reconsideration by the Attorney General of his advisory opinion and the Attorney General reaffirmed its original opinion. See the Attorney General's reaffirmed opinion in full <u>here</u>.

Addressed Take-Home Cars Compliance

The Council passed Motion M-09-49, co-authored by Councilmembers Midura and Head, requesting that the Mayor present on or before March 13th a plan for compliance with the City Code mandating that the executive branch assign no more than 50 take-home cars to employees.

The Motion also states that the plan must: designate which of the current take-home vehicles should be considered the 50 take-home vehicles permitted by the City Code, provide protocol for the disposition of the vehicles in excess of the quota, and establish an official policy to determine which posts within City government will be permitted the use of take-home vehicles.

Julie Schwam Harris of the Mayor's Office of Intergovernmental Relations presented the Administration's opinion on the matter, stating that the Administration is taking a systematic approach to evaluating whether or not 50 take-home vehicles is an adequate number to meet the needs of the Executive Branch.

Adherence to the 50 car rule would allow take-home vehicles for the approximately 15 administrative department heads as well as additional

Supports Funding for the Youth Study Center

The Council voted to override the Mayor's veto of Ordinance Calendar No. 27,303, authored by Councilmember Midura, requiring that prior to expenditure of the 2009 Budget funds appropriated for the Youth Study Center, Capital Projects and Human Services present the conceptual design submission of the Youth Study Center to the Criminal Justice Committee for approval prior to entering into the construction document phase of the project.

Councilmember Shelley Midura said, "We should exercise our responsibility as legislators over the redevelopment of this very important facility. We must collaborate with national experts to

implement national best practices in the redevelopment of this facility to ensure that we have all the necessary tools to improve the lives of youth while advancing the interests of public safety."

Director of Capital Projects Bill Chrisman came before the Council to reaffirm his support of the Ordinance and the incorporation of best practices into the Youth Study Center, and to emphasize the need for additional funding to properly rebuild the facility.

Urged Extension of Recovery Housing Program



The Council passed Resolution R-09-50, co-authored by Councilmembers Fielkow and Midura, urging the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and FEMA take immediate action to extend for one year the Disaster Housing Assistance Program (DHAP).

The program, administered by HUD and FEMA, assists Louisiana residents still in need after Hurricanes

Katrina and Rita. The rental assistance provided under DHAP has been instrumental in allowing Louisiana families to remain in their local communities while the state and federal governments work to stabilize the affordable housing market.

Council Vice President Arnie Fielkow said, "DHAP is currently scheduled to end on February 28th, potentially placing thousands of high-risk families including elderly, disabled and families with children, at risk of homelessness. The short-term extension of this program will allow the state to work with the federal government to assess the needs of the remaining households, assist the transition of families out of the program, and develop a plan to support those with outstanding needs."

Explored Implementation of Wireless Internet in Council Chamber



The Council passed Resolution R-09-51, coauthored by Councilmembers Fielkow and Midura, to assess the feasibility of implementation of wireless internet services in the Council Chamber.

The Resolution requests that the Director of the Council Utilities Regulatory Office investigate the cost and any related issues regarding implementation of wireless internet in the Chamber and report back to the Council's Cable & Telecommunications Committee within 45 days

with a report on these items.

Expedited the Construction of Five Libraries

The Council passed Ordinance Calendar No. 27,324, authored by Councilmember Clarkson, to add five additional projects to the list of approved projects to permit design-build procedures to be implemented, all of them public libraries.

The City of New Orleans previously passed Ordinance Calendar No. 27,059 authorizing 21 projects to be developed through design-build procedures.

The five libraries are Algiers Regional Library, Nora Navra Library, Norman Mayer Library, Robert E. Smith Library and New Orleans East Regional Library.

Director of Capital Projects Bill Chrisman came before the Council to give an explanation of the design-build method which expedites the City's recovery projects by streamlining the contracting process, making it possible for one company to get a combined contract for both the design and build of a project. Chrisman also gave brief updates on the construction of these five new libraries and timelines for completion.

Council President Jacquelyn Brechtel Clarkson said, "The construction of these libraries is a true testament to recovery in New Orleans. Through the design-build method teams of architects and contractors work together to expedite the completion of rebuilding projects throughout the City." As the three Special Orders of Business, the Council welcomed three Mardi Gras Krewes to the chamber.

The New Orleans City Council is authorized to establish standards for open meetings that are equally applicable to the Executive Branch and the Legislative Branch of the City of New Orleans, as long as such standards do not conflict with or supersede the Open Meetings Law.

Our office received an opinion request from you regarding the applicability of Louisiana Open Meetings Law to the competitive selection process for professional service contracts by the Office of the Mayor and the New Orleans City Council (Council). Your letter states that the Mayor of the City of New Orleans, pursuant to Executive Order CRN 08-01, has established Selection Review Panels to evaluate proposed professional service contracts. Your letter also states that the Council proposes to pass a resolution promoting transparency in the awarding of professional service contracts, requiring the Council and the Mayor to comply with Louisiana Open Meetings Law in the process for evaluating and awarding professional service contracts.

In particular, your letter asks us to address:

- Whether meetings which are held pursuant to Executive Order CRN 08-01 are subject to Louisiana Open Meetings Law (La. R.S. 42:4.1 through La. R.S. 42:13); and
- (2) Whether the New Orleans City Council is authorized to establish, through Ordinance or Motion, standards for open meetings that are equally applicable to the Executive Branch and the Legislative Branch of the City of New Orleans, consistent with the Home Rule Charter, including Section 6-308?

The right of access to public information is guaranteed by La.Const. Art. XII, § 3, which provides, "[n]o person shall be denied the right to observe the deliberations of public bodies and examine public documents, except in cases established by law." The Open Meetings Law, which can be found at La. R.S. 42:4.1 et seq., was enacted by the

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Louisiana Legislature to protect and define the constitutional right of access to observe the deliberations of public bodies. The purpose of this body of law is clearly set forth in La. R.S. 42:4.1(A), which provides:

[i]t is essential to the maintenance of a democratic society that public business be performed in an open and public manner and that citizens be advised of and aware of the performance of public officials and the deliberations and decisions that go into the making of public policy. Toward this end, the provisions of R.S. 42:4.1 through R.S. 42:10 shall be construed liberally.

As provided for in La. R.S. 42:5, every meeting of a public body is required to be open to the public, unless closed pursuant to La. R.S. 42:6, R.S. 42:6.1 or R.S. 42:6.2.

A meeting is defined as the convening of a quorum of a public body to deliberate or act on a matter over which the public body has supervision, control, jurisdiction, or advisory power. La. R.S. 42:4.2(A)(1). A "public body" is defined as:

village, town, and city governing authorities; parish governing authorities; school boards and boards of levee and port commissioners; boards of publicly operated utilities; planning, zoning, and airport commissions; and any other state, parish. municipal, or special district boards, commissions, or authorities, and those of any political subdivision thereof, where such body possesses policy making, advisory, or administrative functions, including any committee or subcommittee of any of these bodies enumerated in this paragraph.

La. R.S. 42:4.2(A)(2) [Emphasis added].

Your first question asks us whether or not the entity that meets pursuant to Executive Order CRN 08-01 is subject to the Open Meetings Law. This requires an analysis of whether or not it qualifies as a "public body" under the definition in La. R.S. 42:4.2(A)(2).

Section 6-308 of the Home Rule Charter for the City of New Orleans gives the Mayor the authority to establish a process for awarding contracts for professional service, which provides, in pertinent part:

(5)(b) Contracts for professional services administered by the offices, departments, boards, and other agencies of the Executive Branch shall be awarded on the basis of a competitive selection process which shall be established by executive order of the Mayor.

Section 9 of Executive Order CRN 08-01, entitled "Selection Review Panels," provides that these Panels are "established for the purpose of conducting an independent, objective evaluation of proposals for the provision of professional services." Depending

on the monetary amount of the contract awarded, certain members are designated to participate in the Selection Review Panels. The Executive Order provides that "all discussion and deliberations by the Selection Review Panel in the evaluating and ranking of any proposal shall be deemed confidential, although the completed evaluation forms are available to the public as public records." Executive Order CRN 08-01, Section 9(L).

Black's Law Dictionary (8th Ed. 2004) defines a committee as "[a] subordinate group to which a deliberative assembly or other organization refers business for consideration, investigation, oversight, or action" and an advisory committee as "[a] committee formed to make suggestions to some other body or to an official." From the description of the Selection Review Panel in Executive Order CRN 08-01, they are a group to which the Mayor looks to for recommendations or suggestions regarding proposals for professional contracts. They evaluate and consider contract proposals for the provision of professional services submitted to the City of New Orleans, and provide recommendations, which the Mayor can agree with or reject. They clearly qualify as a committee under the definition provided above. The definition of "public bodies" in La. R.S. 42:4.2(A)(2) includes committees created by municipal authorities or city governing authorities.

The City of New Orleans operates under a Home Rule Charter, which provides for a Mayor-Council form of government. Article I, Section 1-102, Home Rule Charter of the City of New Orleans. The Powers and Duties of the Mayor, as described by Article IV, Section 4-206, include, but are not limited to, oversight of the activities of boards and other agencies of City government; enforcement of the provisions of the Home Rule Charter, City ordinances, and all other laws; appointing positions relating to City business, including the Chief Administrative Officer and the City Attorney; submitting an operating budget to the Council for the City; and *signing contracts for the City*. The Selection Review Panels assist with the evaluations of contract proposals for the provision of professional services. Signing contracts for the City is an enumerated power of the Mayor. The Selection Review Panels are committees of a municipal authority under these particular circumstances, where they assist in the exercise of a mayoral function, and are not dissimilar in function from a planning or zoning commission.

Our office has previously considered the nature of committees created by mayors, and has required certain committees comply with Open Meetings Law. In Atty. Gen. Op. No. 79-1392, our office opined that a committee established by the mayor of the City of Bastrop was a public body required to comply with Louisiana's Open Meetings Law, where such a committee "is appointed by the chief executive of a political subdivision of the State and has been granted policy making and advisory functions in the extremely important area of public finance." Our office opined that the committee appointed by the mayor, in function, could be classified as a subcommittee of the municipal governing authority.

A mayoral advisory committee was required to comply with Open Meetings Law in Atty. Gen. Op. No. 05-0424, where the committee was established by the mayor to provide guidance on matters pertaining to the Police Depaitment in Youngsville. Our office stated, for the purposes of the Open Meetings Law, the meaning of "public body" included a municipal authority with advisory functions. Similarly, in Atty. Gen. Op. No. 89-481, our office stated that a committee appointed by the mayor as chief executive officer was a subcommittee of a municipal authority under La. R.S. 42:4.2(A)(2), and a "public body" under the Open Meetings Law. Also, in Atty. Gen. Op. No. 95-313, our office found that a citizen committee established and appointed by the mayor for discussion, research and advice was subject to the Open Meetings Law.

Because there are no Louisiana cases directly on point, we note the position taken by Florida courts dealing with a similar issue. In Silver Express Company v. District Board of Lower Tribunal Trustees of Miami-Dade Community College, a contractor had submitted an unsuccessful proposal to provide flight training services and alleged violation of Florida's Open Meetings Law in their proposal consideration process. 691 So.2d 1099 (Fla. 3d DCA 1997). In this case, a committee was appointed, composed of college staff and one outside individual, to meet and evaluate the responses to the request for proposals. Where the committee served to "weed through the various" proposals, to determine which were acceptable and to rank them accordingly," the court found they were subject to Florida's Open Meetings Laws. Id. at 1100.1 Similarly, in Leach-Wells v. City of Bradenton, a selection committee was appointed to review proposals received by the City in response to a bid for proposals for a construction project. 734 So.2d 1168 (Fla. 2d DCA 1999) The function of the committee was to rank the top three firms, who would then make presentations to the City Council, and the Council would select the firm to construct the project. Where the committee was comprised of the city clerk, a local engineer, the public works director and a city councilman, it was not disputed that the committee was subject to Florida's Sunshine Law [Open Meetings and Public Records Law]. Id. at 1169. While this office recognizes the non-binding nature of case law in other jurisdictions, we nevertheless find these cases instructive.

Considering the importance of contracts for professional services awarded by the City of New Orleans, the importance of conducting public business in a transparent and open manner, and in light of previous Attorney General opinions, it is the opinion of this office that the Selection Review Panels described in Executive Order CRN 08-01 are public entities as defined by La. R.S. 42:4.2. Therefore, under the facts you presented in your request, the Selection Review Panels must comply with Open Meetings Law in evaluating proposals for the provision of professional services.

¹ Section 286.011(1) Florida Statutes (1995) provides: All meetings of any board or commission of any state agency or authority of any county, municipal corporation, or political subdivision, except as otherwise provided in the Constitution, at which official acts are to be taken are declared to be public meetings open to the public at all times, and no resolution, rule, or formal action shall be considered binding except as taken or made at such meeting. The board or commission must provide reasonable notice of all such meetings.

Notwithstanding our opinion that the Selection Review Panels are subject to the Open Meetings Law, the Panels may conduct portions of their meetings in executive session, if such executive session are conducted in accordance with La. R.S. 42:6.1. We note that the Panels' ability to hold executive session is governed by La. R.S. 42:6.1, and not by any executive order of the mayor.

We note that La. R.S. 42:6.1(A) provides, in pertinent part:

A public body may hold an executive session pursuant to R.S. 42:6 for one or more of the following reasons:

(1) Discussion of the character, professional competence, or physical or mental health of a person, provided that such person is notified in writing at least twenty-four hours before the meeting and that such person may require that such discussion be held at an open meeting, and provided that nothing in this Subsection shall permit an executive session for discussion of the appointment of a person to a public body. In cases of extraordinary emergency, written notice to such person shall not be required; however, the public body shall give such notice as it deems appropriate and circumstances permit.

(2) Strategy sessions or negotiations with respect to collective bargaining, prospective litigation after formal written demand, or litigation when an open meeting would have a detrimental effect on the bargaining or litigating position of the public body.

[...]

(10) Or any other matters now provided for or as may be provided for by the legislature.

Our office has also recognized the obligation to discuss any information which is "confidential" in executive session. As our office stated in Atty. Gen. Op. No. 05-0065, "[i]f the records are subject to a privacy claim or are privileged under the Public Records Act, then La. R.S. 42:6.1(A)(9) [which exception is now 42:6.1(A)(10)] may be interpreted to authorize an executive session to discuss the contents of the privileged records." In Atty. Gen. Op. No. 88-91. our office addressed the applicability of the Public Records Act to information solicited by a state agency through a request for proposal, as provided for by La. R.S. 39:1503. Our office stated that for general purposes, "bids for public contracts are matters of public record and become such upon receipt by the state." *Id.* However, citing Atty. Gen. Op. No. 87-320, our office also noted that "certain financial information must be exempted from disclosure due to

privacy considerations guaranteed by Article I, § 5 of the Louisiana Constitution of 1974."²

Our office addressed proprietary, financial and statistical information which may be protected from disclosure in Atty. Gen. Op. No. 82-860, in which our office stated:

The threshold determination is whether a reasonable expectation of privacy exists against disclosure of information. If so, the public interest in obtaining the document must be weighed against the interest in privacy. *Webb v. City of Shreveport*, 371 So.2d 316 (La.App. 2nd Cir. 1979), writ denied 374 So.2d 657.

Proprietary, financial and statistical information may 'pertain to the business of the private person, firm or corporation' (R.S. 44:4(3)) and may therefore be confidential. If in the exercise of reasonable discretion by the responsible public officer, specific information contained in files in the custody of the Department is classified as confidential in nature, then it is out opinion that such record or the parts thereof so classified come within the scope of R.S. 44:4(3).

However, we note that any discussions in executive session must be limited to what is permitted by the Open Meetings Law. As required by La. R.S. 42:6, "no final or binding action may be taken during an executive session." Therefore, although a person or firm may be properly discussed in executive session for one of the reasons authorized by the Open Meetings Law, any binding action taken with respect to such person or firm must be taken in an open meeting.

Your second question asks us to address whether the New Orleans City Council is authorized to establish, through Ordinance or Motion, standards for open meetings that are equally applicable to the Executive Branch and the Legislative Branch of the City of New Orleans, consistent with the Home Rule Charter, including Section 6-308, pertaining to contracts to which the City is a party. The Louisiana Constitution provides:

A home rule charter adopted under this Section shall provide the structure and organization, powers, and functions of the government of the local governmental subdivision, which may include the exercise of any power and performance of any function necessary, requisite, or proper for the management of its affairs, not denied by general law or inconsistent with this constitution.

² This opinion also noted the applicability of La. R S 44:4 as the basis for exempted certain financial information, which exempts from the Public Records Act, "...any records...in the custody or control of any officer, employee, agent, or agency of the state whose duties and functions are to investigate...the business of any person, firm or corporation in this state, when the records...pertain to the business of the private person, firm, or corporation and are in their nature confidential."

La.Const. Art. VI, §5(E) [Emphasis added].

As our office stated in Atty. Gen. Op. No. 02-0258, a Home Rule Charter may impose more stringent requirements than the Louisiana Constitution or general law, but may not conflict with or supersede either.

Consistent with the view that the Selection Review Panels are subject to Open Meetings Law, the New Orleans City Council is authorized to establish standards for open meetings that are equally applicable to the Executive Branch and the Legislative Branch of the City of New Orleans, as long as such standards do not conflict with or supersede the Louisiana Constitution or the Open Meetings Law. It is important to note, as previously mentioned, that Section 6-308 of the Home Rule Charter of the City of New Orleans gives the Mayor of New Orleans the authority to establish a competitive selection process by executive order for contracts for professional services administered by the offices, departments, boards, and other agencies of the Executive Branch. The Council's proposals to pass resolutions promoting transparency in the awarding of professional service contracts is permissible because the Louisiana Constitution and the Louisiana Revised Statutes require transparency from any public body falling within the definition of La. R.S. 42:4.2(A)(2), and a committee created pursuant to an executive order authorized by the Home Rule Charter must comply with requirements imposed by Louisiana law.

New Orleans, LA - February 4, 2009 - In a January 30, 2009 response to the Inspector General's vehicle report, the administration cited ordinance "contradict[ion]" as a reason for failing to comply with the City ordinances prohibiting more than the administration's 50 take-home cars (excluding police and fire vehicles).

In an effort to clear any road-blocks to the administration's compliance with City ordinances related to legally-allowed take-home cars, Councilmembers Midura and Head plan to introduce an Ordinance at the City Council meeting on Thursday, February 5, 2009 that will reconcile the conflicting ordinances related to the domicile of City employees and take-home vehicles.

District "B" Councilmember Stacy Head stated, "This Ordinance should remove any argument that take-home vehicles are appropriate for administration employees residing outside of Orleans Parish."

She further stated that "This is not intended to penalize people for living outside the parish, but instead to ensure that administrative executives who choose to live outside of our Parish do not subject the City to liability, maintenance or gas costs based on that lifestyle decision."

Additionally, in order to draw focus on adherence to the 50 car rule, which would allow take-home vehicles for the 15 or so administrative department heads as well as additional vehicles for the Mayor's own use, the Councilmembers will introduce a Motion which calls on the administration to comply with the existing law and to turn over vehicles in excess of the quota by March 13, 2009.

The Fourth Quarter 2008 Take-Home Vehicle Report furnished to the City Council on January 30, 2009 by the Assistant Chief Administrative Officer of the Equipment Maintenance Division supports the findings of the Inspector General in the Interim Report on the Management of the Administrative Vehicle Fleet that the executive branch total of vehicles far exceeds the permitted quota by ordinance.



Councilmember Head continued, "After careful review it may even be possible to restrict the number of take-home vehicles further than 50. The public needs to remember that these actions have no bearing on pool vehicles. Pool vehicles should be available for City employee use including: the Department of Safety and Permits, Historic District Landmarks Commission (HDLC), and the Mayor's communications staff."

Special Development Projects & Economic Development Committee To Address Tax Increment Financing Policy In Hearing Tomorrow Morning

TIF is a tool to use future gains in taxes to finance the current improvements that will create those gains. Tax Increment Financing creates funding for public projects that may otherwise be unaffordable to localities, and dedicates tax increments within a certain defined district to finance debt issued to pay for projects. TIF is designed to channel funding toward improvements in distressed or underdeveloped areas where development would not otherwise occur.

In 1988 the State of Louisiana passed legislation known as the Louisiana Tax Development Act, which allows parishes to development and implement TIF programs. Since 1988 the City of New Orleans has only implemented two TIF projects. TIF projects are nationally known and frequently used to stimulate economic development within selected areas of a community.

The City of New Orleans engaged PGAV Urban Consulting to review the current draft TIF policies and procedures that were developed in May 2008.

New Orleans, LA - March 3, 2009 - New Orleans City Attorney Penya Moses-Fields has informed the City Council that Councilmember emails have been made available to local lawyer, Tracie Washington, at her request. Washington filed a public records request for these documents, but instead of working through the City Attorney's Office, which normally reviews public records requests, Washington obtained these records from Sanitation Department Director Veronica White.

The release of the emails was done without the Council's knowledge or consent and without prior review of the content for information of a privileged and confidential nature. This content might include attorney-client communications, the personal information of constituents, information on pending litigation, and information relating to the federal investigation surrounding New Orleans Affordable Homeownership (NOAH).

Today, the City Council's special counsel, Herman, Herman, Katz & Cotlar, notified Councilmembers that the release of these Council emails may constitute a serious breach of legal rights and protections afforded the City Council, its constituents, and the City of New Orleans.

The City Council is expected to take the matter up in Executive Session Thursday to decide how to best protect the interests of the public, the City, and the Council.


"Hurricane protection is not just about levees, it is about rebuilding our coastline, and large scale diversions

are the key to that," said Council President Clarkson.

Large scale diversions would redirect the Mississippi River to flow through parts of South Louisiana, carrying sediment and fresh water with it - both of which sustain and rebuild wetlands. These diversions are widely seen by experts across the country as key to restoring Louisiana's coastline and to building real hurricane protection.

Councilmember Clarkson continued, "The crucial requirement for large-scale diversions designed to both maintain navigation and provide critical elements of restoration and protection is essential. The support of opinions from engineers and scientists throughout the country mandates this conclusion with little margin for dispute."

Such diversions were not necessary in the 1800s and early 1900s because the Mississippi River naturally spread freshwater and sediment throughout southeast Louisiana, building and sustaining the swamps and marshes. However, as the Mississippi River was contained with channels, this spreading ceased. Now, the river's freshwater, nutrients and

New Orleans, LA - March 12, 2009 - This morning, Orleans Civil District Court Judge Lloyd Medley, ordered local lawyer Tracie Washington to hand over, within 24 hours, compact discs containing City Councilmember emails requested via public records requests and made available to her by Sanitation Department Director Veronica White.

The release of the emails was done without the Council's knowledge or consent and without prior review of the content for information of a privileged and confidential nature.

The Judge's order to turn over the email correspondence mirrors repeated requests made over the last few weeks to Tracie Washington by legal counsel for the New Orleans City Council. The order also requires that Ms. Washington fully disclose to Judge Medley the identities of those individuals with whom she shared the email correspondence.

In this morning's preliminary injunction hearing, the Council's special counsel Herman, Herman, Katz & Cotlar presented oral argument and affidavits from Councilmembers, a former City Attorney and lawyers currently representing the City Council to support the Council's argument. A representative of the current City Attorney's Office made oral argument in support of the City Council position.

The City Council's legal counsel argued that the release of these Council emails may constitute a serious breach of legal rights and protections afforded the City Council, its constituents and the City of New Orleans.

Judge Medley's ruling orders that Ms. Washington turn over to the court all email and other correspondence that she has received. The Judge's order also continues the prohibition of Ms. Washington's public release of the emails. Judge Medley will begin review of all correspondence to determine what content is privileged and what content can be released to the public. Following the Judge's review, he will meet with lawyers and share his findings.



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New Orleans, LA - March 18, 2009 -Council President Jacquelyn Brechtel Clarkson will introduce a resolution at tomorrow's Council Meeting that calls upon the City of New Orleans to support the construction of large-scale land diversions in an effort to sustain and rebuild Louisiana's coastal wetlands.

The Resolution also calls upon the City to take a lead in advocating for land

diversions in ways it has historically left to other coastal Louisiana parishes.

"Rebuilding coastal wetlands is the most important means we have of saving our City from catastrophic hurricanes especially the parts of the City most vulnerable to a Gulf storm surge, including the Historic Lower Ninth Ward, Venetian Isles, New Orleans East, and the West Bank," Clarkson said.

She continued, "Some say the City doesn't have a role to play here, that this is solely a state or federal issue. But they are wrong. As elected officials, we need to step up to the plate as other parishes have and demand more than just levees. We need to demand that rebuilding our coast is a priority."

Large-scale diversions would redirect the Mississippi River to flow through parts of South Louisiana, carrying sediment and fresh water with it - both of which sustain and rebuild wetlands. Such diversions are widely seen by experts across the country as key to restoring Louisiana's coastline. Louisiana's Coastal Restoration and Protection Authority has advocated for the construction of land diversions since the release of its Masterplan, which was commissioned by the Louisiana Legislature in 2005. Two weeks ago, the Council President represented the City of New Orleans at the Mississippi River Fresh Water Diversion Summit in New Orleans, where she publicly urged the Corps of Engineers to consider using large scale diversions to restore Louisiana's coastline. She also urged the Corps not to proceed without including the interests of Louisiana's navigation industry.

Councilmember Clarkson said, "The Corps needs to listen to South Louisianians. Levees are important, of course. But if we expect real, sustainable protection from massive storms, we have got to expand our focus to rebuilding wetlands. And we need every vested interest at the table."

Land diversions were not necessary in the 1800s and early 1900s because the Mississippi River naturally spread freshwater and sediment throughout southeast Louisiana, building and sustaining swamps and marshes. But as the Mississippi River was contained with channels, this spreading ceased. Now, the river's freshwater, nutrients and the sediment are funneled straight into the Gulf of Mexico.

In the coming weeks, Council President Clarkson will ask the City Council to approve an ordinance forming a special committee to address coastal restoration and land diversions. This committee's work will result in an action plan for involving Orleans Parish leaders in advocating for coastal restoration.

Coastal Louisiana has lost more than 1,875 square miles of land between 1932 and 2000. Eighty years ago, New Orleans was 54 miles from the Gulf of Mexico. If no effort is made to restore the coastline, experts predict New Orleans will be less than 20 miles from the Gulf by 2050.

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Supported Louisiana Coastal Restoration

The Council passed Resolution R-09-101, authored by Councilmember Clarkson, supporting efforts to investigate the benefits of large-scale land diversions as a means of restoring Louisiana's coastline.

Large-scale diversions would redirect the Mississippi River to flow through parts of South Louisiana, carrying sediment and fresh water with it - both of which sustain and rebuild wetlands. Such diversions are widely seen by experts across the country as key to restoring Louisiana's coastline.

Councilmember-at-Large Jacquelyn Brechtel Clarkson said, "Rebuilding coastal wetlands is the most important means we have of saving our City from catastrophic hurricanes. As elected officials, we need to take the lead and make rebuilding our coast a priority."

Supported Allocation of Housing and Urban Development Grant Funds

The Council passed Resolution R-09-126, authored by Councilmember Clarkson, calling on the Mayor's Office to expedite the allocation of the \$11 million in Housing and Urban Development (HUD) grant money.

HUD has issued three extensions of the deadline to commit the money to New

Orleans. The City of New Orleans is in danger of losing the funds if it does not allocate this funding to specific affordable housing initiatives.

Councilmember Clarkson said, "There is a severe shortage of affordable housing in New Orleans and these grants represent an excellent opportunity to assist the many initiatives dedicated to providing affordable housing in the City. The allocation of these funds to affordable housing programs will assist in the revitalization of neighborhoods and the overall recovery of the City."

Senator Mary Landrieu has offered her support in finding areas of affordable housing to which this funding can be dedicated.

Supported Down Zoning in Gert Town



The Council passed Motion M-09-124, authored by Councilmember Head, directing the City Planning Commission to conduct a public hearing to consider an amendment to the Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance aimed at down zoning the industrial areas in the residential parts of Gert Town.

This Motion will prohibit any new industrial uses from establishing in the neighborhood, bounded by S. Carrollton Avenue, Walmsley Ave., S. Jefferson Davis, and the Pontchartrain

Expressway.

Councilmember Head said, "Currently, Gert Town is experiencing industrial uses in their community which inhibit neighborhood development and growth. It is important that we respond to the needs of the City's individual communities and neighborhoods public hearings will give the residents of Gert Town the opportunity to participate in discussions relative to industrial uses in their neighborhood and potential improvements in their quality of life."

Addressed Total Sentencing Alternative Program



Dwight Richards came before the Council to give a presentation on the Total Sentencing Alternative Program (TSAP) Ankle Bracelets.

Richards, Vice President of Operations for TSAP, discussed the benefits of TSAP Ankle Bracelets and the purpose of the program, along with ideas for potential program improvements.

Dwight Richards

The TSAP ankle bracelets are

recommended for offenders of non-violent crimes and have been proved to be effective when appropriate parameters are set for each individual offender.



New Orleans District Attorney Leon Cannizzaro was also present and expressed his opinions about the TSAP program.

Cannizzaro emphasized the importance of TSAP and law enforcement working closely together to ensure that if an offender commits a violation, that offender is apprehended in a timely fashion.

Lieutenant Colonel Jerry Sneed, Director of Homeland Security for the City of New Orleans, also commented on the TSAP ankle bracelet program, stating that cooperation among all parties is a necessity and that police officers, judges and TSAP monitors must work together to make the program safe and effective.


Pending Litigation

"With summer and the end of the school year upon us, it is extremely important that as many NORD playgrounds and pools as possible be open and ready for our youth and all New Orleanians. Our citizens are weary of disagreements between governmental entities three and a half years after Hurricane Katrina"

Fielkow continues, "All meeting participants, from FEMA to the state to the city, should be prepared to answer specific questions about why the rebuild/repair of recreational facilities are not being fully funded, whether any funds are being held up, what supplemental funding sources might be used on top of FEMA funds to expedite the openings, and what we can do now to quicken the rebuild/repair of our recreational facilities."

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

"With Louisiana historically ranking at, or near, the bottom in national health and health care delivery statistics, it is disheartening that the State wants to reject extra funding for health care delivery," said Fielkow. "In New Orleans alone, we still have no hospital in the East, the potential new LSU/VA complex is years from completion and we are struggling with a hurting population that has limited access to affordable health care. While I understand the budget challenges faced by the State, the rejection of helpful federal dollars to support this struggling health care system is not a path we should follow."

The federal stimulus health care funds would extend the period of coverage for Transitional Medical Assistance (TMA) health care benefits to those leaving welfare and entering the workforce, and would also provide more money for Disproportionate Share Hospital (DSH). DSH is a critical funding component in the Charity Hospital system.

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

"My intent is for the Council to become another voice urging the Corps to take a step back from their current plan and reevaluate what is best for the long-term, sustainable storm protection New Orleans needs," Clarkson said. "I believe the Corps is mistakenly choosing a 'cheaper' plan that will actually put our area at greater risk for dramatic costs in life and property."

In redesigning the London Ave., Orleans Ave., and 17th St. canals, the Corps favors what is known as "Option 1." This plan would retain existing deficient canal walls, build new pumping stations at the mouth of each canal to handle storm surge from rising water, and rely on Sewerage and Water Board pumping stations at the opposite end of each canal to handle routine drainage. The Corps estimates this plan will cost \$800 million.

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
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A proposed "Option 2," which the Corps has rejected as too costly, would involve the deepening and repaving of canal walls and the construction of new all-purpose pumping stations at each of these canals to handle both rising and falling water. The Corps estimates this plan will cost \$3.4 billion.




"I am concerned that Option 1 will provide insufficient protection if we have major rainfall accompanied by a significant rise in water levels within the canals, which we all know is common during major storms," Clarkson said.

The New Orleans Sewerage and Water Board, the Jefferson Parish Council, and the Louisiana Coastal Protection and Restoration Authority have each authored resolutions calling upon the Corps to submit their plans and cost estimates to independent, third-party review.

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

Following Hurricane Katrina in 2005, much of the economic development infrastructure in the Upper Gulf Coast Region collapsed and languished; business-support services that were desperately needed by international and domestic businesses that desired to participate in the recovery were not available, much less available in one place. As an integral member of the business community, the World Trade Center of New Orleans (WTC-NO) immediately responded by creating the "1st Stop for International Business Services Program", with the help of local universities; this initiative has been adopted by other World Trade Centers. The importance of "1st Stop" to the City of New Orleans has been recognized by the New Orleans City Council.

Concurrent with that initiative, WTC-NO members consistently heard from many international and domestic visitors that it was difficult to accumulate, much less understand, the many complex incentives that were offered by the City, the State and the Federal Government. They wanted a single portal that provided easy access to basic information about taxes, incentives and business formation so that they could consider post-Katrina business opportunities that grew from the Upper Gulf Coast recovery efforts. Some Members of the New Orleans City Council also had expressed frustration with the same problem.

In response, the World Trade Center of New Orleans offered to develop a basic information manual, coupled with a related training session, for those in the New Orleans economic development community, including City Council Members and Administration officials and their staff, who need to know the type of incentives available and where more information can be found. The goals of the manual included (1) enabling any company that wanted easy and immediate access to basic information without the necessity of meetings or telephone calls, as well as, (2) ensuring that all City officials and staff, who received requests for information with a common understanding of these benefits and facts.

In response to that need and consistent with its own economic development role, the WTC-NO offers the City of New Orleans a basic orientation and training for anyone with a need to respond to inquiries from constituents and others regarding business and recovery incentives; it also suggests that public officials (e.g. Council Members, department heads, to administration officials, etc.) participate so that a common level of understanding regarding the availability of federal, state, and local incentives is achieved.

The Basic Legal Guide to Doing Business in Louisiana is intended to generally address legal topics pertaining to operating a business in Louisiana. It is not intended as legal advice; readers should consult a local attorney before initiating business operations in Louisiana.

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

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
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

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New Orleans, LA - April 7, 2009 -Today, the New Orleans City Council Youth & Recreation Committee, led by Chair Arnie Fielkow and Councilmember Cynthia Willard-Lewis, directed FEMA, the New Orleans Recreation Department (NORD), and the State of Louisiana to work together over the next month towards the re-opening of more NORD facilities by this summer. A Youth and Recreation Committee meeting will be held on

May 22nd where the parties must account for their progress.

"Like all New Orleans citizens, I am frustrated hearing bureaucratic excuses and explanations about why many of our recreational facilities are still not rebuilt nearly 4 years after Katrina," says Council Vice President Fielkow. "I have asked FEMA, NORD and the State to come back to the Council in May, hopefully ready to announce that additional parks and playgrounds will be ready by this summer."

At today's committee meeting, the following 3 points of progress towards expediting the re-opening of city recreational facilities were noted:

- FEMA officials will now be embedded within the city administration to expedite the reimbursement process;

- No later than June 17, 2009, FEMA has pledged to open the remaining 11 FEMA trailer park sites that were temporarily occupying NORD property. FEMA has already reopened 4 former trailer sites;

- FEMA pledged in writing to work with the City and the State to ensure that the maximum federal funding is provided for each city recreation project


The Maccabiah is an international sports competition similar to the Olympics, and is the third largest sporting event in the world. This

Special Development Projects & Economic Development Committee To Hear Final Proposals for New Orleans Tax Increment Financing Policy on Thursday Morning

What: The Special Development Projects & Economic Development Committee hearing will review recommendations for codifying regulations that will establish a new, citywide New Orleans Tax Increment Financing (TIF) policy. The TIF policy is expected to institute conditions under which the City of New Orleans will consider approving TIF proposals.

In 1988, the State of Louisiana passed legislation known as the Louisiana Tax Development Act, which allows parishes to development and implement TIF programs. Since then, the City of New Orleans has only implemented two TIF projects. TIF projects are nationally known and frequently used to stimulate economic development within selected areas of a community.

TIF is a tool to use future gains in taxes to finance the current improvements that will create those gains. Tax Increment Financing creates funding for public projects that may otherwise be unaffordable to localities, and dedicates tax increments within a certain defined district to finance debt issued to pay for projects. TIF is designed to channel funding toward improvements in distressed or underdeveloped areas where development would not otherwise occur.

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



Fielkow was joined in New York for meetings with Six Flags officials by District "E" Councilmember Cynthia Willard-Lewis, Mayor C. Ray Nagin, and City Attorney Penya-Moses Fields.

New Orleans City Council The redevelopment of the Six Flags theme park property in New Orleans East, formerly known as Jazzland, was the primary point of discussion with both Six Flags officials and the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) as the City attempts to gain site control of the property so that a catalytic redevelopment can occur in this important part of New Orleans. Other critical recovery issues, such as expediting the FEMA reimbursement process for public facilities and the redevelopment of the Big Four public housing developments, were also addressed.

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Fielkow

"I was pleased with the conversations I had with Obama Administration officials on key recovery topics. I sense an urgency in DC to work with us to move our recovery forward," said Vice President Fielkow. "Like many other city officials, I emphasized the need for FEMA and HUD to expedite the rebuilding efforts in our city notwithstanding the national economic challenges currently being faced."

In Washington, DC Fielkow met with newlyappointed Gulf Coast Recovery Coordinator Janet Woodka, officials in the Department of Housing and

Urban Development (HUD), Senator Mary Landrieu and Congressman Joseph Cao.

District "E" Councilmember Cynthia Willard-Lewis, along with other city officials, including Councilmember Fielkow, Mayor C. Ray Nagin and Penya Moses-Fields, met with Six Flags officials in New York on Wednesday.

Councilmember Willard-Lewis said, "The purpose of this one-day trip is part of an attempt to protect the City's financial investment in the Jazzland project in the event that the Six Flag Corporation files for re-organization. My primary purpose for the meeting was to exercise my fiduciary responsibilities with respect to the citizens of New Orleans related to this development."

The meeting in New York involved Six Flags President Mark Shapiro, and centered around Six Flags' legal and financial obligations to the City of New Orleans and the need for New Orleans to

swiftly redevelop the New Orleans East site. Following a nearly 90 minute meeting with Six Flags, it is the City's position that it will immediately review and pursue all appropriate legal actions available to it against Six Flags so as to protect the City's legal position. It is anticipated that a lawsuit against Six Flags will be filed in the coming days.

While these legal proceedings are pending, the City intends to aggressively go forward with all potential redevelopment options so that a sustainable, successful and catalytic development can be brought to the community.

Vice President Fielkow added, "It became quite apparent to us during the negotiations today that, after nearly two years of discussions, we will be unable to reach an agreement with Six Flags which would be beneficial to the City of New Orleans. Six Flags representatives made it abundantly clear to us that they are experiencing significant financial distress but, at



the same time, we emphasized that it is our obligation as City representatives to pursue all options, including legal, which would best protect the citizens of New Orleans."

"It is our intention to immediately pursue litigation against Six Flags, while at the same time aggressively pursuing all redevelopment options which would be beneficial to our citizens. Our discussions with Six Flags were direct and candid, and we are hopeful that a beneficial outcome can be achieved."

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New Orleans, LA - April 22, 2009 -At tomorrow's regular City Council meeting, Council Vice President Fielkow will introduce a Resolution that urges the Administration, pursuant to the Home Rule Charter, to require full disclosure of all subcontractors and individuals having a financial interest in any professional services contracts with the City. The Resolution further calls on the Louisiana State Legislature to enact legislation

requiring full disclosure of all subcontractors and individuals having a financial interest in any contracts issued pursuant to state public bid laws.

"It is in the best interests of our citizens to know who is performing work on behalf of their government. With resources so tight right now, it is important to account for every dollar spent in our city," says Fielkow. "Subcontractors should be able to withstand the same level of public scrutiny as primary contractors, and the public would be well-served by knowing the identity of all subcontractors involved in city contracts. This Resolution broadens the public transparency already required by all contractors doing business with the City Council to cover the entire city government."

This Resolution, R-09-181, broadens the scope of Resolution R-05-H which was unanimously passed by the City Council after Hurricane Katrina in 2005. That Resolution, R-05-H, required that all individuals and entities receiving a contract from the City of New Orleans related to the rebuilding of New Orleans must certify the identity of all individuals and entities with a financial interest in the contract, including all subcontractors, consultants and finder's fees incurred, paid or promised. The certification had to be made to the City before the contract could be executed.

The New Orleans City Council, led by Councilman Fielkow, has already adopted Rule 45 of its Rules and Regulations

providing for the full disclosure of any individuals or entities involved in work on City Council-issued contracts. This new Resolution, R-09-181, requests that the City of New Orleans adhere to this same standard of transparency, and broaden the scope of the original Resolution to include ALL contracts with the City, not just those pertaining to rebuilding.

Additionally, R-09-181 seeks to equalize the disclosure requirements for all contractors and subcontractors holding city contracts. Under current city law, excluding City Council contracts, only Disadvantage Business Enterprises (DBE's) subcontractors are required to be disclosed, while non-DBE's are not subject to general disclosure requirements. This results in inequitable disclosure practices for DBE's.

"Every enterprise seeking to do business with the City of New Orleans should be held to the same standards. It is inequitable that we are holding minority- and womenowned businesses to a higher degree of scrutiny," adds Fielkow. "The playing field needs to be equalized so that every contractor and subcontractor is held to the same standards."

Councilman Fielkow plans to introduce R-09-181 during tomorrow's City Council meeting.



Additionally, the Council passed Ordinances supporting reforms to the rules governing the renewal process and fees for Certificates of Public Necessity and Convenience, and repealing the \$2.00 gasoline surcharge for taxicabs and Disabled Friendly Taxis (DFT).

The Council also heard a presentation from State Senator JP Morrell who presented a check to New Orleans Recreation Department and honored the graduating classes of 2009 from several local universities.

The Council held an Executive Session to discuss recent developments in pending litigation concerning the review and release of the City Council's email correspondence over a three-year period.

Held Executive Session



The City Council held an Executive Session to discuss recent developments in pending litigation concerning the review and release of the City Council's email correspondence over a three-year period. Due to the confidentiality of the issues, they were taken up in a duly noticed Executive Session closed to the public.

Special Counsel for the City Council, Steven J. Lane of Herman, Herman, Katz and Cotlar addressed the Council about the current status of the pending litigation and to discuss that the

Council has been recently put in possession of its email correspondence. Lane informed Councilmembers that legal counsel, with assistance from a technology expert, is preparing the emails into a readable format and determining which documents are subject to the Public Records Law. As soon as the review is complete, the documents will be made available for public release.

Lane said, "The Council has always strongly supported the release of records that the public is entitled to. We are moving expeditiously toward release of the documents. Until recently, the Council has simply not had complete access to its emails to review them for release."

Requested Attorney General's Opinion on Proposed State Law



Councilmember at Large Clarkson The Council passed Resolution R-09-177, authored by Councilmember Clarkson, requesting an opinion from the Attorney General of the State of Louisiana, regarding the legality of Senate Bill 75, which may be in conflict with the City Charter, the Louisiana Constitution and/or other applicable law.

District 4 Senator Edwin Murray has filed Senate Bill 75 for the regular 2009 session of the Louisiana legislature, a bill that would require that "any master plan which has the force of law in Orleans parish shall require voter approval prior to implementation of any provisions, policies or

strategies contained in the adopted master plan."

The recently voter-approved Master Plan force of law Charter Amendment clearly outlines a multi-step process by which the Master Plan shall acquire the force of law, including that the Council must receive the Master Plan and either adopt it, reject it, or propose modifications.

The Resolution requests that the Attorney General address whether or not the provisions set forth in Senate Bill 75 improperly usurp the City of New

Orleans Home Rule authority and/or whether Senate Bill 75 is violative of the of the City's Home Rule Charter, the Louisiana Constitution, and/or other applicable law.

Council President Jacquelyn Brechtel Clarkson said, "In a city-wide ballot that coincided with the 2008 presidential election - giving us significant voter turn-out - a majority of New Orleans voters approved an amendment to the Home Rule Charter requiring a master plan with the force of law. We must not allow state-wide lawmakers to step in and tamper with that result."

She continued, "Whether we agree or disagree with the outcome of the election, the results are now part of our Charter. Allowing the State to interfere with our Charter would set a dangerous precedent for New Orleans, especially since we are demographically and politically unlike most of Louisiana."

Supported Louisiana Film Industry



The Council passed Resolution R-09-182, authored by Councilmember Fielkow, supporting state legislative efforts to remove the scheduled film incentive tax credit (Motion Picture Investor Tax Credit) reduction slated for early 2010, and stabilizing the existing tax credit at thirty percent.

Under current legislation, the twenty-five percent film incentive tax credit is scheduled to be reduced

to twenty percent in early 2010, which would be devastating to the Louisiana film industry and result in a tremendous loss of direct economic impact and industry related jobs.





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

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New Orleans, LA - May 5, 2009 - At Thursday's regular City Council meeting, District "A" Councilmember Shelley Midura will introduce a Motion to retain the RAND Corporation, in partnership with the National Regulatory Research Institute (NRRI), to conduct an assessment of the Council's Utility Regulatory function.

Councilmember Midura Councilmember Midura said, "In an effort to increase transparency and accountability, in 2006, the Council adopted a Resolution voluntarily banning Councilmembers from accepting campaign contributions from our utility consultants and anyone affiliated with Entergy New Orleans. I would like to take this a step further - and have outside experts evaluate the cost and effectiveness of the current way we staff our regulatory shop and make recommendations for improvements and

possible savings for our ratepayers."

She continued, "In the 25 years since the Council became the regulator of the City's utilities, this type of evaluation has never been performed. The timing of the results is ideal, given that new contracts for the consultants, at a cost of approximately \$30 million over 5 years, must be in place by January 1, 2010, and if we want to continue to reform the way we procure services in the name of responsible stewardship of public dollars and accountability in government services then we need to do it before signing those contracts."

The City Council, in accordance with the New Orleans Home Rule Charter and the Louisiana Constitution, acts as retail regulator for electric and gas utility service in the City. With only two City Hall employees in the Utility Regulatory Office, the Council has traditionally relied on the serves of expert consultants, including attorneys, engineers, and accountants to represent the Council in its numerous legal cases in local court and at the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission and to guide and advise the Council in its oversight function. They recently worked on the 2009 rate case, which resulted in a \$30 million overall bill reduction for ENO ratepayers.

The Request for Proposals (RFP) was issued in February and was advertised both locally, and nationally, including in the Wall Street Journal and industry trade journals. The RAND Corporation teamed with NRRI to make a very strong proposal to carry out the evaluation process for \$130,000. The results of the evaluation will be used when the Council issues RFPs for the expert consultants this fall. New five-year contracts will become effective January 1, 2010, at a cost of approximately \$6 million/year.

As defined by the RFP, RAND and NRRI will undertake a thorough analysis of the City Council's regulatory framework and the allocation of its regulatory resources to meet the scope of its responsibility, and consider the incorporation of best practices and national standards into the Council's regulatory framework.

The RAND Corporation is a nonprofit institution that helps improve policy and decision making through research and analysis. For 60 years, decision makers in the public and private sectors have turned to the RAND Corporation for objective analysis and effective solutions that address the challenges facing the nation and the world. These challenges include such critical social and economic issues as education, poverty, crime, and the environment, as well as a range of national security issues.

Judge Landrieu heard oral argument from City Council Attorney Steve Lane and Associate City Attorney Franz Zibilich on the Petition for Writ of Injunction filed on behalf of the Council.

The Court granted the injunction, prohibiting the City Attorney from releasing the emails until the Council has a reasonable opportunity to review them for privileged and confidential information.

The City Attorney was ordered to produce the City Council's emails to the President of the City Council so that they can be reviewed to determine if privilege or confidentiality applies to any of the emails. Responses to public records requests made of the City Council will be made as quickly as possible and in accordance with the State's Public Records Law.

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House Bill No. 60 calls for changing the criteria under which the State of Louisiana issues a new birth certificate for an adopted child. Specifically, the proposed bill calls for a birth certificate to be issued

for an adopted child only to a married couple or single parent.

"So many children in both Louisiana and throughout the world need good homes and caring parents, and enacting legislation which penalizes potential gay adopting parents is both mean-spirited and not in the best interest of our children. House Bill No. 60 adds another layer to an already exhaustive process and potentially harms children in the future from receiving much-needed healthcare and social services," says Fielkow. "I feel that we should be making adoption easier, not harder, and ensuring that adopted children and parents are afforded the same rights, access to information and privileges as naturally-born children."

House Bill No. 60 may put the State of Louisiana at odds with a federal court ruling on this issue. Council Vice President Fielkow and his wife are the recent adoptive parents of two young girls from the Ukraine, and can personally attest to the difficulties in obtaining proper documentation for their children.

Critics of House Bill No. 60 point out that by denying some adoptive parents the right to be on their child's birth certificate, that family may face difficulties in registering their child for school, medical benefits or insurance.



Jim Miller, UNO Director of Intercollegiate Athletics, and Ron Maestri, Executive Director and Chief Operating Officer of the New Orleans Zephyrs and former UNO Athletic Director, appeared before the Council to thank Councilmembers for their continuous support of UNO and their dedication to preserving the university's athletics programs.

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Councilmember Midura

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Councilmember Midura stated that after much consideration of the voiced concerns of her Council colleagues leading up to today's vote, she decided to withdraw the Motion. It became clear that the Council was not prepared to support moving

forward with the Motion in time to have a report ready in advance of the next contract period for the Council's expert team of advisers.

Councilmember Midura said, "The Council, to its credit, has championed reform, particularly with the way this City handles city contracts, and we have held ourselves to a higher standard than we ask of the administration by voluntarily banning campaign contributions from our utility consultants with campaign finance legislation passed two years ago. As much as 30 million public dollars are at stake, and I have an obligation to act in the best interest of New Orleanians. We must make every effort not only to spend public dollars wisely and efficiently, but to instill public confidence through accountability measures such as periodic independent review."

Midura informed the Council that she made a formal request to the Office of Inspector General (OIG) to perform a management review of the City Council's regulatory function, and that Interim Inspector General Odom indicated that his office is on board for this review and, in his words, should be able to comfortably fit it into their work schedule so that a report may be completed in time for the next round of Requests For Qualifications. Councilmembers thanked Councilmember Midura for taking the lead on this issue and offered their support to the OIG. They also expressed the importance of examining and considering the incorporation of best practices and national standards into the Council's regulatory framework.

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

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



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New Orleans, LA - May 11, 2009 - Tomorrow, the New Orleans City Council's Special Development Projects & Economic Development Committee will convene a panel discussion exploring how New Orleans can be prepared to renew and expand its economic relationship with Cuba in the event the United States trade embargo is lifted in future years. This topic is made even more relevant by virtue of the recently revised policy relating to travel to Cuba enacted by the Obama Administration.

The meeting will be held on Tuesday, May 12th at 11 a.m. in the City Council Chamber. City Council Vice President and Special Development Projects & Economic Development Committee Chair Arnie Fielkow has gathered a panel of international trade and policy experts to discuss the economic opportunities that increased trade and relations with Cuba can have on New Orleans.

"The historic cultural affinity between New Orleans and Cuba is obvious in our music, our food and shared ancestry for many in our community" said Fielkow. "It is important that New Orleans be ahead of the curve as it relates to future economic opportunities with Cuba and the rest of Central and South America. There already exists a significant economic history between our city and Cuba, and the future trade and economic opportunities are tremendous."

In 1958, approximately one third of all goods passing through the Port of New Orleans were destined for Cuba, which was Louisiana's number one trading partner in imports and number seven in exports.

We will lift all restrictions on family visits to Cuba by authorizing such transactions by a general license, which will strengthen contacts and promote American good will. We will ensure the positive reach of this effort by:

- Defining family members who may be visited to be persons within three degrees of family relationship (e.g., second cousins) and to allow individuals who share a common dwelling as a family with an authorized traveler to accompany them;

- Removing limitations on the frequency of visits;

- Removing limitations on the duration of a visit;

- Authorizing expenditure amounts that are the same as non-family travel; and

- Removing the 44-pound limitation on accompanied baggage.

Remove Restrictions on Remittances

We will remove restrictions on remittances to a person's family member in Cuba to increase Cubans' access to resources to help create opportunities for them by:

- Authorizing remittances to individuals within three degrees of family relationship (e.g., second cousins) provided that no remittances shall be authorized to currently prohibited members of the Government of Cuba or currently prohibited members of the Cuban Communist Party;

- Removing limits on frequency of remittances;
- Removing limits on the amount of remittances;
- Authorizing travelers to carry up to \$3,000 in remittances; and

- Establishing general license for banks and other depository institutions to forward remittances.

Authorize Greater Telecommunications Links with Cuba

We will authorize greater telecommunications links with Cuba to advance people-to-people interaction at no cost to the U.S. government. This will increase the means through which Cubans on the island can communicate with each other and with persons outside of Cuba.

Authorize U.S. telecommunications network providers to enter into agreements to establish fiber-optic cable and satellite telecommunications facilities linking the United States and Cuba.
License U.S. telecommunications service providers to enter into and operate under roaming service agreements with Cuba's telecommunications service providers.

- License U.S. satellite radio and satellite television service providers to engage in transactions necessary to provide services to customers

in Cuba.

- License persons subject to U.S. jurisdiction to activate and pay U.S. and third-country service providers for telecommunications, satellite radio and satellite television services provided to individuals in Cuba, except certain senior Communist Party and Cuban government officials.

- Authorize, consistent with national security concerns, the export or re-export to Cuba of donated personal communications devices such as mobile phone systems, computers and software, and satellite receivers through a license exception.

Revise Gift Parcel Regulations

We will expand the scope of humanitarian donations eligible for export through license exceptions by:

- Restoring clothing, personal hygiene items, seeds, veterinary medicines and supplies, fishing equipment and supplies, and soap-making equipment to the list of items eligible to be included in gift parcel donations;

- Restoring items normally exchanged as gifts by individuals in "usual and reasonable" quantities to the list of items eligible to be included in gift parcel donations;

- Expanding the scope of eligible gift parcel donors to include any individual;

- Expanding the scope of eligible gift parcel donees to include individuals other than Cuban Communist Party officials or Cuban government officials already prohibited from receiving gift parcels, or charitable, educational or religious organizations not administered or controlled by the Cuban government; and increasing the value limit on non-food items to \$800.

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

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4th Circuit Court of Appeal Overrules Orleans Civil District Court Allows City Councilmember Emails in Possession Of Lawyer Tracie Washington Made Public

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The decision cited that the documents had already been produced and viewed in the public arena for approximately three months prior to the granting of the injunction by the lower court, and accordingly held that the lower court injunction must be lifted.

Further, the Court indicated that the lawyers code of ethics requires that Ms. Washington not release any Councilmember emails that might contain privileged or confidential information. The Court also noted that there might be an issue as to whether the process by which the emails were released constituted civil malfeasance or criminal behavior on the part of those involved in their release.

Attorney for the City Council Steve Lane is reviewing the Court's decision and expects to discuss with Councilmembers what if any action should be taken.

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

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
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State Supreme Court Halts Councilmember Email Release By Tracie Washington



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
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

- On Wednesday, May 27th, 100 middle school students from across New Orleans will get an opportunity to witness a unique part of American history by attending the 14th Annual Rickwood Baseball Classic in Birmingham, Alabama.

Rickwood Field is America's oldest ballpark, and played host to iconic baseball teams and players over the past 99 years. The field served as the home park for the Birmingham Barons and the Birmingham Black Barons of the Negro League. Baseball legends including Babe Ruth, Satchel Paige and Willie Mays all played on Rickwood Field.

Immediately following the minor-league baseball game, the students will be taken on a private, guided tour of the Birmingham Civil Rights Institute before returning to New Orleans that evening. The trip is sponsored by New Orleans City Council Vice President Arnie Fielkow, State Representative Cedric Richmond (District 101) and Orleans Parish Criminal Sheriff Marlin Gusman. WBOK-AM radio and Sylvain Solutions are the media sponsors.

Council Vice President Fielkow said, "Rickwood Field is a historic ballpark where some of baseball's greats once played." Fielkow continued, "The impact of the Rickwood Classic extends far beyond baseball. It represents our nation's civil rights history and the impact that baseball had in desegregating this country. I am so excited to share this unique opportunity with New Orleans students."

The Recovery School District (RSD), Orleans Parish School Board (OPSB) and the Algiers Charter School Association (ACSA) are all participating. Students will be chosen to attend this trip by their respective school districts, based upon high academic and behavioral criteria set by the three school districts.

The Rickwood Classic pays homage to the 1982 season when the Atlanta Braves traveled to Birmingham to play a mid-summer exhibition against the Southern League All-Stars. Prior to moving to New Orleans, Council Vice President Fielkow served as President of the historic Southern League. The 1982 season was the last time prior to this one that Birmingham hosted the league's annual All-Star event. The 2009 game, featuring the Birmingham Barons versus Southern League division rival Mississippi Braves, will feature the players wearing the uniforms worn by both teams in the early 1980's. The Classic is considered one of the best opportunities to experience a regulation ballgame in a historic ballpark that remains true to its original and traditional appearance.

"Our local kids have been through so much trauma in recent years," said Representative Cedric Richmond. "From the hurricane, to long evacuations, to their schools and daily routines being constantly changed, this trip is a reward for the hard work these students have performed over the school year. This trip is not just about baseball - it's about showing these kids a living piece of history and how good, clean sports can help change the world."

Sheriff Marlin Gusman said, "This trip is a tremendous opportunity to share the joy of a national past time with our kids, as well as an opportunity for them to appreciate the sacrifices made by earlier generations in the name of equality for all."

The game begins at 12:30 p.m. Immediately following the game, the New Orleans group will be taken on a private, guided tour of the Birmingham Civil Rights Institute.

Hotard Coaches will pick-up the students and chaperones in front of New Orleans City Hall on Perdido Street at 6:00 a.m. on Wednesday, May 27th. The buses will travel to Rickwood Field for the 12:30 p.m. game. At approximately 3:00 p.m., the group will re-board the buses and travel to the Birmingham Civil Rights Institute for a 1 hour guided tour. The buses will return to New Orleans by 10:00 p.m.

New Orleans, LA - May 18, 2009 - Today, the New Orleans City Council is continuing its review of over 2-million pages of emails for public release and website posting.

May 18, 2009

With 24-hour notice, on April 21st the City Attorney delivered to the City Council more than 400thousand emails comprising over 2 million pages. The delivery was made in a disc format that

included calendars and various attachments.

Due to the volume of emails to be reviewed as required under the state's public records law, the process has necessitated three phases of review which includes a technology expert, Council's Special Legal Counsel and Councilmembers and staff, as appropriate.

Since receipt of the emails, the Council's technology expert with assistance from Special Legal Counsel has developed a rolling system to separate and catalog the emails and remove computer viruses. Using word searches and manual review, Special Legal Counsel has reviewed and redacted privileged and confidential information from a portion of the emails.

Over the next few days, Councilmembers and some members of their staffs will meet with its technology expert and Special Legal Counsel to become skilled at accessing and reviewing the emails for privileged and confidential constituent information also covered under the state's public records law. Over a period of time, City Councilmembers will be reviewing emails and making them available to the public. Independently of the Council's three phase email review, District "B" Councilmember Stacy Head has begun reviewing and posting her emails. 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New Orleans, LA - May 19, 2009- At Thursday's regular City Council meeting, the Council will address as one of its Orders of Business, a presentation from local criminal justice leaders and national experts about the Expedited Screening and Disposition Initiative, which launched on March 31. The presentation will begin at approximately 11:00 a.m. on Thursday May 21 in the Council Chamber.

The Expedited Screening Initiative will expedite all practices from arrest to arraignment (the court appearance at which charges are presented) for simple possession drug cases. These cases account for roughly one third of all arrests on state charges.

District "C" Councilmember Carter said, "The successful launch of this Initiative represents a positive sign that the City's criminal justice leaders are committed to working together to advance meaningful reforms."

Beginning with simple possession drug cases, the Initiative will move New Orleans more in line with national good practices by:

- Expediting the time in which police officers complete and transmit their reports and the time in which the district attorney's office screens these cases
- Conserving public safety resources by rapidly screening out weak cases, swiftly deciding to charge strong cases, and

 allowing a shift of effort to investigate and prosecute serious violent cases in a timely and effective manner Ensuring that public defenders are assigned at the earliest opportunity, and providing an opportunity for them to effectively counsel their clients Automating and streamlining data entry and information transmission, through efforts of the sheriff's and clerk's offices and the other participating agencies
Chief Public Defender Derwyn Bunton, District Attorney Leon Cannizzaro, Criminal Sheriff Marlin Gusman, Clerk of Court Arthur Morrell, and Superintendent of Police Warren Riley will be present at Thursday's regular Council meeting to discuss their agencies' participation in the Initiative.
Michael Jacobson, the Director of the Vera Institute of Justice, will provide a national perspective on the challenges and opportunities for criminal justice reform in New Orleans.
Jon Wool, who directs Vera's work in New Orleans, will describe the development of the Initiative, present preliminary performance results, and discuss opportunities for expansion.
The Initiative is one of five that the City's criminal justice leaders agreed to implement as part of the Criminal Justice Leadership Alliance - a coalition of the City's criminal justice leaders formed in 2007 to implement reforms to the City's criminal justice system.

Special Development Projects & Economic Development Committee To Hold Special Meeting on New Orleans Tax Increment Financing Policy Tomorrow

What: The Special Development Projects & Economic Development Committee hearing will review the draft document developed to establish a new, citywide New Orleans Tax Increment Financing (TIF) policy. The TIF policy is expected to institute conditions under which the City of New Orleans will consider approving TIF proposals.

In 1988, the State of Louisiana passed legislation known as the Louisiana Tax Development Act, which allows parishes to development and implement TIF programs. Since 1988, the City of New Orleans has only implemented two TIF projects. TIF projects are nationally known and frequently used to stimulate economic development within selected areas of a community.

TIF is a tool to use future gains in taxes to finance the current improvements that will create those gains. Tax Increment Financing creates funding for public projects that may otherwise be unaffordable to localities, and dedicates tax increments within a certain defined district to finance debt issued to pay for projects. TIF is designed to channel funding toward improvements in distressed or underdeveloped areas where development would not otherwise occur.



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

I would like to thank the community for being so engaged and staying involved in the process. I would like this to serve as a reminder that when we come together as one, with one goal, things change."

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

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

 On Wednesday, May 27th, 100 middle school students from across New Orleans will get an opportunity to witness a unique part of American history by attending the 14th Annual Rickwood Baseball Classic in Birmingham, Alabama.

Rickwood Field is America's oldest ballpark, and played host to iconic baseball teams and players over the past 99 years. The field served as the home park for the Birmingham Barons and the Birmingham Black Barons of the Negro League. Baseball legends including Babe Ruth, Satchel Paige and Willie Mays all played on Rickwood Field.

Immediately following the minor-league baseball game, the students will be taken on a private, guided tour of the Birmingham Civil Rights Institute before returning to New Orleans that evening. The trip is sponsored by New Orleans City Council Vice President Arnie Fielkow, State Representative Cedric Richmond (District 101) and Orleans Parish Criminal Sheriff Marlin Gusman. WBOK-AM radio and Sylvain Solutions are the media sponsors. Council Vice President Fielkow said, "Rickwood Field is a historic ballpark where some of baseball's greats once played." Fielkow continued, "The impact of the Rickwood Classic extends far beyond baseball. It represents our nation's civil rights history and the impact that baseball had in desegregating this country. I am so excited to share this unique opportunity with New Orleans students."

The Recovery School District (RSD), Orleans Parish School Board (OPSB) and the Algiers Charter School Association (ACSA) are all participating. Students will be chosen to attend this trip by their respective school districts, based upon high academic and behavioral criteria set by the three school districts.

The Rickwood Classic pays homage to the 1982 season when the Atlanta Braves traveled to Birmingham to play a mid-summer exhibition against the Southern League All-Stars. Prior to moving to New Orleans, Council Vice President Fielkow served as President of the historic Southern League. The 1982 season was the last time prior to this one that Birmingham hosted the league's annual All-Star event. The 2009 game, featuring the Birmingham Barons versus Southern League division rival Mississippi Braves, will feature the players wearing the uniforms worn by both teams in the early 1980's. The Classic is considered one of the best opportunities to experience a regulation ballgame in a historic ballpark that remains true to its original and traditional appearance.

"Our local kids have been through so much trauma in recent years," said Representative Cedric Richmond. "From the hurricane, to long evacuations, to their schools and daily routines being constantly changed, this trip is a reward for the hard work these students have performed over the school year. This trip is not just about baseball - it's about showing these kids a living piece of history and how good, clean sports can help change the world."

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Unanimous Decision of State Supreme Court Vacates 4th Circuit Court of Appeal Judgment In City Council versus Tracie Washington Email Case

The Supreme Court ruled that the Court of Appeal should not have considered Ms. Washington's First Amendment argument to make public non-privileged City Councilmember emails in her possession. The Court cited the longstanding jurisprudential rule of law in Louisiana that litigants cannot raise constitutional attacks on appeal unless they first raise them at the trial level.

As a result, the Supreme Court found the Court of Appeal erred in ruling in Ms. Washington's favor.

According to the City Council's Special Counsel Steven J. Lane, the City Council maintains the position it has held since it first learned that Tracie Washington had obtained City Councilmember emails without the Council's knowledge in December 2008.

Lane said, "The Council has never had an issue with non-privileged or nonprivate constituent information being made public. The Council wants the opportunity to review the emails in order to protect private information of constituents and attorney client privileged information. We are hopeful that the Attorney General will give some guidance on the issues of protecting private constituent information, and expediting and reducing the cost of the email review process."

Lane went on to say, the Council will continue to go through the time consuming and costly process of reviewing every email and making public as many emails as possible, as quickly as possible.

Mr. Lane is out of town on business and will be returning to New Orleans tomorrow.



New Orleans, LA - June 1, 2009 - Councilmembers Arnie Fielkow, Jacquelyn Brechtel Clarkson, Stacy Head, and Cynthia Hedge-Morrell attended a field hearing of the U.S. House committee responsible for overseeing FEMA today. Councilmembers urged congressional leaders to reform the FEMA reimbursement process, forgive the City its Community Disaster Loans granted in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina, and focus on a host of other recovery projects including coastal restoration and outfall canals.

U.S. Congressman Anh "Joseph" Cao and U.S. Congressman John L. Mica of Florida, both members of the U.S. House Transportation Committee, hosted the recovery roundtable, which was held at Charity Hospital in New Orleans. U.S. Congressman Steve Scalise also attended the roundtable, as well as other state and federal leaders, including representatives from FEMA.

Councilmembers-at-Large Arnie Fielkow and Jacquelyn Brechtel Clarkson urged congressional leaders to reform FEMA and the Stafford Act, which outlines how the federal government reacts to disasters. "Katrina showed us that the federal government is ill-equipped to respond to major U.S. disasters," Councilmember Clarkson said. "The federal government needs to work to give local communities the same kind of disaster response it provides to international communities."

Council President Arnie Fielkow said, "It's time that the federal government and the local community reach a consensus on rebuilding efforts. Nearly four years after Katrina, we are still having this conversation, and that is unacceptable."

Councilmembers also discussed a host of recovery issues, including the forgiveness of Community Disaster Loans, coastal restoration and protection, and the redevelopment of the City's outfall canals.

District "B" Councilmember Stacy Head explained why forgiveness of the Community Disaster Loans (CDLs) is so vital for New Orleans.

"The forgiveness of CDLs has a ripple effect that especially reverberates at the local level," she said. "Once we know the CDLs are forgiven, our bond rating improves, and we can get credit easier and at a lower cost to our city. This enables us to provide more and better services to our citizens."

District "D" Councilmember Cynthia Hedge-Morrell, who chairs the Council's Budget Committee, focused on the need to reform the process by which FEMA reimburses municipal governments in the wake of disasters.

"We have a city charter that does not allow us to let contracts until we have the money in the bank. Yet FEMA will allocate money only to reimburse spent funds," she said. "When your city is under water and you have no tax base - that just doesn't make sense."

Council President Fielkow urged FEMA representative to look immediately into the gap between FEMA funding and City needs on NORD parks and playgrounds.

"We have a gap of more than \$60 million, and this is inexcusable," Fielkow said. "Our children need those parks and playgrounds now. Rebuilding them will have immediate benefits in the quality of life of our citizens."

Councilmember Clarkson urged congressional leaders to financially support the State's effort to restore coastal wetlands and to instruct the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to use the best possible means of redeveloping the City's outfall canals at London Ave., Orleans Ave., and 17th St.

"The Corps needs to consider what is best for the long-term, sustainable storm protection New Orleans needs," Clarkson said. "We cannot allow the Corps to choose 'cheap' options that will ultimately put our area at risk for dramatic costs in life and property."

Councilmembers vowed to continue to work with local, state, and federal

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leaders to push for reforms and a quicker pace to recovery.

"This much time and money spent by local, state, and federal governments on a recovery that has been minimal is absurd, un-American, and unacceptable," said Councilmember Clarkson. "Working together, we have to change that."

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New Orleans, LA - June 2, 2009 -Councilmember-at-Large Jacquelyn Brechtel Clarkson returned this weekend from a factfinding trip to the Netherlands' hosted by U. S. Sen. Mary Landrieu and the Dutch Embassy to investigate the country's advanced system of flood control.

"When it comes to flood control, we have a lot to learn from the Dutch," Clarkson said. "The Dutch don't run from water. They manage it. If we want sustainable, long-term storm protection, we need to change our

way of thinking and adopt that philosophy."

More than half of the Netherlands lies below sea level, including two of the country's major cities, Amsterdam and Rotterdam. After experiencing a flood in 1953 that killed more than 2,000 people, the Netherlands overhauled its system of seawalls and dykes, creating a national department focused solely on water management, forming local water boards devoted to flood control, constructing elaborate systems of canals, and focusing on coastal barriers.

Along with a delegation of key elected officials, community leaders, scientists, and engineers, Councilmember Clarkson observed the ins and outs of this elaborate system through on-the-ground field outings during the six day trip, May 25 - 31.

Clarkson, who is a strong advocate for the restoration of coastal wetlands using large-scale freshwater diversions and other techniques, emphasized the need for a federal, state, and local focus on sustainable, natural storm defenses in addition to man-made levees.
"I am pleased with the meetings we had in the Netherlands," Clarkson said. "There is a real commitment on the federal and state level to pursuing the kind of lasting flood control that will make our region a viable place to live for our children and children's children."
She continued "We need to rethink how we protect ourselves - starting with prioritizing our own natural defenses in coastal barriers. If the Netherlands can stop the North Sea, we can stop the Gulf."

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

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



"The children of District D should benefit from these FEMA funds,

which could be used to improve the quality of education in our area," said Councilmember Hedge-Morrell. "When I first became aware of the Archbishop's proposal, I sent a letter to FEMA encouraging them to reinvest those funds in our community, either in a community center at Corpus Christi or at St. Leo the Great Catholic School where Epiphany students now attend. I think it is essential that the parishioners of the four Catholic Churches in the district be involved in the Archdiocese's decision. 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



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New Orleans, LA - June 11, 2009 - Council President Arnie Fielkow is calling on private and public employers to create greater opportunities for New Orleans teens by joining forces with local education providers to create work study internships.

After receiving status updates of New Orleans-area technical and vocational schools from local education stakeholders during today's Special Development Projects and Economic Development Committee meeting, Councilman Fielkow

reiterated the importance of creating avenues of opportunity and learning for New Orleans' youth.

"Our number one challenge in New Orleans is crime," said Fielkow. "One of the best ways to fight crime is through education. The other is through economic development and providing kids with the hope that comes from a good job and future. That is why it is important to push technical and vocational training in the city."

Speakers at today's meeting - including Recovery School District Superintendent Paul Vallas; Dr. Ron Wright, Chancellor of Delgado Region 1; Kim Rugon, Provost/Dean of Delgado's Louisiana Technical College Region 1; James Owens, Executive Director of Louisiana Department of Education's Office of Career and Technical Education;

and Lisa Tomlin, Regional Talent Development Vice President for Greater New Orleans Inc. - detailed key industries in need of labor, industries such as maritime, healthcare and creative and digital media.

These stakeholders, as well as Councilman Fielkow, advocate the creation of a veritable "job bank" of high school- and college-age students willing and able to participate in work study internships. An effort like this would have to come from both the education community and the private sector, said Fielkow, but it is imperative for fostering workforce development in the region. Fielkow also emphasized the need to repair Delgado's Sidney N. Collier Campus, which is part of Delgado's Louisiana Technical College Region 1. Sidney N. Collier, located at 3727 Louisa St. in New Orleans, has been closed since Hurricane Katrina. Councilman Fielkow requested that a meeting be held with Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), state and local officials within the next two weeks to move this project forward.

At today's Committee meeting, Councilman Fielkow also received the first-ever presentation of GNO Inc.'s in-depth study on southeastern Louisiana ports and maritime trade operations around New Orleans from local port and trade officials.

"The GNO Inc. report has done a very good job of telling us where our trading partners are and where they will be," Fielkow said. "But what it also makes clear is that from a governance and marketing standpoint, we need a unified voice in the region for our ports. The Port of New Orleans is clearly the brand known around the world. We need to take that brand and unify it."

Industry insiders on international trade present at today's meeting included: Greg Rusovich, Chairman of the Business Council of New Orleans and the River Region; Gary LaGrange, President and CEO of the Port of New Orleans; Andrea Bland, Senior Vice President of Business Development for GNO Inc.; and Salvador Figueroa, Director of International Relations for GNO Inc.

Each panel member discussed the need for passage of certain legislative items currently winding through the Louisiana Legislature including Rep. Jim Tucker's House Bill (HB) 779, Rep. Cedric Richmond's HB 744 and Rep. Nita Rusich Hutter's HB 215.

Rusovich and the other panel members requested Council President Fielkow to author a resolution requesting the Legislature to support these measures, which will go a long way in improving southeastern Louisiana's ongoing trade operations, as well as future opportunities. Rusovich specifically cited the importance of Speaker Tucker's bill, which aims to further regionalize power on the Port of New Orleans Dock Board by providing Plaquemines and St. Bernard parishes with two extra seats. In exchange, the port will have the authority to build facilities and/or have operations in either of the two adjoining port districts.
Councilman Fielkow promised to get a resolution supporting the legislation on the agenda for the June 18th Council meeting.



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
New Orleans, LA - June 16, 2009 -At the June 18th regular New Orleans City Council meeting, Councilmembers will vote on Ordinance Calendar No. 27,520. The measure is the first step in the effort to strengthen opportunities for small businesses and Disadvantaged Business Enterprises (DBEs) to participate in city contracts or city funded transactions.

"Small businesses are the backbone

of any strong economy, especially socially and economically disadvantaged small businesses," said Council President Fielkow. "As President of the City Council, I look forward to working with my colleagues to put forth bold initiatives to strengthen these businesses, thereby ensuring that our economy continues to grow and our city's plans for recovery and enhancement are realized."

The Ordinance seeks to codify and extend the provisions set forth by the Mayor's executive order establishing goals for DBE and local small business recovery. It institutes a goal that 50% of any project funded by the city must be controlled by local businesses. It also establishes an overall goal that 35% of any project funded by the city must be controlled by socially and economically disadvantaged businesses, particularly those located in damaged areas. Individual project goals shall be established on a project-byproject basis and based on availability of locally owned and disadvantaged businesses.

Endorsed by the Regional New Orleans Black Chamber of Commerce, this provision would multiply the economic impact of recovery money as well as guarantee equity in the contracting process. "We view this as a very important step

"We welcome Home Front Homes to New Orleans," Councilmember Clarkson said. "We need business like this to invest in our City and to provide jobs and services."

She continued, "It's fitting that this manufacturer of storm-resistant, energy-efficient homes has chosen to locate a site in New Orleans, where now more than ever we need to pursue innovative and sustainable housing."

Councilmember Clarkson met with representatives at the end of their tour around the City. She led a lengthy discussion among Home Front Homes representatives, leaders of the banking community, and community members, relative to maintaining the architectural integrity of New Orleans in pre-fabricated homes, securing sources of financing for low- and middle-income residents interested in purchasing homes, and saving money through energy efficient housing.

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

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

New Orleans, LA - June 18, 2009 -Today, the New Orleans City Council unanimously approved legislation, authored by Council President Arnie Fielkow and co-authored by District "D" Councilmember Cynthia Hedge-Morrell, which guarantees more small, local and disadvantaged businesses obtain greater access to city contracts and any business that includes the use of city funds.

Councilmembers voted on the Ordinance, which Councilmember Fielkow said is the first step in the Council's effort to

strengthen opportunities for local small businesses and Disadvantaged Business Enterprises (DBEs) to participate in city contracts or city funded transactions.

"Small businesses are the backbone of any strong economy, especially socially and economically disadvantaged small businesses. If this city is to reach its full potential, we have to lift up all communities, all cultures, all races," said Council President Fielkow. "To make this work, we must strengthen the city's compliance measures regarding actual enforcement. I applaud my colleagues and the Administration for taking this necessary first step."

The approved Ordinance codifies and extends the provisions set forth by Mayor Ray Nagin's executive order establishing goals for DBE and

local small business recovery. It institutes a goal that 50 percent of any project funded by the city must be controlled by local businesses. It also establishes an overall goal that 35 percent of any project funded by the city must be controlled by socially and economically disadvantaged businesses, particularly, those located in damaged areas. Individual project goals shall be established on a project-by-project basis and based on availability of locally owned and disadvantaged businesses.

Endorsed by the New Orleans Regional Black Chamber of Commerce (NORBCC) and the New Orleans Business Council, this provision multiplies the economic impact of recovery money. The measure also guarantees equity in the contracting process.

"We view this as a very important step in ensuring that all segments of our local business community have a full and fair opportunity to participate in the long term rebuilding of our great city," said Daniel Davillier, chairman of the NORBCC, who testified before the Council in support of the Ordinance.

Additionally, Black Economic Development Council Executive Director Judith Williams Dangerfield spoke to the Council, endorsing the legislation. "This Ordinance is an important step toward the equity and parity that will make our city a great city for all citizens," said Dangerfield.

Also appearing at today's meeting in support of the Ordinance were Urban League of Greater New Orleans President Nolan Rollins, New Orleans Business Council Chairman Greg Rusovich and NewCorp President Vaughn Fauria.

In the effort to create greater enforcement strategies for the DBE program's compliance, the Council's Budget Committee and Special Development Projects and Economic Development Committee will meet jointly on Thursday, June 25th at 2:00 p.m. in the City Council Chamber.

Councilmember-at-Large Jacquelyn Brechtel Clarkson Statement: We Must Defeat Senate Bill 75

New Orleans, LA - June 22, 2009 - In a citywide election in November of 2008, New Orleans voters approved a major amendment to the City's Home Rule Charter. This amendment requires the City Planning Commission to draft a master plan for the future development of New Orleans; a plan that, when complete, the City's elected and appointed leaders will have to abide by under force of law.

This was a historic moment for New Orleans and a serious win for neighborhoods, small businesses, legitimate major developers, and good government advocates.

New Orleans residents have spent countless hours drafting plans that have ended up collecting dust in a forgotten room in City Hall. Meanwhile, New Orleans continues to suffer from an outdated, dysfunctional system of land use in which zoning decisions are often politicized, made with little or no citizen input, and favor a privileged few. This system leads to corner bars in neighborhoods where they don't belong, landfills dumped onto vacant land in New Orleans East, and major developers who wouldn't dare invest in a city where the rules can change tomorrow. The 2008 charter amendment, supported by the administration and six of seven councilmembers, was meant to change that. It promised a coherent, meaningful plan that would bring desperately-needed stability to our City.

Senate Bill 75 threatens to derail this. Senate Bill 75 would again politicize the planning process by requiring yet another vote of the people on the plan before it can acquire the force of law. This argument - that the people should vote on the plan itself - is all too familiar. A small group of residents, developers, and consultants spent tens of thousands of dollars on TV commercials and radio ads pushing this argument in an attempt to defeat the charter amendment in 2008 - they lost.

Now, Senate Bill 75 is taking this argument to the state. It is a thinly veiled attempt to usurp the will of the people, derail the master planning process, and revert New Orleans back to the old-school land use system that has stalled economic development here for decades.

No other city in the country puts a master plan - a document composed of more than a thousand of pages - to the vote of the people. This would be like putting a state budget to a statewide vote. People would likely pick out and vote against one line, and drafting the document would become highly political. More importantly, the results of a disapproving vote would be impossible to interpret. Which part of the master plan should we change to get a favorable vote: community health clinics, plans for improving transportation, or certain components of the land use plan? How many more rounds of public meetings, changes to the plan, and costly citywide votes would we have to undergo before our City finally gets a plan and the stability we need? And for how long would people be willing to come out to meetings for a plan that might again mean nothing? Senate Bill 75 would also violate the Home Rule Charter, which was instituted in the 1950s to allow the City to govern itself on issues like city planning without the state stepping in.

For all these reasons and more, we must defeat this bill. Mayor Ray Nagin, a majority of the City Council, the Bureau of Governmental Research, the Business Council, the Home Builders Association, the New Orleans Metropolitan Association of Realtors, Citizens for One Greater New Orleans, many state legislators, and a host of neighborhoods groups have publicly opposed it.

As the author of the 2008 charter amendment and as an elected official who worked vigorously for its passage, I have spent the past several weeks working against Senate Bill 75 in the Legislature. Unfortunately, the bill has already passed the full Senate and the House Municipal Affairs Committee. Defeating it on the House floor is our last chance. I will continue to fight it, and I need you to fight it, too. Please call or write your representative in the House and tell them to vote against Senate Bill 75.



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New Orleans, LA - June 23, 2009 - Today, the City Council's legal counsel filed a motion in Orleans Civil District Court asking that public records requestors specify the types of email documents requested; that citizens' private information be protected; and that the records requestors, not the public, pay the fees and costs associated with the review of 2.5 million pages of emails.

The motion addresses public records requests made by a variety of media outlets and one private citizen.

The motion references the delivery to the City Council from the City Attorney of approximately 440,000 emails comprising over 2 million pages; the vague, overbroad and burdensome requests; and the time-consuming and costly review of documents by Legal Counsel, Forensic Software Analysts and Councilmembers.

According to Legal Counsel Steven Lane, the motion asks the Court to limit the scope and define the areas of public records inquiries; protect citizens' privacy; and/or, as provided under the Louisiana Public Records Act, have public records requestors pay the fees and costs incurred to process the requested documents.



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

Council President Arnie Fielkow Statement: New City Hall Buy May Be Wrong Priority, Wrong Time

New Orleans, LA - June 24, 2009 - The following is a statement issued today from New Orleans City Council President Arnie Fielkow regarding the proposed Chevron building purchase for a new City Hall:

"Much discussion over recent days has centered on whether or not the \$8 million purchase of Chevron Corp.'s office tower at 935 Gravier Street and two associated buildings, a complex known as Chevron Place, is beneficial to the City of New Orleans and its residents. I commend Mayor Nagin for wanting to upgrade City Hall, and present a better image for the seat of city government - objectives which I also share. However, I ultimately feel the prioritization, timing and proposed relocation site is not, at this time, in our citizens' best interest considering the City's existing needs.

"A City Hall relocation is a topic which merits continued study and planning, particularly regarding the

synergies which can be created with other projects planned throughout our downtown areas. It is my hope that such work would involve more public input, further consultation with business, civic and elected leaders, and be consistent with a 21st century image of New Orleans.

"I look forward to receiving the detailed information and documentation requested last week by the City Council and yesterday by the City Planning Commission, but my reservations at this time include the following:

· Prioritization

Given New Orleans' great needs in the recovery efforts following Hurricane Katrina - and the ever present limitations of services and facilities that contribute to citizens' quality of life - I do not believe that using undedicated funding for the purchase of a new City Hall, and the additional ancillary costs, is in the best interest of the citizens of New Orleans.

The \$8-million purchase price, combined with currently undetermined build out, relocation, and other related costs, will necessitate the use of monies, i.e. the proposed \$3.8 million in undedicated bond funds, which could instead be used for more important areas to enhance the quality of life for our citizens. Great city needs such as the reopening and enhancement of playgrounds, police and fire stations, street repairs, etc., certainly should be top priority when competing with limited city funds.

While it is important for all of us in city government to multi-task, I cannot in good conscience support this proposed relocation of city government when these kinds of pressing needs remain unmet. This is not to say a modern City Hall is not needed, but as residents are forced to do every day in their own personal lives, we should prioritize and undertake projects in a timeframe consistent with those priorities.

· Further Planning and Timing

Given the above, I would like to see additional planning be conducted with respect to the objectives for a new city government complex, and how those objectives fit into an overall master plan for the revitalization of downtown New Orleans (including the proposed entertainment district around the Superdome). This will entail much more discussion with the public, as well as civic, business and elected leaders, so that the best site can be determined. A new "front door" for the future of New Orleans can in fact be achieved but I do not believe the current transaction has had the necessary level of input.

Further, I feel the current transaction to relocate City Hall is ill-timed bearing in mind the City is on the threshold of new leadership both in the executive and legislative branches of city government. I believe the new Mayor, City Councilmembers and the public at large will want, and should be able, to weigh in on such an important decision. In this vein, I would propose the creation of a six-month Blue Ribbon Panel consisting of the City's living former Mayors and Councilmembers, all of which have previously examined the topic, who can help counsel our future leaders on this important subject matter.

Finally, the timing of the current transaction is problematic as we are currently within the 2009 hurricane season.

Proposed Site

Having recently toured the Chevron building, I am unconvinced that this location is the best fit for, and image of, the seat of New Orleans city government. I question whether the site's aesthetics best represent the image of city government and further question the logistics of operating a constituent-friendly

government in such a compact area. I would recommend that if and when a relocation is pursued the City look carefully at alternatives, including other city-owned buildings, which might present less costs and provide the 'wow' factor which would present a better image for New Orleans. Any such alternatives should be part of a comprehensive planning effort, which includes a full fiscal impact report, constituency access analysis, traffic impact study and a proposed re-usage of the existing City Hall site.

"I look forward to further engaging with the Administration on this important topic and partnering with civic, business and elected leaders in selecting a plan which will be in the best, long-term interest of New Orleans and its citizens."

What: The Special Development Projects & Economic Development (SDPED) and Budget committees will hear testimony from the Administration regarding Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) compliance for city contracts.

As a result of recently passed legislation codifying DBE and local requirements in city contracts, Councilmembers requested a joint hearing on the City's compliance of DBE and local requirements, as enforcement of the program will be instrumental to the success of the new legislation.

On June 18, the Council unanimously passed legislation, co-authored by Council President Arnie Fielkow and District "D" Councilmember Cynthia Hedge-Morrell, which guarantees small, local and disadvantaged businesses obtain greater access to city contracts and any business that includes the use of city funds. The approved Ordinance codifies and extends the provisions set forth by Mayor Ray Nagin's executive order establishing goals for DBE and local small business recovery. It institutes a goal that 50 percent of any project funded by the City be controlled by local businesses. It also establishes an overall goal that 35 percent of any project funded by the City must be controlled by socially and economically disadvantaged businesses, particularly, those located in damaged areas. Individual project goals shall be established on a project-by-project basis and based on availability of locally owned and disadvantaged businesses.

The New Orleans Regional Black Chamber of Commerce, Black Economic Development Council and the New Orleans Business Council, among other business organizations, endorsed the new legislation.



Councilmember-at-Large Clarkson Statement: Thank You to the Broad Coalition of Community Leaders Who Helped Defeat Senate Bill 75 and Save New Orleans' Master Plan

New Orleans, LA - June 26, 2009 - The following is a statement issued from New Orleans City Councilmember-at-Large Jacquelyn Brechtel Clarkson

regarding Wednesday's defeat of Senate Bill 75:

"Senate Bill 75, a measure that would have politicized and derailed the City's master planning process, was defeated on the House floor Wednesday night by a vote of 54 to 37.

"This significant win for New Orleans was the result of hours and hours of work by an extraordinary coalition of New Orleanians - neighborhood leaders from Lakeview to the Lower Ninth Ward, non-profit organizations, the business community, elected and appointed City officials, and many others. Against the odds, we came together to save the City's master plan and the promise it holds for quality of life and economic development in every corner of the City.

"For the efforts of all these groups, I offer my deepest gratitude.

"I want to first thank the neighborhood leaders who turned out to fight for the master plan. These leaders have spent precious time and energy in citywide, district, and neighborhood planning meetings, charting the future of their communities. They trekked to the Capitol for several days to convince legislators that New Orleanians want and need a master plan for the future development of our City.

"I also offer thanks to my colleagues on the City Council, particularly to Councilmembers Shelley Midura

and Stacy Head, who appeared in Baton Rouge to defend a master plan with the force of law on behalf of the City. I also thank Mayor C. Ray Nagin and the City Attorney's Office for taking a clear position that Senate Bill 75 would have violated the New Orleans Home Rule Charter. Members of the City Planning Commission and its staff were also powerful advocates for our City's right to plan its future without interference from the State.

"For masterfully spearheading our efforts with legislators in Baton Rouge, I owe a special thanks to the Business Council of New Orleans and the River Region. I also thank the New Orleans Metropolitan Association of Realtors, the Home Builders Association, and AARP Louisiana for their relentless efforts in our support.

"For their public opposition to this bill, I thank Citizens for One Greater New Orleans, the Preservation Resource Center, and the Bureau of Governmental Research. I also thank the New Orleans Downtown Development District for their educational efforts on the potential negative impact of this bill to development in our City.

"I would also like to thank my staff, who accompanied me on almost a dozen trips to the Capitol throughout the past month working in opposition to this bill.

"Lastly, I want to offer a personal pledge to the residents of New Orleans concerning the master plan. While I was in the Capitol late Wednesday night, I listened as a couple of New Orleans-area legislators explained that some of their residents feared their communities would be left out of this master plan. To them, I say: New Orleans belongs to all of us. And, as Councilmember-at-Large, I am committed to supporting a plan for redevelopment of all areas of the City.

"Rather than being a reason our communities cannot return, this master plan will be the reason our communities can not only return, but thrive and grow. We cannot expect legitimate developers and residential-friendly businesses to invest in areas like New Orleans East, the Lower Ninth Ward, Lakeview, and Gentilly until they can see that the City is committed to those areas. This is exactly why we need a master plan with the force of law. It will show that the City finally has a clear strategy for development.





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New Orleans, LA - June 26, 2009 - City Council President Arnie Fielkow encouraged the Administration to beef up its Office of Compliance in order to bolster enforcement of the City's now codified local and Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) contracting law.

During a joint meeting of the Special Development Projects and Economic Development and Budget committees Thursday, Councilmembers received testimony from Intergovernmental Relations Director Julie Schwam Harris that the Administration currently is preparing a comprehensive plan for its Compliance Office, which Harris said the Administration will be ready to present in 30 days.

Councilmember Fielkow stated he believes in the vital nature of such a reform, in order to ensure the success of the City's most recent law regarding fair distribution of contracts.

"This new local business and DBE law will pay dividends to this community for years to come," said Council President Fielkow. "But in order to have any effect, enforcement of the new law must have teeth. We must have, not just passage of the law, but execution of the law."

Councilmember Fielkow, and Budget Committee Chair Councilmember Cynthia Hedge-Morrell who co-authored the bill, requested the Administration to keep an "open dialogue" with the Council regarding the development of its new compliance plan. Upon completion of the proposed compliance reforms, a legislative agenda item will be placed on the agenda to codify the new enforcement strategies. Council President Fielkow expects these items will be complete for agenda placement either late July or early August.

University's and Tulane University's Boards of Directors to reach an agreement regarding the governance structure for the New Orleans teaching hospital:



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City Council Youth & Recreation Committee Receives Update from FEMA and NORD

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New Orleans, LA - June 26, 2009 - Yesterday, the City Council Youth & Recreation Committee, chaired by Council President Arnie Fielkow, received updates on the former FEMA trailer sites, Harrell Playground, Comiskey and Joe Brown Parks, St. Roch-Sampson, Milne, and Kingswood, among other pools and parks.

Representatives from FEMA, the state, the city's Office of Community Development and New Orleans Recreation Department (NORD) appeared before the committee to present a status report on the restoration of the former FEMA trailer sites. According to the report, all but four of the parks have been returned to the city, falling short of the June 17th deadline that was set at the March 25th meeting for the repair and return of all parks to the city. The unfinished sites are Annunciation, Bunny Friend, McCue Playground and Avenger; however, the group assured the committee that the remaining parks will be completed before the end of July. "I strongly urge you to move expeditiously to get those remaining parks completed and I expect at next month's committee meeting to hear that you have met your deadline," said Council President Fielkow.

Joe Becker, the General Superintendent of the Sewerage and Water Board, reported on the progress of Harrell Playground, located on Sewerage and Water Board property. The playground served as emergency housing for their staff in the days following Katrina. Final construction contracts for the complete restoration of the playground were extended one week to coordinate with NORD's lighting improvements. The park, its improvements, and the track are expected to be open for public use by August 1, 2009.

Comiskey Park remains in litigation. The city revealed no details of the litigation; however, the committee was informed that if all parties agree to

recent requests, the city can take possession of Comiskey Park before litigation is concluded to begin restoring the park to its pre-Katrina status.
NORD's Deputy Director Keith Wright presented the monthly report on NORD facilities and programs. According to Wright, NORD has partnered with several organizations in the community to ensure the success of this year's summer programs, including the recent Health and Recreation Fair at Behrman Playground. The next Health and Recreation Fair is scheduled for September 26, 2009 at Burke Park.
Yesterday represented the fourth in a series of public hearings chaired by Council President Fielkow and the Youth & Recreation Committee to help expedite progress of New Orleans parks, playgrounds and pools.
The next City Council Youth & Recreation Committee meeting will be held on July 29th in the City Council Chamber.

New Orleans, LA - June 29, 2009 - Council President Arnie Fielkow happily thanks all Louisiana legislators who voted down House Bill 60, which aimed to restrict the right of Louisiana's adopted children to have two parents listed on a new birth certificate unless those parents are married in accordance with state law. Ultimately, this legislation would have deprived thousands of children in Louisiana of loving, caring families based on their potential adoptive parents' sexual orientation, as well as making it extremely difficult for children adopted by unmarried couples to apply for standard benefits such as school registration, medical coverage, life insurance and government services.

"The certificate of birth, especially for an adopted child, is a precious document that confers many rights and privileges. Although citizens from around this country, state and the City of New Orleans possess a wide range of views, one issue that will never be controversial is that our children come first," said Councilmember-at-Large Fielkow. "Democrats, Republicans, black, white, Hispanic, Asian, rich, poor -- all of these disparate groups share the conviction that it is a priority to ensure the welfare of our society's children. My heartfelt thanks is given to all legislators who upheld the rights of all Louisiana citizens, and put the needs of all children first."

Council President Fielkow also congratulated the efforts of many others who helped urge state lawmakers to vote against the measure including the Louisiana chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union and the Forum for Equality.

"The Forum for Equality strongly opposed HB 60 because it was a mean spirited bill that hurt children adopted by gay and lesbian couples," said Randy Evans, Political Director for the organization. "We applaud and deeply appreciate Councilman Arnie Fielkow's vigorous efforts to defeat this hurtful bill."





Corps representatives appeared last week before a meeting of the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee, which Senator

Boxer chairs. They made the now familiar argument that of three possible options for redeveloping the London Ave., Orleans Ave., and 17th St. canals, Congress has authorized them to pursue only the cheaper "Option 1," which involves retaining deficient canal walls, relying on existing Sewerage and Water Board pumps to handle falling water, and constructing new pumps at the mouth of each canal to handle rising water.

Senator Boxer, however, insisted that the Corps is authorized to proceed with the more expensive and more effective "Option 2," which would deepen and repave the canals and build new all-purpose pumps,

or "Option 2a," which includes these improvements and also allows for pumping excess water from the canals to the Mississippi River. Senator Boxer pledged to fast track legislation granting the Corps this express authorization, hopefully ending debate on the issue. "This is a major component of hurricane protection for New Orleans," Clarkson said. 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

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New Orleans, LA - June 30, 2009 - City Council President Arnie Fielkow heard compelling testimony today concerning New Orleans incidents of wage theft from laborers, many of them Hispanic, in an information-gathering hearing during the Council's Special Development Projects and Economic Development Committee meeting.

Council President Fielkow, concerned with escalating reports of wage theft and believing there has been too little focus placed on stamping out immoral and unethical contractor fraud, invited a variety

of local labor advocates and law experts to testify about their knowledge of wage thefts occurring in New Orleans.

Council President Fielkow's goal was to compile expert information regarding existing state and federal laws with the ultimate goal of crafting an ordinance criminalizing the activity.

"We will be taking the advice and expertise from the authorities and victims who testified today, and will draft an ordinance to introduce to the full Council," said Council President Fielkow. "I have every hope and expectation that all seven members will vote to criminalize this terrible conduct."

According to the local Congress of Day Laborers, a recent survey of 300 Hispanic day laborers indicated systematic abuses of wages for completed work. Eighty percent of those 300 interviewed experienced a total of 12,000 days unpaid and a total of \$400,000 of unpaid work.

Victims of such wage theft appeared before the Committee to notify members of their recent experiences. One witness was hired by a contractor, performed work,

attempted to collect his pay and was threatened by the contractor, who ultimately called the police. When the police arrived, the unpaid worker was arrested and subsequently jailed for four months.

"There was no opportunity to explain what happened...and I spent four months in jail," said Josue Diaz, a local day laborer.

Groups in attendance advocating for just such legislation included Larry Bagneris from the Mayor's Human Relations Committee, the Congress of Day Laborers, New Orleans Workers' Center for Racial Justice, Loyola University's School of Law, Catholic Charities and Louisiana Association of General Contractors.

Homeowners and native New Orleanian laborers also testified to Saket Soni, New Orleans Workers' the recent spate of wage theft offenses on the part of some contractors.

Council President Fielkow said he believes, "the vast majority of contractors are honest people but regrettably in life the small few create a bad name for the majority," however he assured those in attendance that he would "take action to protect those most vulnerable in the New Orleans community."

"I can also assure you that just as July and August are the hottest months in New Orleans, we hope you can come back in August when we apply the heat to these offenders in the form of new city law."

Council President Fielkow intends to have new legislation prepared and on the Council agenda by mid- to late-August, just in time to

Council President Fielkow Statement: Calls Gov. Jindal's Veto of Funding For New Orleans Adolescent Hospital Irresponsible; Sponsors Forum for Legislative Override

New Orleans, **LA - July 1**, **2009 -** "I am truly frustrated with Governor Bobby Jindal's decision to apply a line item veto to \$14.2 million in funds dedicated by the Legislature to the New Orleans Adolescent Hospital - one of the last vestiges of mental health facilities in Orleans Parish.

"Governor Jindal must know what this veto will mean for those New Orleans-area citizens in need of hospitalization: the reduction of in-patient beds by another 35 for a total loss of 231 in-patient beds since Hurricane Katrina; that parents, guardians and/or significant others will be forced to commute 40 miles to see and assist in the assessment and treatment of their loved ones; and there will be zero public sector facilities in New Orleans to provide comprehensive inpatient and outpatient services for children and adolescents.

"I beseech Gov. Jindal and Department of Health and Hospital Secretary Alan Levine to reconsider this critical decision. I heartily thank all legislators who voted against the closure and who voted in favor of additional funding to keep this crucial facility open. Various groups have requested, and I have accepted, to sponsor a forum for advocates to appeal to legislators to override Governor Jindal's veto. "Throughout its history New Orleans has always enjoyed a great blend of cultures, which has lent to our uniqueness and success, and post Katrina we have grown even more," said Council President Fielkow.

- 6. What is the cost of physically moving the offices now housed in City Hall and other leased spaces to the Chevron Building?
- 7. With hurricane season in mind, when is the move planned?
- 8. What is the Chevron Building's hurricane rating?
- 9. By what date will the Council receive a comprehensive gain/loss balance sheet on this purchase?

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

New Orleans, LA - July 7, 2009 - District "E" Councilmember Cynthia Willard-Lewis is distributing the information below on the Agriculture Street Landfill Litigation to her constituents in District "E."

The Agriculture Street Landfill (ASL) is a former landfill, closed in 1966, that has been developed in part for residential use. In the early 1980's, Gordon Plaza Subdivision, Housing Authority of New Orleans (HANO) housing, Gordon Plaza Apartments, the Moton School, the Press Park residential area and community center were constructed over the landfill.

Site contaminants have been detected in soil, dust, air, and garden produce - the highest levels of contaminants have been detected in the undeveloped area of the site, which has been classified as a public health hazard.

Councilmember Willard-Lewis said, "District E residents have many

concerns in relation to this landfill, including - cleanup activities, runoff of contaminants, maintenance of undeveloped property, and poor response from utility companies, as well as health concerns. New Orleans, LA - July 7, 2009 - District "E" Councilmember Cynthia Willard-Lewis is alerting District "E" residents that the odor permeating the air this morning is a result of a release of ethyl acrylate at the Dow Chemical Plant in Hahnville. According to Dow officials, the chemical is not dangerous at the levels released.

The St. Charles Parish Office of Emergency Preparedness indicates that although very pungent, the smell is non-toxic to people and animals. The chemical may cause effects if inhaled or absorbed through skin, and it can irritate or burn the skin and eyes. Some people may experience headaches, dizziness and vomiting.

Dow informed St. Charles Parish officials that a crack had developed along a seam in a tank at the plant, which released the odor at about 6:40 a.m. this morning.

The current weather conditions have kept the release from dissipating as quickly as possible and the odor may last for some time today. The strong, chemical smell is being reported across the metro area, from St. Charles Parish to Metairie to New Orleans. St. Charles parish is working with Dow Chemical to remedy the situation.

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Site contaminants have been detected in soil, dust, air, and garden produce - the highest levels of contaminants have been detected in the undeveloped area of the site, which has been classified as a public health hazard.

Councilmember Midura Statement Re: 2010 City Council Election

It has been a privilege to serve the City of New Orleans as the District "A" Councilmember for the last three years. I have been humbled by this honor, and am forever grateful to all who had confidence in my ability and entrusted me with the opportunity to represent the district.

During my time in office, I have aspired to be a reformer of government systems, watchdog of public funds, and champion of accountability and better government. I am proud of the accomplishments my office has achieved in these areas, the highlight of which was spearheading the creation and funding of the Office of Inspector General (OIG) to fight corruption, mismanagement, and government waste. I believe the creation of this office is the single most important step the City has taken toward reform of government and will have historic impact as it grows with charter-protected funding. Please click here to view a list of highlights during my time in office as District "A" Councilmember.

After much thought and reflection, I have decided that I will not be a candidate for re-election to the District "A" City Council seat in 2010. Having experienced first-hand the challenges of running a long-shot campaign in 2006, I wanted to make this decision publicly as early as possible for the benefit of potential candidates in District "A" so they may have enough time to decide whether to seek election. I believe the City Council will benefit from continued new blood at the dais and look forward to supporting a candidate who will pick up the mantle of reform and continue the march toward good government.

Like so many of you, Hurricane Katrina was a call to duty for me, and I felt a deep sense of obligation to

contribute to the recovery of the City of New Orleans in a significant way; hence my run for and subsequent election to the District A seat in the 2006 race. I have fulfilled my campaign promises: the OIG has been created and funded, the charter has been amended to require a master plan to guide land use decisions (rather than continued politicization); the Council has approved and funded the establishment of a public/private economic development entity, the City is better prepared for hurricanes, and the neighborhoods have been deeply engaged with my Council office throughout my term. As lagniappe, we have made significant long-term structural reforms to the criminal justice system through the involvement of the Vera Institute, and we have approved a citywide energy efficiency program the details of which are currently under development.

True public service requires a deep sacrifice of time and a selfless commitment to pursuing the common good. My personal goal for public service never was to build a Midura family political machine. Indeed, career public servants too often forget that "service" is to the public, rather than to themselves. Too often the political courage needed to confront the most difficult decisions we as public officials must make is compromised in the quest for re-election or election to the next public office. Rather, my hope was to improve the lives of our citizens and their fair access to opportunity by achieving significant reforms that would position the City for a stronger future. By example and for similar motivations, I hoped like-minded individuals would re-engage in the public policy arena.

While much work remains, I believe this goal has been accomplished, and my period in city government has served its purpose. I look forward to returning to life in the private sector.

Rather than using data or best practices or evidence of success, policy and budget decisions with long-term consequences for the City's future are too often made in the absence of sufficient public input, and instead on the basis of personal whim, anecdotal evidence, or alliance with entrenched institutions that have much to lose or gain by a given decision. Make no mistake about it: defending the status quo is not in the best interest of this City, and anyone who does so is not putting the City's interest ahead of their own. The status quo has not worked, is not working, and will not work to make New Orleans a worldclass city. I will spend the last year or so of my term fighting adherents to the status quo, as I believe our greatest hope for the future lies in continued reform.

The process of deciding whether or not to run for this seat in 2010 has led me to focus on what I want to get done for the City while I am still serving and in a position to effect change. Constituents should continue to expect honest and candid discussion from me as I will be as or more vocal than ever about our city's continuing challenges, the greatest of which is the daunting budget shortfall we will face in 2010 and how we choose to cut spending to make ends meet. Councilmember-at-Large Jacquelyn Brechtel Clarkson Statement: We Must Defeat Senate Bill 75

New Orleans, LA - June 22, 2009 - In a citywide election in November of 2008, New Orleans voters approved a major amendment to the City's Home Rule Charter. This amendment requires the City Planning Commission to draft a master plan for the future development of New Orleans; a plan that, when complete, the City's elected and appointed leaders will have to abide by under force of law.

This was a historic moment for New Orleans and a serious win for neighborhoods, small businesses, legitimate major developers, and good government advocates.

New Orleans residents have spent countless hours drafting plans that have ended up collecting dust in a forgotten room in City Hall. Meanwhile, New Orleans continues to suffer from an outdated, dysfunctional system of land use in which zoning decisions are often politicized, made with little or no citizen input, and favor a privileged few. This system leads to corner bars in neighborhoods where they don't belong, landfills dumped onto vacant land in New Orleans East, and major developers who wouldn't dare invest in a city where the rules can change tomorrow. The 2008 charter amendment, supported by the administration and six of seven councilmembers, was meant to change that. It promised a coherent, meaningful plan that would bring desperately-needed stability to our City.

Senate Bill 75 threatens to derail this. Senate Bill 75 would again politicize the planning process by requiring yet another vote of the people on the plan before it can acquire the force of law. This argument - that the people should vote on the plan itself - is all too familiar. A small group of residents, developers, and consultants spent tens of thousands of dollars on TV commercials and radio ads pushing this argument in an attempt to defeat the charter amendment in 2008 - they lost.

Now, Senate Bill 75 is taking this argument to the state. It is a thinly veiled attempt to usurp the will of the people, derail the master planning process, and revert New Orleans back to the old-school land use system that has stalled economic development here for decades.

No other city in the country puts a master plan - a document composed of more than a thousand of pages - to the vote of the people. This would be like putting a state budget to a statewide vote. People would likely pick out and vote against one line, and drafting the document would become highly political. More importantly, the results of a disapproving vote would be impossible to interpret. Which part of the master plan should we change to get a favorable vote: community health clinics, plans for improving transportation, or certain components of the land use plan? How many more rounds of public meetings, changes to the plan, and costly citywide votes would we have to undergo before our City finally gets a plan and the stability we need? And for how long would people be willing to come out to meetings for a plan that might again mean nothing? Senate Bill 75 would also violate the Home Rule Charter, which was instituted in the 1950s to allow the City to govern itself on issues like city planning without the state stepping in.

For all these reasons and more, we must defeat this bill. Mayor Ray Nagin, a majority of the City Council, the Bureau of Governmental Research, the Business Council, the Home Builders Association, the New Orleans Metropolitan Association of Realtors, Citizens for One Greater New Orleans, many state legislators, and a host of neighborhoods groups have publicly opposed it.

As the author of the 2008 charter amendment and as an elected official who worked vigorously for its passage, I have spent the past several weeks working against Senate Bill 75 in the Legislature. Unfortunately, the bill has already passed the full Senate and the House Municipal Affairs Committee. Defeating it on the House floor is our last chance. I will continue to fight it, and I need you to fight it, too. Please call or write your representative in the House and tell them to vote against Senate Bill 75.

Councilmember-at-Large Clarkson Statement Re: Purchase of Chevron Building for City Hall

New Orleans, LA - July 28, 2009 - "Today, I voted against purchasing the Chevron Building as a new location for City Hall.

"When the Mayor first approached the Council with the idea of relocating City Hall, I considered the issue with an open mind. I was not predisposed to oppose or support the purchase because of any personalities involved. Instead, I wanted to give the idea a fair hearing and all the due diligence that it and my

constituents deserve.

"I did not then, nor do I now, think the City needs a new City Hall for ourselves while many of our constituents continue to live without streetlights, parks, and in some areas without libraries and hospitals. But, as a Realtor with 40 years of experience, I did see an excellent financial opportunity to buy a modern office building at a great price as an investment, instead of pumping the same dollar amount into a building that probably will be demolished in the coming decade.

"I believe the City's leaders ought to "think big" about the current City Hall site - a site that, with the renovations to the Superdome, Dominion Towers, the Hyatt, and the demolition of the old state buildings around Duncan Plaza, is land too valuable to be holding only a dilapidated City Hall. This site should instead be master planned for a public/private, mixed-development, government complex with an architecturally appropriate City Hall, incorporating the adjacent state property and Duncan Plaza, with private tenants to buy down the cost of government. Other progressive cities have done this, and it has worked. Twenty years ago, as a District Councilmember, I proposed this idea to the Administration. With that perspective, I have taken the opportunity to investigate the possibility of using the Chevron Building as an interim City Hall. I have consulted with my fellow Councilmembers, community leaders, constituents, former professional colleagues, the Mayor, and members of his administration.

"But even in spite of the great opportunity and potential I see for this land, I have continued to have serious reservations about the purchase. Without a comprehensive, public plan for a new City Hall development; a plan that the public has time to understand and buy into; a plan that we can show beyond a reasonable doubt will contribute to the City's wealth and not detract from its recovery, purchasing the Chevron Building is a mistake. With a team of the best minds in this City, we may yet have a chance in the future to come up with a planning process that provides for a new City Hall that doesn't detract from recovery. But with the contract for the Chevron Building on the table today, my vote is 'No.' "

New Orleans, LA - July 29, 2009 - The New Orleans City Council Budget Committee met this afternoon at 2 p.m. in the Council Chamber. One of the agenda highlights was a report on the cost of immediate repairs and replacements needed at City Hall, presented by Cynthia Sylvain-Lear, Deputy Chief Administrative Officer, and William Chrisman, Director of Capital Projects.

According to the report, \$9,650,000 is needed immediately to fund such projects as a new roof, and new boilers. Another \$9 million is estimated to be needed by the end of the year. A further \$21 million

Councilmember Hedge-Morrell

is forecast for ongoing needs, the bulk of which is slated for asbestos abatement, bringing the total needed to approximately \$39,785,000.

District "D" Councilmember Cynthia Hedge-Morrell, Chair of the Budget Committee, said, "We need to provide a safe workplace for our city workers. This money won't be spent on plush offices or upgrades, it's just to make the building usable for the next 20 years."

Also on the agenda was a presentation from Orleans Parish Criminal Sheriff Marlin Gusman, who reported that the Sheriff's department is facing a critical budget shortfall. According to the Sheriff, his department will run out of funds in August, forcing the courts to cut hours and services unless additional funding is found.

Councilmember Hedge-Morrell stated, "We need to keep the courts working.

If we don't get defendants to trial quickly, we incur even more costs in housing them longer. The Council will work to find a way to fund the continued operation of the Sheriff's Department. We can't afford, from a public safety standpoint, to do anything less."

New Orleans, LA - August 5, 2009 -Tomorrow at the regular City Council meeting, members will vote on Resolution R-09-404 in support of the Coastal Restoration and Enhancement through Science and Technology (CREST) Program.

"Coastal restoration is critical to the survival of our area and requires a clear understanding of the problem with the mission of developing the best solution. CREST serves as a much

needed resource by providing the latest science and best technologies," said Council President Fielkow.

Established in 2003, CREST utilizes the exceptional concentration of coastal restoration scientists and researchers found in Louisiana and provides training for the next generation of scientists by supporting graduate and postgraduate students. 11 universities in Louisiana, including four in New Orleans - Loyola University of New Orleans, Southern University of New Orleans, Tulane University of New Orleans, University of New Orleans, as well as, the University of Southern Mississippi have joined CREST as Member Universities. However, funding for CREST is extremely vulnerable, and through this Resolution, the Council expresses its support for the CREST Program and urges the State's Congressional Delegation to work with their colleagues in the U.S. Congress and with the National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration to ensure continued financial support of this important program.

Council President Fielkow will host an Order of Business for and present a Proclamation to the world-renowned Batiste musical family, the Recovery School District (RSD), Greater New Orleans Afterschool Partnership and the New Orleans South African Connection for partnering to establish and administer the International School of Fine and Performing Arts at Live Oak Elementary. The school will serve as the RSD's flagship arts school and students will be taught by acclaimed artists from around the world. The curriculum will supplement traditional academic subjects with quality arts education, music, drama, dance, and the visual arts. The group has also put together a short musical performance, which will take place prior to the Council meeting.

Also on tomorrow's agenda Council President Fielkow has requested a presentation by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers regarding the June 2011 deadline to provide a quality system of protection for a 100-year storm. Appearing before the Council to present status reports will be Corps officials and Southeast Louisiana Flood Protection Authority's East Executive Director Tim Doody.

In 2007, the US Congress allocated more than \$12 billion to the Corps to repair Katrina-related damages, provide long-term solutions to pre-existing unsound structures and completely strengthen the City's hurricane defenses to combat a 100-year storm. As project timetables become more clear, the Corps has stated that it may not be able to complete its 100-year storm protection by the June 2011 deadline, and Council President Fielkow has requested that Corps officials testify to the Council on the matter

Also at the request of Council President Fielkow, Justin Augustine of Veolia Transportation will report on the Regional Transit Authority's plans to expand the streetcar system.



The Council also passed an emergency Motion allowing for the immediate allocation of additional funds for security services at Criminal District Court, and Ordinances establishing the criteria for the assignment of take home vehicles and a moratorium to preserve the quality of District "D" neighborhoods.

Additionally, the Council addressed a report on and passed a Resolution supporting the action of the Regional Transit Authority (RTA) to expand the streetcar system.

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The Council passed an emergency Motion M-09-409, authored by Councilmember Hedge-Morrell, to provide for the immediate adoption of Ordinance Calendar Nos. 27,615 and 27,616, which will allow for allocation of additional funds to Criminal Sheriff Marlin Gusman for maintaining security services and measures at Criminal Court.

The Council moved that a state of emergency exists as a result of the inability of the Criminal Sheriff to continue providing critical security services and measures including metal detection screening on a daily basis at the Criminal Court building, due to a lack of funding. The Home Rule Charter provides a means by which these Ordinances may be adopted immediately due to the existence of this emergency.

The Motion reflects the Council's belief that the Criminal Court is a major component of the City's criminal justice system and requires a high level of security in order to protect the lives and safety of the City's workers, citizens and visitors.

Addressed Request from District Attorney Regarding Case Transfers



District Attorney Leon Cannizzaro District Attorney (DA) Leon Cannizzaro appeared before the Council to request that the Council pass an Ordinance allowing for the transfer of simple possession of marijuana cases from Criminal District Court to Municipal Court. Cannizzaro also requested that the Ordinance allow police officers to issue a ticket to, rather than make an arrest of, individuals charged with simple possession of marijuana.

Cannizzaro Cannizzaro Cannizzaro informed the Council that his office is currently dealing with 2,100 open cases, a third of which involve simple possession of marijuana. By current law, simple possession of marijuana offenders must be arrested and taken to Central Lockup and the case must go to Criminal Court.

The DA stated that the Ordinance will allow the Criminal Court and the DA to focus on dealing with more serious charges, use resources more efficiently, relieve crowded conditions in jail, and cut costs, while still ensuring that offenders are held accountable. Cannizzaro ensured the Council these measures would not apply to those cases dealing with offenders charged with possession of large amounts of marijuana or dealing marijuana.



District "C" Councilmember James Carter said, "We appreciate the District Attorney making us aware of this issue. The DA's proposal will affect the entire criminal justice system and must be considered carefully. We will bring representatives from all the relevant criminal justice agencies to the table for a full and complete discussion of the proposal."

At the request of several Councilmembers, Criminal Justice Committee Chair Councilmember Carter stated that this matter would be placed as the first item on the agenda for the Criminal Justice Committee meeting to be held Wednesday, August

12 at 10 a.m. in the Council Chamber.

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contributes to the overall operations and recovery of the City and maintenance of its infrastructure, and the vehicle is used to respond to critical needs on a 24-hour basis.

District "D" Councilmember Cynthia Hedge-Morrell said, "Our City is still recovering and we need to ensure that all departments contributing to the rebuilding of this City have the tools and resources necessary to do their jobs. Ensuring that these departments and staff have access to vehicles when necessary will help them to perform their duties in an efficient and timely manner."

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Rule 47 of the Council's Rules and Regulations requires that the Council establish an Emergency Preparedness

Plan. The plan was developed in coordination with the Office of Emergency Preparedness of the City's Office of Homeland Security.

The plan provides mechanisms to ensure that the City Council can sustain operational capacity under emergency conditions.

Supported Expansion of Streetcar System

The representatives presented the Council with information on a study, completed by RTA, to determine the feasibility of future streetcar

alignments in the New Orleans Central Business District (CBD) / French Quarter Corridor. Of the six alignments studied during the analysis, the Loyola/UPT Howard Avenue, Convention Center/Riverfront and French Quarter/Press Street loops were determined to be the most cost effective and were recommended by RTA staff to the RTA Board of Commissioners for approval and further development.

The Council passed Resolution R-09-408, authored by Councilmember Clarkson, supporting the action of the RTA Board of Commissioners to take the necessary steps to move forward on the assembly of the three new alignments, and pursue Federal, State and local funds for continued project development activities necessary to design and build these streetcar projects.

Council Vice President Jacquelyn Brechtel Clarkson said, "We are grateful to the RTA for its vision in creating these three streetcar projects and its dedication to bringing streetcar service to various areas of the City. These new streetcar lines will serve as a catalyst for economic development in neighborhoods near the new lines."



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
New Orleans, LA - August 6, 2009 - At today's regular City Council meeting, Councilmembers will vote on Motion M-09-406, a measure finalizing the nomination of six local community leaders for the New Orleans Economic Development Council (NOEDC) Board of Directors.

At its June 2 meeting, the City

Council voted unanimously on an Ordinance, authored by Council President Arnie Fielkow and co-authored by District "D" Councilmember Cynthia Hedge-Morrell, which established a publicprivate partnership dedicated to overseeing economic development in New Orleans. The Ordinance dedicated \$2 million from the 2008 Economic Development Fund millage. A 17-member board consisting of individuals with diverse public, private and non-profit backgrounds will lead the NOEDC and will guide the organization's mission, goals and strategic objectives.

"This is going to create a long-term vision for New Orleans," said Council President Fielkow. "It will change the landscape of economic development in our city and will establish a development strategy that benefits everyone."

The City Council submitted six NOEDC board nominations, with each Councilmember proposing one name for consideration, barring Council President Fielkow who abstained from submitting a nomination in favor of allowing all other Councilmembers a candidate. In addition, other names will be submitted by Mayor C. Ray Nagin, the Mayor's Executive Assistant for Development, the Chairman of the City Planning Commission, the Chairman of the New Orleans Redevelopment Authority, and representatives from the private and non-governmental sectors. Council President Fielkow Responds to Mayor's Suspension Of Public-Private Partnership

New Orleans, LA - August 6, 2009 - "The Mayor's decision today to indefinitely suspend the city's first public-private partnership (PPP) is highly detrimental to the

citizens of New Orleans and reflects a thinly camouflaged retaliation for the outcome of the Council's vote on the Chevron building. It is an incredibly irresponsible and retaliatory reaction that only hurts the economic development efforts of the city, which have been woefully lacking for a number of years. Development of the PPP has been a studied, collaborative two-year effort with a nominating process that was recommended by the International Economic Development Council (IEDC) and adopted by the Administration. It is my understanding the IEDC's referenced July letter was intended to help guide the PPP board selection process - not to shut it down - and the IEDC has been working closely with the private-sector nominating organizations to clarify that process.

"The PPP was an effort to incorporate the "best practices" of economic development entities which have proven to be successful in many other cities. It is harmful that the Mayor is unwilling, despite his former support, to bring New Orleans into the 21st century in this area.

"The Mayor's action today is also disrespectful of the Council's past vote in support of funding for the PPP and the nomination of PPP board members by the Council, an item on the Council's agenda today. I and many others stand willing and ready to perfect and complete the process of establishing the city's first dedicated economic development organization and to ensure an inclusive membership on the PPP board. New Orleans deserves better than governance by retaliation. Real leadership is needed to fulfill our commitment to the future success of the city."

Special Development Projects & Economic Development Committee To Address Updates on DBE Enforcement and TIF Policy In Joint Session with Budget Committee Tomorrow Morning

What: Tomorrow's joint meeting of the New Orleans City Council's Special Development Projects and Economic Development (SDPED) Committee and Budget Committee will include important updates from Administration officials on two critical new city policies involving business: enforcement of increased city contracts to companies certified as Disadvantaged Business Enterprises (DBEs) and/or locally-owned companies, and a presentation on Mayor Ray Nagin's new Tax Increment Finance (TIF) policy, established by executive order July 17.

Council President Arnie Fielkow has emphasized the need for greater enforcement of the city's existing DBE/local contracting policy, particularly following the council's unanimous passage of new DBE/local contracting requirements. The legislation, authored by Councilman Fielkow, guarantees small, local and disadvantaged businesses obtain greater access to city contracts and any business that includes the use of city funds by codifying and extending the DBE goals set forth by the mayor's executive order. The second half of increasing the frequency of DBE contracts is enforcement, which is why Councilman Fielkow has asked the administration to review and improve its enforcement procedures over this last month. Alvin Porter, the city's DBE compliance officer, will be on hand for testimony as will representatives of the Chief Administrative Office (CAO) and Intergovernmental Relations.

Another update will come from Intergovernmental Relations in the form of a full report on the mayor's new Tax Increment Finance policy, established by executive order July 17.

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New Orleans, LA - August 11, 2009 -Council President Arnie Fielkow says his and other New Orleans delegates' Saturday site visit to Big League Dreams Park and Hawaiian Falls Water Park Complex near Dallas returned great opportunities and inspiration for a similar development in New Orleans. Council President Fielkow, a cadre of Louisiana elected officials and eastern New Orleans economic development leaders traveled to the sports complex and water park in Mansfield, Texas as a proactive effort to explore viable opportunities to return the

currently-defunct Six Flags property in eastern New Orleans back to commerce.

Council President Fielkow led a delegation of approximately 25 elected officials and local economic development leaders on a fivehour tour of the two facilities with the hope of garnering interest in a similar potential development for the East. After visiting the facility first hand and witnessing both the direct and indirect economic impact the development provides for the area in Mansfield, Council President Fielkow feels confident it would be a good investment for the city of New Orleans to make, particularly for the Six Flags site in the East, though he remains open-minded to other viable proposals.

"I have always been open-minded to a sports complex, water park, theme park or other comparable development for the old Six Flags site and I don't believe we should lock ourselves into any single

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project," said Fielkow. "My primary concerns for any facility that would replace Six Flags are that the proposal be a catalyst for the area's growth, that it be successful and sustainable for the long term, that it be affordable and that it contributes to a first-rate quality of life for the surrounding community. After seeing the Big League Dreams Park for myself, and witnessing the real economic impact synergies that exist of both a direct and indirect nature, I have real optimism for a similar investment in New Orleans. These are very family-friendly, professionally-run and safe facilities."

Louisiana legislators joining Council President Fielkow for the site tour included U.S. Congressman Anh "Joseph" Cao, State Senators Ann Duplessis and Edwin Murray, State Representatives Austin Badon and Cedric Richmond and members of the Eastern New Orleans Neighborhood Advisory Commission (ENONAC).

Big League Dreams maintains nine facilities around the nation and the business model for Big League Dreams is an intriguing and viable one for New Orleans. Municipalities pay for the cost of building the sports complex. City government and Big League Dreams then execute a 30-year lease and revenue-sharing agreement. Once construction is complete, the Big League Dreams company is 100percent responsible for maintaining, operating and booking all sports events. During the day, Monday through Thursday, the entire complex is open free of charge to the public. In the evening Monday through Thursday, the facility is available for local sports leagues and school teams. During the weekend, the complex is used for regional tournament play, which brings in significant economic impact to the community. Given New Orleans' popularity, it is expected that such tournaments would draw from a regional and perhaps national base.

"The trip to Big League Dreams and Hawaiian Falls was fabulous," said Wall. "This proposed project represents true economic development for eastern New Orleans, as well as the city. It brings a safe family atmosphere, firstclass sports entertainment and a fun tropical theme water park. A combination Big League Dreams and Hawaiian Falls development is a major anchor and a viable catalyst for economic development in the city."

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New Orleans, LA - August 11, 2009 - At today's joint meeting of the New Orleans City Council's Special Development Projects and Economic Development and Budget committees, City Council President Arnie Fielkow called for the administration, within 30 days, to provide a specific plan for dedicated enforcement of the city's recently-codified Disadvantaged Business Enterprises (DBEs) and local business utilization ordinance.

After receiving details of the

administration's current DBE/local enforcement efforts from Deputy Director of Intergovernmental Affairs Julie Schwam Harris and Compliance Director Alvin Porter, Fielkow emphasized the city's need for a comprehensive, specific enforcement plan.

"We've had a compliance program since 2006 but there has been a lot of objection from minority business groups regarding not having an appropriate execution team in place," said Fielkow. "As chairman of the economic development committee, I want to see a specific plan of execution and enforcement for the law put in place in June.

"Trying to ensure compliance with a one-person office has not been successful and we can't wait for another year," Fielkow said.

Fielkow asked the administration to bring back, in no more than 30

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days, a specific plan as to: - how the current city enforcement office can be beefed up; - the potential for outsourcing compliance as many cities have done; or - the potential combination of the two The ordinance, unanimously approved by the council in June, codifies and extends the provisions set forth by Mayor Ray Nagin's executive order establishing goals for DBE and local small business recovery. It institutes a goal that 50 percent of any project funded by the city must be controlled by local businesses. It also establishes an overall goal that 35 percent of any project funded by the city must be controlled by socially and economically disadvantaged businesses, particularly those located in damaged areas. Individual project goals shall be established on a project-by-project basis and based on availability of locally owned and disadvantaged businesses. The legislation was overwhelmingly endorsed by the New Orleans Regional Black Chamber of Commerce, the New Orleans Business Council, the Black Economic Development Council and the Urban League of Greater New Orleans because it guarantees equity in the contracting process.



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New Orleans, LA - August 19, 2009 - Councilmember-at-Large Jacquelyn Brechtel Clarkson will travel to Baton Rouge today with leaders from around the state to lobby the Louisiana Recovery Authority (LRA) for funds for the National World War II Museum in New Orleans.

"The Museum has proved to be one of our region's greatest economic development engines," Councilmember Clarkson said. "We need the LRA to give the Museum the full funds it is requesting for its shovel-ready projects."

The Museum is undergoing a \$300 million expansion that will quadruple the size of the existing facility, including exhibit pavilions, a theater, a themed restaurant, a public parade ground, and much more.

Once this expansion is completed, the Museum will spur a \$102 million annual economic impact, bring in \$12 million each year in annual net tax revenue to Louisiana, draw 650,000 visitors annually, and create 430 permanent Louisiana jobs.

Today the Museum is requesting \$10 million from the LRA to fund the construction of its "Campaigns Pavilion." The LRA is responsible for awarding federal stimulus funds in the form of Community Development

Block Grants to shovel-ready projects around the state. The Museum has already raised millions in private funds toward this project. Once it begins, it will lead to the creation of 554 jobs and have an economic impact of \$69 million.
"I have a twenty-year affiliation with the World War II Museum - as a Museum Trustee, a State Legislator, a New Orleans District City Councilmember, and now as a Councilmember-at-Large," Councilmember Clarkson said. "From these varied perspectives, I have witnessed firsthand the economic benefit the Museum has continued to bring to our city, region, and state."

Council President Arnie Fielkow Proposes Legislation Banning Weapons From City Parks and Recreational Facilities

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New Orleans, LA - August 19, 2009 - Council President Arnie Fielkow will introduce legislation Thursday, which aims to ban illegal possession of firearms or weapons in public buildings and within 1,000 feet of recreational facilities, as a response to the near-tragic, Aug. 10 shooting at the New Orleans Recreation Department's (NORD) St. Bernard Community Center.

Council President Fielkow, in an effort to make the city's parks and recreational facilities safer, will introduce an ordinance for first reading that would make it illegal for

anyone to possess "any weapon or firearm, ammunition or components of firearms or ammunition, while in a public building," other than a law enforcement officer or any other persons duly authorized to carry weapons. Any person who is convicted of a violation of this section shall be fined a penalty of \$500 and imprisoned for six months, the maximum allowed under municipal law. The ordinance also would make it illegal for any person, other than law enforcement or other authorized persons, to possess or utilize weaponry within 1,000 feet of a recreational facility.

Recreational facilities are defined as any "public or privately owned and/ or operated facility which is authorized, permitted or licensed for the conduct of picnics, athletic or similar leisure activities, including but not

limited to: parks, playgrounds, swimming facilities, gymnasiums, stadiums and community and neighborhood centers."

"The drive-by shooting at NORD's St. Bernard Community Center last week is a disturbing example of how far criminals have descended in their utter lack of compassion and concern for their fellow humans," said Fielkow.

"Three people were shot - thankfully not fatally - while coaches were gathered in the NORD center. We are extremely fortunate we are not, this week, burying dozens of our city's children."

"We as leaders must maximize the penalties for any callous person willing to employ a weapon in the vicinity of a public building, park or recreational facility," Fielkow said.

As a matter of procedure, once introduced, the earliest this legislation could be up for passage by a full vote of the council would be at the Sept. 3 council meeting.

In conjunction with the ordinance, Council President Fielkow is additionally filing a resolution urging the Louisiana Legislature to allow all municipalities to pass more stringent laws to address the violent crime and the abhorrent threat of violent crime against New Orleans youth.

"The city is largely pre-empted by state law when it comes to enacting legislation involving weapons use, which contributes to violent crime," said Fielkow. "For that reason, I am proposing the City Council pass the maximum penalty we are allowed to impose and, by resolution, ask that the Legislature pass additional laws next spring in an effort to deter violence against our city's most precious asset - our youth."



Director of Health Systems Development for LPHI The Council passed Resolution R-09-432, authored by Councilmember Fielkow, expressing support for the Louisiana Department of Health and Hospitals (DHH), the Louisiana Public Health Institute (LPHI), and numerous public and private not-for-profit organizations for their work to provide affordable health care to the uninsured and underinsured in the Greater New Orleans region through the Primary Care Access and Stabilization Grant (PCASG), which expires September 30, 2010.

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) awarded \$100 million to the State of Louisiana in July 2007 through the three-year PCASG to stabilize, expand and improve community-based primary and mental

health care services in the Greater New Orleans region in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina.

Clayton Williams, Director of Health Systems Development for LPHI, appeared before the Council to offer his support for the Resolution.

Established Process for Proper Collection of Property Liens

The Council passed Ordinance Calendar Nos. 27,603 and 27,604, authored by Councilmember Head, to establish processes to ensure proper payment of property liens.

Ordinance Calendar No. 27,603 establishes penalties for collection costs relative to outstanding liens. Ordinance Calendar No. 27,604 establishes, as part of the City's process for collection of liens, that any payment collected for property taxes will first satisfy all outstanding liens, and only when all outstanding liens are satisfied in full will payment be applied towards property taxes.

District "B" Councilmember Stacy Head said, "These Ordinances will provide

This issue will be discussed in a more detailed and comprehensive hearing during an upcoming joint meeting of the Budget and Recovery Committees.



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

New Orleans, LA - August 28, 2009 - The New Orleans City Council's Youth and Recreation Committee today received a presentation from the New Orleans Recreation Citizens Advisory Panel (CAP), regarding its proposals for revitalizing New Orleans Recreation Department (NORD) facilities, including the creation of a new, independent recreation and playground commission governing entity and increased funding through a property tax millage. Entergy New Orleans President and CEO Rod West, who co-chairs CAP with Roy Glapion and Bobby Garon, provided the committee with a 42-page summary of the revitalization, the result of more than a year of discussions, research and public input.

"NORD is extremely important to this panel and we said from the beginning that if we were going to take this issue on, nothing would be off limits," said West. "This discussion would be an intellectually honest discussion and we would be disregarding turf battles."

CAP's proposal consists of restoring NORD's parks and playgrounds - which 30 years ago served as an exceptional and activity-filled outlet for New Orleans youth - by increasing funding, both public and private, and creating an independent commission composed of a cross section of the community. CAP's proposed commission would be a 12-member board, for which the mayor and City Council would make nominations. Area university presidents select the ultimate members. The mayor's office would have five appointees, the City Council five appointees, the New Orleans Hornets one appointee and the New Orleans Saints one appointee.

West and the other CAP members emphasized these reform proposals do not represent a "privatizing" of the city's recreational facilities, pointing out that this new entity would be an independent public body subject to all public record and meetings laws. This independence renders NORD less prone to the pitfalls of political turnover as the commission would be tasked with the freedom to hire a superintendent, who would be the single point of accountability, West said. That frequent turnover -12 directors in 31 years - results in poor continuity and instability of programs, said West. All of these reforms would be completed through a public referendum and Home Rule Charter amendment.

"We can do nothing by accepting the status quo or we can hold ourselves to a higher standard for our children," he said.

West elaborated to the committee CAP's determined "must-have" principles for success, which were adopted from many of the recreational department best practices around the country, including Philadelphia, Cincinnati and East Baton Rouge Parish. He emphasized the need for "bundling" both the reformed governance structure and the dedicated financial component, saying doing one without the other would set the proposal up for failure. West told committee members the timeline for a voter referendum is fluid and up for debate, which he would leave in the City Council's hands.

CAP members proposed a voter-approved property tax millage that acknowledges the current economic climate across the country by phasing it over 15 years but ultimately would increase the annual budget to \$20 million, vastly improving the average \$5 million NORD receives annually, said West. Currently, NORD receives its budget from a 1.09 millage and annual general fund revenues for the total \$5 million. The new property tax millage would add an extra 2.5 mills in the first three years for a total \$10 million budget. In years four through eight, another 2.5 mills would be added for a total 5 mills and a \$15 million annual budget. In years nine through 15, it would increase by another 2.5 mills for a total 7.5 mills and \$20 million annual budget.

Councilmembers in attendance, including Council President Arnie Fielkow,

Council Vice President Jacquelyn Brechtel Clarkson, District "C" Councilmember James Carter and District "E" Councilmember Cynthia Willard-Lewis, thanked attending CAP members for presenting their findings and conducting this yearlong study for NORD improvements.

"I am honored to hear this presentation, knowing of your wonderful reputation and experience in public playgrounds and that you have been very concerned about this particular issue for more than 20 years," said Carter. "I want to thank you all for your thoughtfulness and you have done a tremendous job bringing this to us."

Council President Arnie Fielkow, who chairs the committee, said the council consistently has looked at fact-based evidence of what has worked and appreciated the due diligence performed by West and other CAP members. Fielkow said he has long been disturbed by the inequity within NORD facilities and advocated that now is the time for change.

"The reason I ran for office more than any other topic was for the children of this community," said Fielkow. "We have an opportunity to change the lives of our kids for years to come, to change the status quo. My hope is the council has the courage to put this issue up during its term, either this fall or after the first of the year. CAP members have done an incredible job. Hopefully we can repay you with an incredible NORD system in the future. I look forward to continuing that dialogue."

New Orleans, LA - August 31, 2009 - Today in a joint session the City Council Budget, Audit and Board of Review Committee and the Special Disaster and Recovery Committee heard presentations on the status of the 2010 budget preparation.

The Committee heard presentations from Budget Administrator, Brian Firstley; Assistant Chief Administrative Officer, Cary Grant; and Senior Managing Consultant of Public Financial Management, Chris Pencikowski regarding the budget process timeline for the months of September, October and November leading up to the City Charter mandated December deadline to approve the 2010 budget.


Among the goals of the 2010 budget preparation process outlined in the presentation included, determining how much money is available; establishing prioritized results; allocating revenues to results; conducting analyses; ranking budget programs; identifying measures and monitoring performance.

"We have a lot of work ahead of us to develop a sound budget this year," said Budget Committee Chair Councilmember Cynthia Hedge-Morrell. "Just like families across the country have we will need to make tough choices in order to find places to save money this year."

The Mayor is expected to present his budget to the Council before November 1, 2009. The City Council will hold its budget hearings during the month of November and is expected to approve the budget prior to December 1, 2009.

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New Orleans, LA - July 23, 2009 - Today, the New Orleans City Council passed Ordinances ensuring proper collection of property liens and establishing spacing restrictions for the sale of tobacco products near children, and Resolutions honoring Edwin Hampton, band Director and Founder of the St. Augustine Marching 100, and supporting New Orleans Adolescent Hospital.

July 23, 2009

The Council also passed a Resolution and addressed a presentation congratulating Tulane University on the forthcoming opening of its new Disaster Management Leadership Academy.

Additionally, the Council deferred the Ordinance providing for the acquisition of the Chevron building as a potential new site for City Hall, and the hearing of the Lake Carmel subdivision appeal.

The Council also addressed a presentation on prohibiting floating vessels in canals in advance of a storm, thanked the New Orleans Metropolitan Realtors Association for its assistance to the City on legislative issues throughout the years, and received a status report from the New Orleans Redevelopment Authority.

Deferred Vote on Acquisition of Chevron Building

The Council, at the request of Budget Chair Councilmember Cynthia Hedge-Morrell, voted to defer until next week Ordinance Calendar No. 27,563 regarding the acquisition of the Chevron building as a possible site for a new City Hall.

Cynthia Sylvain-Lear, Deputy Chief Administrative Officer, gave a presentation to the Council on the need for a new City Hall, the improvements needed at the current City Hall, and a comparative analysis of the current City Hall and the Chevron building.

Qi Wiggins, a Chevron spokesperson, informed the Council that Chevron was unwilling to extend the July 31st purchase agreement deadline and therefore recommended that the Council defer their vote to next week rather than the August 6th regular Council meeting.

The Councilmembers will collectively decide which

day next week the majority of the Council can convene for a special Council meeting to address this matter.

Addressed Process for Collection of Property Liens



The Council passed Ordinance Calendar No. 27,571, authored by Councilmember Head, to ensure that collection of property liens and ad valorem taxes occurs as required by law.

District "B" Councilmember Stacy Head said, "This legislation directly links the payment of property liens to the payment of property taxes, therefore preventing property owners from taking advantage of any loopholes which might allow them to pay one without paying the other. We are working to make certain that any and all

property liens are paid in a timely and appropriate manner."

Honored Legendary Founder of St. Augustine Marching 100


The Council unanimously passed Resolution R-09-374, authored by Councilmember Hedge-Morrell, honoring Edwin Hampton, legendary band Director and Founder of the iconic St. Augustine High School Marching 100.

The Resolution also recognizes Hampton for his many contributions to the City throughout his lifetime. Hampton passed away on Monday, July 20th at home in his sleep, at the age of 81.

District "D" Councilmember Cynthia Hedge-Morrell said, "St. Augustine High School's quintessential Band Master, Mr. Edwin Hampton, will forever be remembered for the look and sound of the Marching 100 Purple Knights. Mr. Hampton took over the band in 1952, the second year after the school's founding, and honed his vision to instill a 'different style of marching' in his students resulting in the complicated formation known as 'patterns in motion'."

Councilmember Hedge-Morrell continued, " 'Hamp', as he was fondly called, was a mentor to thousands of musicians and young men who passed through the ranks of the Marching 100. He was a disciplinarian but a gentle man who taught teamwork through practice and hard work, first appealing to the integrity of the young men and requiring that they reciprocate with honesty."

Supported New Orleans Adolescent Hospital

The Council passed Resolution R-09-376, co-authored by Council President Fielkow and Council Vice President Clarkson, requesting that the City Attorney consider filing amicus curiae briefs to support the New Orleans Adolescent Hospital (NOAH) in any and all litigation involving the closing of NOAH.

Amicus curiae, Latin for "friend of the court", briefs are filed by an individual who is not a party in the litigation being addressed, but who would like to submit their opinion on the matter for consideration of the court.

Derrick Morrison, Co-Founder of the Committee to Reopen Charity Hospital and Moderator for community forums sponsored by the Council to keep NOAH open, appeared before the Council to show his support for the Resolution.

Governor Bobby Jindal recently used a line-item veto to deny \$14.2 million for NOAH, causing the closing of NOAH and leaving no mental health beds for the uninsured in Orleans Parish.

Council Vice President Fielkow said, "NOAH is the only remaining institution in New Orleans that provides a continuum of care from inpatient beds to evaluations to daily group and family support. Relocating NOAH patients to Mandeville disproportionately impacts low and moderate income families who routinely use public transportation, which is not available between New Orleans and Mandeville. With this Resolution, the Council encourages our City Attorney to officially declare the City's support of any legal efforts to keep NOAH's doors open."

Established Spacing Restrictions for the Sale of Tobacco Products near Children

The Council passed Ordinance Calendar No. 27,550, authored by Councilmember Head, to establish spacing restrictions relative to the sale of tobacco products near playgrounds, schools, churches, and any entities providing structured, organized care for youth.

Specifically, the Ordinance requires that no tobacco retailer shall be permitted to sell, donate, distribute, or deliver to any person(s) tobacco products within 1,000 feet of any playground, church, public library, school, or any childcare facility or similar entity providing structured, organized care for youth. The Ordinance also mandates that no tobacco retailer shall be permitted to establish or open in any residential district or park and recreation district of the City.

District "B" Councilmember Head said, "It is vital that we instill in our children the importance of a healthy lifestyle. By restricting the proximity of tobacco products to children, not only can we ensure that they are not exposed to second-hand smoke, but we can also encourage them to make healthy choices."

Addressed Lake Carmel Subdivision Appeal



The Council did not hear the appeal on the Lake Carmel subdivision, located in District "E", as a result of a stay of 30 days, granted by the Civil District Court this morning.

District "E" Councilmember Willard-Lewis said, "This morning there was a hearing on the Lake Carmel subdivision appeal at the Civil District Court in front of Judge Piper Griffin. The developer, VOB, was requesting that the court issue a mandamus ordering

that this matter be removed from the Council's agenda - challenging the right of the Lake Carmel Subdivision Improvement District to file its appeal to the Council."

She continued, "After consideration of the arguments, Judge Griffin ruled in favor of the City and of the homeowners, denied the mandamus and then granted a stay of 30 days to allow the developer to appeal the ruling to the Fourth Circuit. This matter was on deadline before the City Council, but the court's granting of a stay suspends that deadline. The deadline for the Council to act will not begin to run again as long as this stay is in effect."

The Council deferred the hearing of this appeal to the next Council meeting on August 6th.

Received Report on Prohibiting Floating Vessels in Canals in Advance of a Storm

At the request of Council Vice President Clarkson, Captain Edwin Stanton of the U.S. Coast Guard and Port of New Orleans appeared before the Council to give a report on prohibiting floating vessels in the Inner Harbor Navigational Canal and the Harvey Canal in advance of a storm.

Captain Stanton discussed:

The plan to mandate that all floating vessels be out of the two canals at least 24 hours before the impact of storm force winds

The Army Corps of Engineers' request that the plan be extended to the Algiers Canal

The potential economic impact of this prohibition on businesses along these waterways

Council Vice President Jacquelyn Brechtel Clarkson said, "Floating vessels in canals were one of the most prominent threats during Hurricane Gustav last year. We must learn from our previous experiences with hurricanes, and this is one step towards making our City as safe as possible in the face of both natural and man-made disasters."



New Orleans, LA - July 23, 2009 - Today, the New Orleans City Council passed Ordinances ensuring proper collection of property liens and establishing spacing restrictions for the sale of tobacco products near children, and Resolutions honoring Edwin Hampton, band Director and Founder of the St. Augustine Marching 100, and supporting New Orleans Adolescent Hospital.

July 23, 2009

The Council also passed a Resolution and addressed a presentation congratulating Tulane University on the forthcoming opening of its new Disaster Management Leadership Academy.

Additionally, the Council deferred the Ordinance providing for the acquisition of the Chevron building as a potential new site for City Hall, and the hearing of the Lake Carmel subdivision appeal.

The Council also addressed a presentation on prohibiting floating vessels in canals in advance of a storm, thanked the New Orleans Metropolitan Realtors Association for its assistance to the City on legislative issues throughout the years, and received a status report from the New Orleans Redevelopment Authority.

Deferred Vote on Acquisition of Chevron Building

The Council, at the request of Budget Chair Councilmember Cynthia Hedge-Morrell, voted to defer until next week Ordinance Calendar No. 27,563 regarding the acquisition of the Chevron building as a possible site for a new City Hall.

Cynthia Sylvain-Lear, Deputy Chief Administrative Officer, gave a presentation to the Council on the need for a new City Hall, the improvements needed at the current City Hall, and a comparative analysis of the current City Hall and the Chevron building.



Qi Wiggins, Chevron Spokesperson

Qi Wiggins, a Chevron spokesperson, informed the Council that Chevron was unwilling to extend the July 31st purchase agreement deadline and therefore recommended that the Council defer their vote to next week rather than the August 6th regular Council meeting.

The Councilmembers will collectively decide which

day next week the majority of the Council can convene for a special Council meeting to address this matter.

Addressed Process for Collection of Property Liens



The Council passed Ordinance Calendar No. 27,571, authored by Councilmember Head, to ensure that collection of property liens and ad valorem taxes occurs as required by law.

District "B" Councilmember Stacy Head said, "This legislation directly links the payment of property liens to the payment of property taxes, therefore preventing property owners from taking advantage of any loopholes which might allow them to pay one without paying the other. We are working to make certain that any and all

property liens are paid in a timely and appropriate manner."

Honored Legendary Founder of St. Augustine Marching 100


The Council unanimously passed Resolution R-09-374, authored by Councilmember Hedge-Morrell, honoring Edwin Hampton, legendary band Director and Founder of the iconic St. Augustine High School Marching 100.

The Resolution also recognizes Hampton for his many contributions to the City throughout his lifetime. Hampton passed away on Monday, July 20th at home in his sleep, at the age of 81.

District "D" Councilmember Cynthia Hedge-Morrell said, "St. Augustine High School's quintessential Band Master, Mr. Edwin Hampton, will forever be remembered for the look and sound of the Marching 100 Purple Knights. Mr. Hampton took over the band in 1952, the second year after the school's founding, and honed his vision to instill a 'different style of marching' in his students resulting in the complicated formation known as 'patterns in motion'."

Councilmember Hedge-Morrell continued, " 'Hamp', as he was fondly called, was a mentor to thousands of musicians and young men who passed through the ranks of the Marching 100. He was a disciplinarian but a gentle man who taught teamwork through practice and hard work, first appealing to the integrity of the young men and requiring that they reciprocate with honesty."

Supported New Orleans Adolescent Hospital

The Council passed Resolution R-09-376, co-authored by Council President Fielkow and Council Vice President Clarkson, requesting that the City Attorney consider filing amicus curiae briefs to support the New Orleans Adolescent Hospital (NOAH) in any and all litigation involving the closing of NOAH.

Amicus curiae, Latin for "friend of the court", briefs are filed by an individual who is not a party in the litigation being addressed, but who would like to submit their opinion on the matter for consideration of the court.

Derrick Morrison, Co-Founder of the Committee to Reopen Charity Hospital and Moderator for community forums sponsored by the Council to keep NOAH open, appeared before the Council to show his support for the Resolution.

Governor Bobby Jindal recently used a line-item veto to deny \$14.2 million for NOAH, causing the closing of NOAH and leaving no mental health beds for the uninsured in Orleans Parish.

Council Vice President Fielkow said, "NOAH is the only remaining institution in New Orleans that provides a continuum of care from inpatient beds to evaluations to daily group and family support. Relocating NOAH patients to Mandeville disproportionately impacts low and moderate income families who routinely use public transportation, which is not available between New Orleans and Mandeville. With this Resolution, the Council encourages our City Attorney to officially declare the City's support of any legal efforts to keep NOAH's doors open."

Established Spacing Restrictions for the Sale of Tobacco Products near Children

The Council passed Ordinance Calendar No. 27,550, authored by Councilmember Head, to establish spacing restrictions relative to the sale of tobacco products near playgrounds, schools, churches, and any entities providing structured, organized care for youth.

Specifically, the Ordinance requires that no tobacco retailer shall be permitted to sell, donate, distribute, or deliver to any person(s) tobacco products within 1,000 feet of any playground, church, public library, school, or any childcare facility or similar entity providing structured, organized care for youth. The Ordinance also mandates that no tobacco retailer shall be permitted to establish or open in any residential district or park and recreation district of the City.

District "B" Councilmember Head said, "It is vital that we instill in our children the importance of a healthy lifestyle. By restricting the proximity of tobacco products to children, not only can we ensure that they are not exposed to second-hand smoke, but we can also encourage them to make healthy choices."

Addressed Lake Carmel Subdivision Appeal



The Council did not hear the appeal on the Lake Carmel subdivision, located in District "E", as a result of a stay of 30 days, granted by the Civil District Court this morning.

District "E" Councilmember Willard-Lewis said, "This morning there was a hearing on the Lake Carmel subdivision appeal at the Civil District Court in front of Judge Piper Griffin. The developer, VOB, was requesting that the court issue a mandamus ordering

that this matter be removed from the Council's agenda - challenging the right of the Lake Carmel Subdivision Improvement District to file its appeal to the Council."

She continued, "After consideration of the arguments, Judge Griffin ruled in favor of the City and of the homeowners, denied the mandamus and then granted a stay of 30 days to allow the developer to appeal the ruling to the Fourth Circuit. This matter was on deadline before the City Council, but the court's granting of a stay suspends that deadline. The deadline for the Council to act will not begin to run again as long as this stay is in effect."

The Council deferred the hearing of this appeal to the next Council meeting on August 6th.

Received Report on Prohibiting Floating Vessels in Canals in Advance of a Storm

At the request of Council Vice President Clarkson, Captain Edwin Stanton of the U.S. Coast Guard and Port of New Orleans appeared before the Council to give a report on prohibiting floating vessels in the Inner Harbor Navigational Canal and the Harvey Canal in advance of a storm.

Captain Stanton discussed:

The plan to mandate that all floating vessels be out of the two canals at least 24 hours before the impact of storm force winds

The Army Corps of Engineers' request that the plan be extended to the Algiers Canal

The potential economic impact of this prohibition on businesses along these waterways

Council Vice President Jacquelyn Brechtel Clarkson said, "Floating vessels in canals were one of the most prominent threats during Hurricane Gustav last year. We must learn from our previous experiences with hurricanes, and this is one step towards making our City as safe as possible in the face of both natural and man-made disasters."

Congratulated Tulane University on its New Disaster Management Leadership Academy

for a presentation congratulating the university on the formation of its new Disaster Management Leadership Academy (DMLA).

A three-year \$2.1 million federal grant will allow Tulane to begin the DMLA, which will grant certifications to high-level government officials and masters and doctoral degrees to students in research programs. Figley provided details on the formation and curriculum of DMLA, as well identified the DMLA staff and others who were integral in the formation of the academy. 

New Orleans, LA - September 17, 2009 - Today the New Orleans City Council passed a Resolution urging the United States Congress to consider amending Federal Medicaid rules, a Resolution supporting City-Initiated Tax Increment Financing (TIF) Districts, and deferred an Ordinance authorizing the usage of TIF for the redevelopment of Lake Forest Plaza in New Orleans East.

September 17, 2009

The Council approved a Zoning Docket supporting renovations for a Senior Citizen Center and introduced an Ordinance requiring that dogs in Orleans Parish be spayed or neutered unless the owner has a breeder's permit.

The Council also addressed a report on drainage issues affecting the Monticello Canal and passed a Resolution supporting the widening of one of the Canal's culverts, received a status update on repairs at Cut-Off Community Center, and honored Herbert Simpson, the last living member of the Negro Baseball League.

The Council passed Motions M-09-498, retaining Scope Services, Inc. to perform recruitment services to fill the vacant position of Council Utilities Regulatory Officer and M-09-496, appointing Evelyn F. Pugh Interim Chief of Staff of the City Council, after holding an Executive Session for the purpose of discussing the professional competence of applicants for both the recruitment services and Interim Chief of Staff position.

Addressed Redevelopment of Lake Forest Plaza in New Orleans East



The Council deferred action on Ordinance Calendar No. 27,631, co-authored by Councilmember Willard-Lewis and Councilmember Hedge-Morrell, regarding the redevelopment of Lake Forest Plaza.

Cesar Burgos, Co-Owner of the Lake Forest Plaza property and Regional Transit Authority Chairman appeared before the Council to thank Councilmembers for their dedication to the rebuilding of the City and asked them to review the project in a timely fashion so that the redevelopment can move forward.

Cesar Burgos The Ordinance, if passed, would authorize the execution of a Cooperative Endeavor Agreement between the Lake Forest Plaza District and the City of New Orleans, and would authorize the Lake Forest Plaza District to receive undedicated City Sales and Use Tax of two percent, generated within the District and designating those funds to reimburse economic development costs.

District "E" Councilmember Cynthia Willard-Lewis said, "The redevelopment of this site is not negotiable - it is a requirement for the City's recovery. We want to take this extra time to thoroughly review the financial structure of this redevelopment and ensure that a deal is constructed that will both benefit the citizens of New Orleans and fulfill the specific vision of the New Orleans East community."

Supported Senior Citizen Center in District "C"

The Council approved Zoning Docket No. 80/09 to permit the renovation of an existing building at 2201 Barracks St. into the Harmony House Senior Citizen Center.

The Council received public comment from Harmony House senior citizens, as well as community members, whose main concern centered on the necessity for adequate parking at the senior center.

District "C" Councilmember James Carter said, "Our seniors are an invaluable asset to our City. We will be judged by how we treat both the youth and the

elderly in our City and we are grateful to the Harmony House senior center for providing our seniors with a loving and caring community of people to call their own.

Addressed Drainage Issues Affecting Monticello Canal

The Council received a report on the drainage issues affecting the Monticello Canal, located in District "A", and nearby areas in Orleans Parish.

Sarah Stack of the UNO Center for Hazards Assessment, Response and Technology (CHART), Norma Jean Mattei, Chair of the UNO Civil and Environmental Engineering Dept., and Joseph Sherman, a Hollygrove resident, gave a PowerPoint presentation on the drainage issues and necessary improvements to the canal.

The UNO representatives cited two undersized culverts, one located under Airline Highway, that cause blockages in the canal and cause flooding.

The Council passed Resolution R-09-470, authored by Councilmember Midura, calling upon the New Orleans Sewerage and Water Board to work with Jefferson Parish and the State of Louisiana to replace the undersized culvert under Airline Highway in the Monticello Canal with appropriately sized bridges that will not cause constrictions in the canal.

The Resolution also notes the importance of identifying the cost of the replacement and determining appropriate proportions of funding responsibility among New Orleans, Jefferson Parish and the State of Louisiana.



John Young, Jefferson Parish Councilman-at-Large, Division A appeared before the Council to offer his support of the expansion of the culverts.

District "A" Councilmember Shelley Midura said, "It is vital that these culverts be widened to prevent flooding of the Monticello Canal. In order to make this happen, it will require effective coordination between the Sewerage and Water Board, Jefferson Parish, the City of New Orleans, the state and the Federal government - we are prepared to do whatever we can to make sure this happens."

Jefferson Parish Councilmember John Young Supported Amendments to Federal Medicaid Rules





The Council passed Resolution R-09-490, introduced by Councilmember Fielkow, urging the United States Congress to consider amending Federal Medicaid rules to account for the aberration in personal income statistics that is directly linked to Hurricanes Katrina and Rita.

The amount of money the State is expected to match for the Federal Medicaid program is based upon percapita income statistics. Under current Federal Medicaid rules, insurance settlements and Road Home grants are considered personal income, therefore inflating the state's per-capita income statistics.

Council President Arnie Fielkow said, "This is a critical issue at both the local and regional level. As a result of Hurricanes Katrina and Rita, and the large amount of funds that have come into our state and the Gulf Coast region to provide for recovery, it appears that our income level is higher, meaning that our Medicaid cost share owed to the government would be higher. This is not an accurate reflection of the state's income level, as many of these funds are one-time reimbursement payments for the costs of rebuilding."

Addressed Status of Repairs at Cut-Off Community Center

Cynthia Sylvain-Lear, Deputy Chief Administrative Officer, Pamela Sims-Smith, Property Management Director and Bill Chrisman, Capital Projects Director, appeared before the Council to present a status update on repairs to the air conditioning and lighting at Cut-Off Community Center.

Sims-Smith informed Councilmembers that the air conditioning repairs at the Center would be completed today and that she has staff on-site to facilitate these repairs.

Mr. Chrisman provided an update on the lighting repairs, notifying Councilmembers that the contract for the repairs has been signed by the Mayor and work will begin next week. Sylvain-Lear committed to give Councilmembers a precise timeline for the completion of the repairs

District "C" Councilmember James Carter said, "These repairs need to be done immediately - the community has been patiently waiting for the necessary improvements at their community center. Status reports and accurate timelines on projects of this nature are vital to ensuring that progress is made in a timely fashion and we look forward to hearing of the completion of all repairs at Cut-Off Community Center."

Introduced Dog Breeding Controls Ordinance



The Council introduced Ordinance Calendar No. 27,687, authored by Councilmember Hedge-Morrell, to establish a mandatory spay and neuter program for dogs, a breeding permit for dogs, and fees and requirements for such permit and penalties for violations.

Specifically, the ordinance would require that owners spay or neuter all dogs over 6 months old, and that owners may obtain a breeders permit if the owner does not intend to spay/neuter their dog.

Councilmember Hedge-Morrell

District "D" Councilmember Cynthia Hedge-Morrell

said, "The cost of animal control services for the City is tremendous. Every time the SPCA gets called out to deal with an animal, it costs money. At present the euthanasia rate exceeds 50%, which is unacceptable. In light of the City's projected budget deficit, the citizens of New Orleans can no longer pay for individual pet owner's decisions, nor can we appropriate additional funds to the LA/SPCA.

"This permit requirement for dogs that aren't spayed or neutered will encourage pet owners to be responsible, while helping to fund animal control operations. The ordinance gives pet owners the option to keep their animals intact, but if they choose to do so, it requires them to pay a fee for the extra burden placed on our City by the overpopulation of animals."

Increased the Rates for Airport Shuttle Fare

The Council passed Ordinance Calendar No. 27,623, introduced by Councilmember Willard-Lewis, increasing rates for Airport shuttle fare from \$13.00 to \$20.00, including federal tax and airport tolls.

The Ordinance also changes the designation of vehicles from "Airport limousine" to "Airport shuttle", providing for a more accurate description of the vehicles.

District "E" Councilmember Cynthia Willard-Lewis said, "It has been at least 7 years since there was a rate increase for the airport shuttle fair. This new rate will

place our drivers at a nationally competitive level. We have an industry

leader who has made significant investments in green technology, acquiring 18 new propane hybrid vehicles as well as promoting best practices in employee hospitality training."

Honored Herbert Simpson

At the request of Councilmember-at-Large Clarkson, Herbert Simpson appeared before the Council today to be honored as the last surviving member of the Negro Baseball League. Mr. Simpson, an Algiers resident, was accompanied by two of his nieces and an active Algiers community member.

Mr. Simpson spoke to the Council about his experiences playing baseball in the league, and the importance of hard work in the face of diversity and dedication to reaching your goals.

Council Vice President Jacquelyn Brechtel Clarkson said, "We are in awe of Mr. Simpson and his dedication and love of baseball. He is a role model for the youth of our city and a true example of the accomplishment that comes with hard work. We are very lucky to have him as a member of the New Orleans community."

Supported City-Initiated TIF Districts



The Council passed Resolution R-09-429, which resolves that the Council will endeavor to support City-Initiated TIF Districts and will take all necessary steps to approve Tax Increment Financing in geographically defined Tax Increment Districts (TID) that are dormant, blighted, and in which revitalization would not occur but for the use of TIF.

Resolution R-09-429 reflects the Council's will further strengthen the citizens'

belief that Tax Increment Financing will further strengthen the citizens' confidence in the City's recovery by enhancing economic development.

The Resolution also acknowledges Mayor Nagin's Executive Order 09-02 which establishes the policies and procedures for the establishment, administration, and monitoring of City-Initiated Tax Increment Districts that utilize TIF in Orleans Parish.

Appointed Interim Chief of Staff and Retained Firm for Utilities Regulatory Officer Recruitment Services



The Council passed Motions M-09-498, retaining Scope Services, Inc. to perform recruitment services to fill the vacant position of Council Utilities Regulatory Officer and M-09-496, appointing Chief Deputy City Attorney Evelyn F. Pugh as Interim Chief of Staff of the City Council, due to the impending retirement of City Council Chief of Staff Ronald J. Pursell.

Supported Implementation of Option 2a for Outfall Canals

John Young, Jefferson Parish Councilman-at-Large, Division A; Tom Capella, Jefferson Parish Councilman-at-Large, Division B; Marcia St. Martin, Executive Director of the Sewerage and Water Board; Lisa Ludwig, Executive Director of Pump to the River; Joseph Rault of Pump to the River; and Tim Doody President of the Southeast Louisiana Flood Protection Authority - East, appeared before the Council to discuss recent progress in the U.S. Congress regarding Options 1, 2, and 2/2a and Pump to the River for New Orleans outfall canals.

Option 2a is Option 2, which provides for the deepening and repaving of canal walls and construction of new all-purpose pumping stations at the Orleans Ave., London Ave., and 17th St. canals, with the inclusion of Pump to the River - a mechanism by which water in the 17th St. Canal will be pumped directly to the Mississippi River.

The Council passed Resolution R-09-574, authored by Councilmember Clarkson, reaffirming the Council's request of April 2, 2009 to have Option 2a implemented.

Councilmember-at-Large Jacquelyn Brechtel Clarkson said, "We cannot afford to choose the cheapest option, we must choose the best option - this is not about the cost of dollars, this is about the cost of lives. We will continue this fight on the local, regional and national levels to ensure that our City has the most complete storm protection possible."

Established Office of Inspector General Third-Party Advisory Committee

The Council passed Motion M-09-570, authored by Councilmembers Fielkow and Carter, establishing the Office of Inspector General (OIG) Third-Party Advisory Committee for a period of time not to exceed one year commencing December 1, 2009.

The committee will perform annual quality assurance reviews of audits, investigations, inspections and performance reviews. Membership of the committee includes one representative named by the City Council, one from the office of the Mayor, one named by the Louisiana Supreme Court, one named by the Association of Inspectors General, and one named by the Ethics Review Board.



Councilmember at-Large Fielkow Council President Arnie Fielkow said, "The current law mandates that certain requirements must be met for the OIG, and today we are simply naming the appointee of the City Council for this committee. We want to be clear that the establishment of this committee is not in response to any recent developments with regard to the management and leadership of the OIG. With this new entity, we are simply fulfilling a procedural requirement written into the law."

The Council appointed as its representative to the committee District "C"

Councilmember James Carter, who will serve as Chair until the committee elects a Chair from among its membership. The Council will by motion annually renew the OIG Third-Party Advisory Committee.

Councilmember Carter said, "I am honored to be selected as the Council's appointment for this committee. We recognize the importance of the OIG and this committee will help to ensure efficient and transparent operations of the office."

Re-issued RFQ for Utility Consultants

The Council passed Motion M-09-577, authored by Councilmember Midura, to re-issue the Request for Qualifications (RFQ) to initiate the competitive selection of qualified professionals to advise and represent the Council on electric and gas utility matters.

The Council passed the Motion as a result of the few responses to the September 3, 2009 RFQ, referencing that significantly more responses were received from qualified utility consulting firms in 2004, and that the Utility Committee has rejected responses to RFQs for consultants due to a lack of competition within the

pool of responses as recently as May 2009.

The Council requested that the City Attorney issue an opinion with regard to the Motion, to verify that the Council does not put those responses to the RFQ already received at a disadvantage by re-issuing the RFQ

District "A" Councilmember Shelley Midura said, "Re-issuing the RFQ will ensure robust competition and guarantee that we can select the highest quality service at the best price. In doing this, we will also ensure that we meet the deadline of December 31st to select an applicant before our current contracts expire."

Supported Naming of the New Orleans Trauma Center

The doctors discussed the functions of the trauma center as a place to care for patients, as well as a teaching center where medical student, residents, and younger staff

including nurses, can come to train and learn.

The Council passed Resolution R-09-573, co-authored by Councilmembers Clarkson and Head, commending the LSU Board of Supervisors for naming the trauma center as "The Spirit of Charity Trauma Center".

District "B" Councilmember Stacy Head said, "This trauma center is a prime example of how two nationally-renowned medical schools can join together in an effort to bring high quality medical care to our community."

Councilmember-at-Large Jacquelyn Brechtel Clarkson said, "We are so grateful for all of your hard work and collaboration to make this trauma center one of the best in the country. We know that it will continue to serve as a center for medical care for our citizens and a training facility for those in the medical profession."

Recognized Total Community Action, Inc.

District "C" Councilmember James Carter presented a proclamation on behalf of the full City Council, recognizing Total Community Action, Inc. for their Head Start October Awareness month.

Total Community Action, Inc.'s Head Start Program is a child and family development program that provides services and experiences to promote the growth and development of the family, including health, nutrition, social and mental health services, as well as early childhood education. Total Community Action, Inc. operates eight Head Start Centers throughout the New Orleans area.

Councilmember Carter said, "Total Community Action, Inc.'s Head Start

program encourages parents' full participation in the early development of their children and assists them in the development of enhanced parenting skills. This is a valued community program and we want to recognize this organization for the high quality work that they do."

Approved 2010 Tax Appeal Recommendations



At the conclusion of the meeting, the Council convened as the Board of Review to receive a presentation from Kyle Spaulding, Associate Attorney of Frilot, LLC, of recommendations in connection with the 2010 tax appeal hearings for Orleans Parish.

The presentation specifically provided information on the number of appeals with a break down by type and district, and a summary of the aggregate recommendations to the Board of Review (BOR).

Additionally, Spaulding reported an unprecedented level of participation during the hearings from both assessors and taxpayers, which led to an increased number of settlements at tax appeal hearings.

After the presentation, the Council, acting as the Board of Review, passed Resolution R-09-1, adopting the recommendations concerning disposition of abatement appeals in the First through Seventh Municipal Districts, with the exception of Appeal #610-1.

The Council, acting as Board of Review, also passed Resolution R-09-2, certifying to the Louisiana Tax Commission by the Secretary of the Board of Review, the 2010 assessment rolls of the First through Seventh Municipal Districts, as adjusted by the Board of Review, with the exception of Appeal #610-1.

Decision letters will be mailed to all appellants by October 25th and will contain information about taking further appeals to the Louisiana Tax Commission.

	Frilot has handled approximately 6,000 tax appeals over the last three years for the BOR - approximately 5,400 appeals for tax year 2008, 450 appeals for tax year 2009 and 200 for tax year 2010.

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

New Orleans, LA - October 1, 2009 - Today the New Orleans City Council passed Ordinances supporting the redevelopment of Lake Forest Plaza in New Orleans East, providing for pay increases for City Council members and the Mayor, and supporting economic development in underserved areas.

Additionally, the Council, addressed a presentation on the foreclosure outlook in Orleans Parish, honored 2009 Heinz Award recipient Dillard University's Dr. Beverly Wright, received a report on local job board WorkNOLA, and recognized international guests.

The Council also held an Executive Session to address pending litigation. Supported Redevelopment of Lake Forest Plaza in New Orleans East



The Council passed Ordinance Calendar No. 27,631 supporting the redevelopment of Lake Forest Plaza. The Council voted after several hours of comment by the public, community members, neighborhood organizations, business owners/developers, Councilmembers and others.

Specifically, the Ordinance authorizes the execution of a Cooperative Endeavor Agreement between the Lake Forest Plaza District and the City of New Orleans, and authorizes the Lake Forest Plaza District to receive undedicated City Sales and Use Tax of two percent, generated within the District.

Those funds are to be designated for reimbursement of economic development costs. The Ordinance also specifies that no portion of the funds will be used to satisfy any pre-existing debt.

Cesar Burgos, Co-Owner of the Lake Forest Plaza property, appeared before the Council along with additional representatives of the Lake Forest Plaza redevelopment project to give a brief presentation on the New Orleans East Marketplace Development Plan.

The presentation included data from an economic impact study of the project, including project costs, investments and jobs created; as well as maps and diagrams of the proposed redevelopment - outlining the uses of the space including a police substation, premium outlet mall/retail center, movie theater, restaurants, commercial office space, hotel and big box retailer.

Councilmembers highlighted the necessity of ensuring that the timelines and commitments set forth by the developers are met, in order to ensure that the project is completed and will serve the community and the City in the best way possible. The Council also emphasized the importance of transparency and community input throughout the project's development.

District "E" Councilmember Cynthia Willard-Lewis, although in support of the redevelopment of Lake Forest Plaza, voted against the Ordinance, suggesting that a new version of the Ordinance be adopted in two weeks, after several questions that she raised could have been answered.

Addressed Salary Increase for Councilmembers and Mayor

The Council passed Ordinance Calendar No. 27,692, co-authored by Councilmember Midura and Councilmember Carter, to provide for an increase in and future adjustments for the salaries of both Councilmembers and the Mayor.

The vote was 4 to 3, with Councilmembers Fielkow, Midura, Head and Carter voting for the Ordinance, and Councilmembers Clarkson, Hedge-Morrell and Willard-Lewis voting against.



Greg Rusovich, Chairman of the Business Council of New Orleans, and Bob Brown, Managing Director of the Business Council of New Orleans, appeared before the Council to offer their support for the pay raise. The Business Council is one of the groups that originally brought the idea of a salary increase to the Council.

The salary adjustments will not apply to the current Council term, but rather to the next Council elected by the voters.

Councilmembers acknowledged that the salary for the position of Councilmember has not been raised since 1986, and according to the Federal Bureau of Labor Statistics the inflation adjusted amount for 2009 would be

approximately \$83,000. Councilmembers also discussed the salary adjustment relative to the current economy, as well as the ongoing recovery of the City and the City's anticipated budget deficit.

District "A" Councilmember Shelley Midura said, "The short view is focused on the benefits and consequences for the person, while the long view is concerned with the benefits and consequences of the office. The salary itself is not the goal; it is merely a tactic for building a better democracy."

District "C" Councilmember James Carter said, "The City of New Orleans deserves - indeed, it needs - the most qualified leadership possible. And if you want a truly representative government, you must attract the best and the brightest from all walks of life. At the current pay level, it is not possible for most people to devote four years to this job; the personal cost in terms of lost income is just too great. This ordinance is a cost of living adjustment and will bring Council salaries on par with similar elected officials in other parishes and cities. It is an important step in the professionalization of the office, and I believe it will benefit the City greatly over the long term."

Supported Economic Development in Underserved Areas



The Council passed Ordinance Calendar Nos. 27,667, 27,668, 27,669, 27,770, co-authored by Councilmember Fielkow and Councilmember Hedge-Morrell, authorizing the Mayor to enter into individual Cooperative Endeavor Agreements with Canseco's Holdings, LLC, Mrs. Wheat's Fabulous Foods, Inc., CJC Resources LLC, and Advanced Steel Homes, LLC to approve the use of Urban Development Action Grants (UDAG) in order to stimulate economic development in underserved areas.

Council President Arnie Fielkow said, "We must encourage economic development in all areas of the City, but especially in the underserved areas of the City where it is needed most. This will benefit our citizens and will serve as a sign of encouragement for old businesses to return and new businesses to invest in our communities."

District "D" Councilmember Cynthia Hedge-Morrell said, "Many of our neighborhoods are still struggling due to the fact that they lack grocery stores, restaurants and retail centers nearby. It is our duty to do whatever we can to promote economic growth in these areas and to encourage our local businesses to return and prosper.
